New SPS Coal Unit

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) recently put into commercial service a power plant generation unit that can meet the electricity needs of 225,000 people.

The coal-fueled, 561,000-kilowatt unit, located at SPS' Tolk Station near Muleshoe, Texas, was brought into service June 30, 1985, for about \$287 million, on schedule and under budget.

"Tolk No. 2" is Southwestern's fifth coal-fueled unit. The steam generating boilers of all five units burn low-sulfur, Western coal from Wyoming mines.

"We are particularly proud that we can build and finance plants at far less eventual cost to customers than can most electric utilities," said Bert Ballengee, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service. "We strive to keep electricity affordable, and our efficient, lower-cost plants help us achieve that goal."

Tolk No. 2 was constructed for \$512 per kilowatt of installed capacity—significantly below the \$1,086 projected national average cost per kilowatt of comparable coal-fueled units coming into service this year, Ballengee said.

"The use of more coal and less natural gas as boiler fuel in the plants also saves our customers money," the utility president added. "Coal is the least-expensive

boiler fuel practical for Southwestern. We estimate that using coal in our fuel mix will save our customers \$215 million this year alone."

The relative fuel-cost savings will continue to increase, Ballengee said, because Tolk Unit No. 2 in fiscal 1986 will increase generation by coal to about 76% of SPS' total electricity production.

SPS designs, engineers, and oversees construction of its own power plants, Ballengee notes. "We are one of only a handful of electric utilities in the United States that can control costs to customers by using an in-house group to design power plants. Almost all other utilities must rely on consultants, making those utilities' power plants cost more."

Tolk Unit No. 2 is almost a duplicate of Unit No. 1, said Jim Matthews, SPS vice president, generation plant design and construction. The units share some large equipment, including the on-site coal-handling system, water treatment facilities, and offices and control room. A major difference between the units is that Unit No. 2's "baghouse," the fabric filter system that prevents coal fly ash from entering the atmosphere, was designed by SPS engineers.

General construction contractor for Tolk Station was Missouri Valley Inc., of Amarillo, Texas; the

electrical contract work was by Budwine Service Electric of Carlsbad, N.M. Sometimes, there were as many as 800 workers on site.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of one million in eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Panhandle of Oklahoma, and Southwestern Kansas.

Services Held

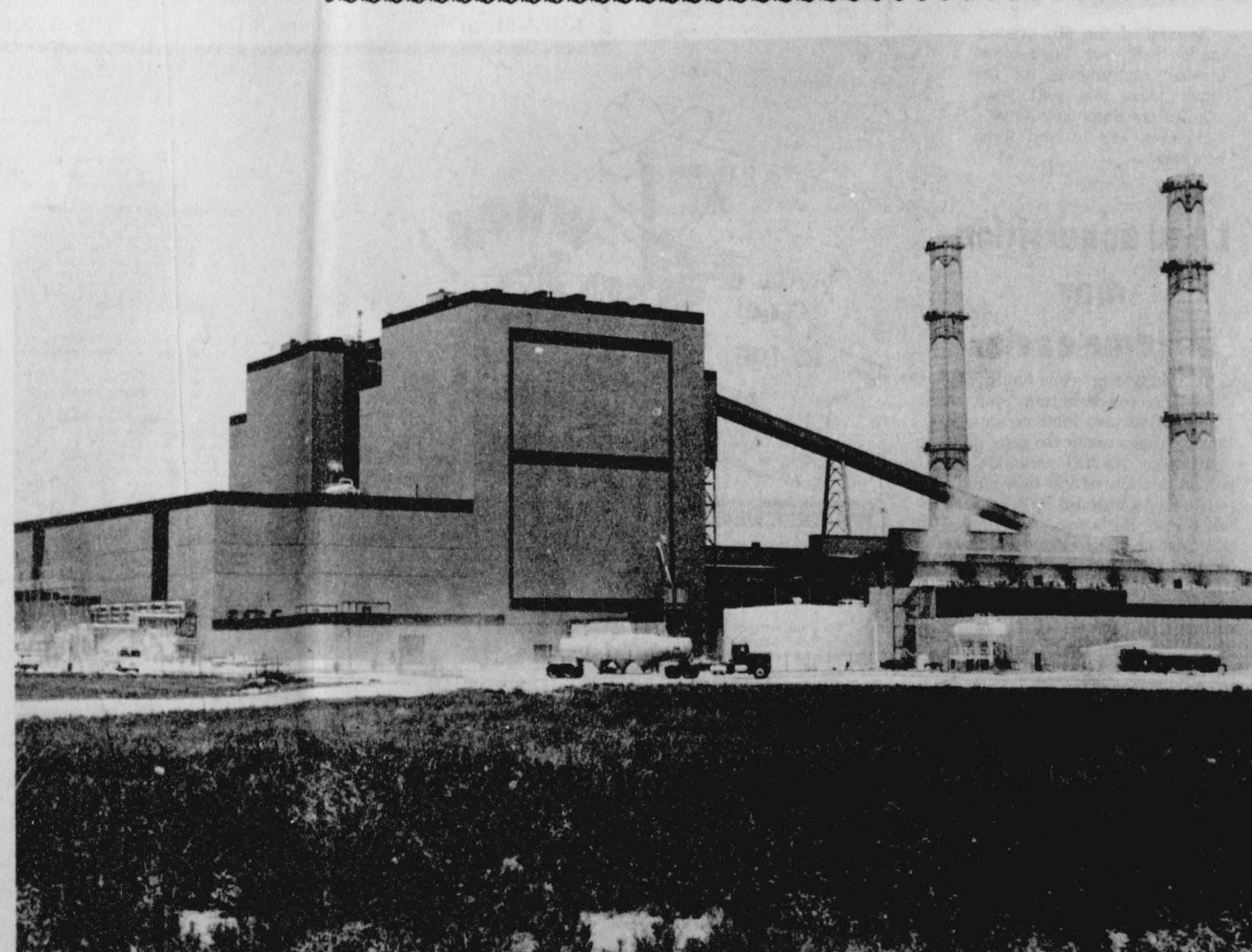
Rebecca M. "Reba" Bennett, of Gruver, 61, died Monday.

Parolees may be required to repay court costs

The Board of Pardons and Paroles may soon require persons placed on parole to repay the county where they were tried for any fines, fees or other costs imposed by the courts, including the costs of county-paid public counsel.

The change in current law, which does not authorize the parole board to make defendants repay counties for the expense of their own prosecution, takes effect on Sept. 1 as a result of the passage of SB 59. Sponsored by Representative Bill Blackwood and Senator Ted Lyon, the bill was signed by Governor White last week.

"I have long believed that costs of maintaining our courts should be borne by those individuals whose cases clog the dockets and overburden the criminal justice system. That includes convicted criminals," Governor White said.

Hall of Fame nomination deadline Sept. 16

Governor Mark White will inaugurate 15 outstanding women into the second annual Texas Women's Hall of Fame on November 14, 1985, at the University of Texas Performing Arts Center during the celebration of "Women in Texas Today" week in Austin.

Individuals or groups may nominate women for the Hall of Fame who have contributed their talents and skills to make a significant impact on the state's development and growth in one of the following areas:

-Agriculture and Ranching: Individuals with expertise in the areas of farming and ranching.

-Arts: The Creative Arts -- artists, sculptors; The Performing Arts -- musicians, singers, actresses, dancers; The Literary Arts -- authors, writers, poets.

-Athletics: Persons who have excelled in amateur or professional sports or the Olympics.

-Business and Finance: Bankers, business owners, financiers, entrepreneurs.

-Civic Leadership: Leaders in the areas such as civil rights, civic involvement, advancement of the arts, philanthropy, historical preservation, and humanitarian causes.

-Communications: Persons involved in print or electronic media.

-Education: Separate awards will go to educators and administrators in higher education and in primary-secondary education.

-Health Professions: Doctors, nurses, administrators.

-Legal: Attorneys, judges, law enforcement or criminal justice officials.

-Public Service: Elected/appointed officials, government service, human services.

-Science and Technology: Research scientists, inventors, engineers, environmentalists, architects.

-Volunteerism: Individuals active in volunteer causes with a statewide and local community impact.

Governor White, members of the Governor's Commission for Women, and a panel of public members will select winning nominees.

Individuals or groups may nominate candidates for the Texas Women's Hall of Fame by filling out a form available from the Governor's Commission for Women, P.O. Box 12428, Austin 78711. The deadline for the commission to accept nomination forms is Monday, September 16. The quality of a candidate's achievements -- not the number of nomination forms submitted -- will influence selection.

Texas communities are encouraged to plan celebrations honoring local Women's Hall of Fame nominees to coincide with "Women in Texas Today" week in November.

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Land acquisition may become easier

Beginning next year family farmers and ranchers may find it easier to acquire land or expand their holdings under the provisions of HB 196, which Governor White signed into law earlier this month.

The bill, sponsored by Representative Pete Patterson and Senator Bill Sarpalus, establishes a low-interest loan program with rates fixed for up to 40 years for the purchase of farm and ranch land. It will be administered by the Veterans Land Board using procedures similar to those of the Veterans Land Program.

The Farm and Ranch Finance Program becomes effective Sept. 1, 1985, if Texas voters approve a constitutional amendment this November authorizing the sale of general obligation bonds by the state to fund the program.

"The program's low, fixed interest rates and low down payment requirements make it a boon to young farmers acquiring their first acreage and to established family farmers and ranchers who want to expand their holdings," Governor White said. "The Farm and Ranch Finance Program poses no financial risk to the state since it retains title to the land purchases until the loans are paid off, so I hope Texans will vote their approval for the program in November."

THE Know Weather

Most everyone knows
that the shortest day of the
year occurs in December
and the longest in June.
Why does December not
contain the coldest day and
June the hottest in the
summer?

The answer lies in the
fact that the earth stores up
the heat during the summer
and loses it slowly. When
the shortest day of the year
arrives, usually December
21, the earth still retains
some of its stored up heat
from the summer.

But, later in January
and February, most of this
heat has been lost and the
earth is actually colder than
in December.

Likewise, when the
longest day of the year ar-
rives, the summer solstice
(usually June 21), the earth
has not stored up the
amount of heat it will con-
tain by July and August,
after additional long days
and short nights. And—as a
result—the earth is colder in
June than a month or two
later.

Always make a last
minute check of your house
after packing your car be-

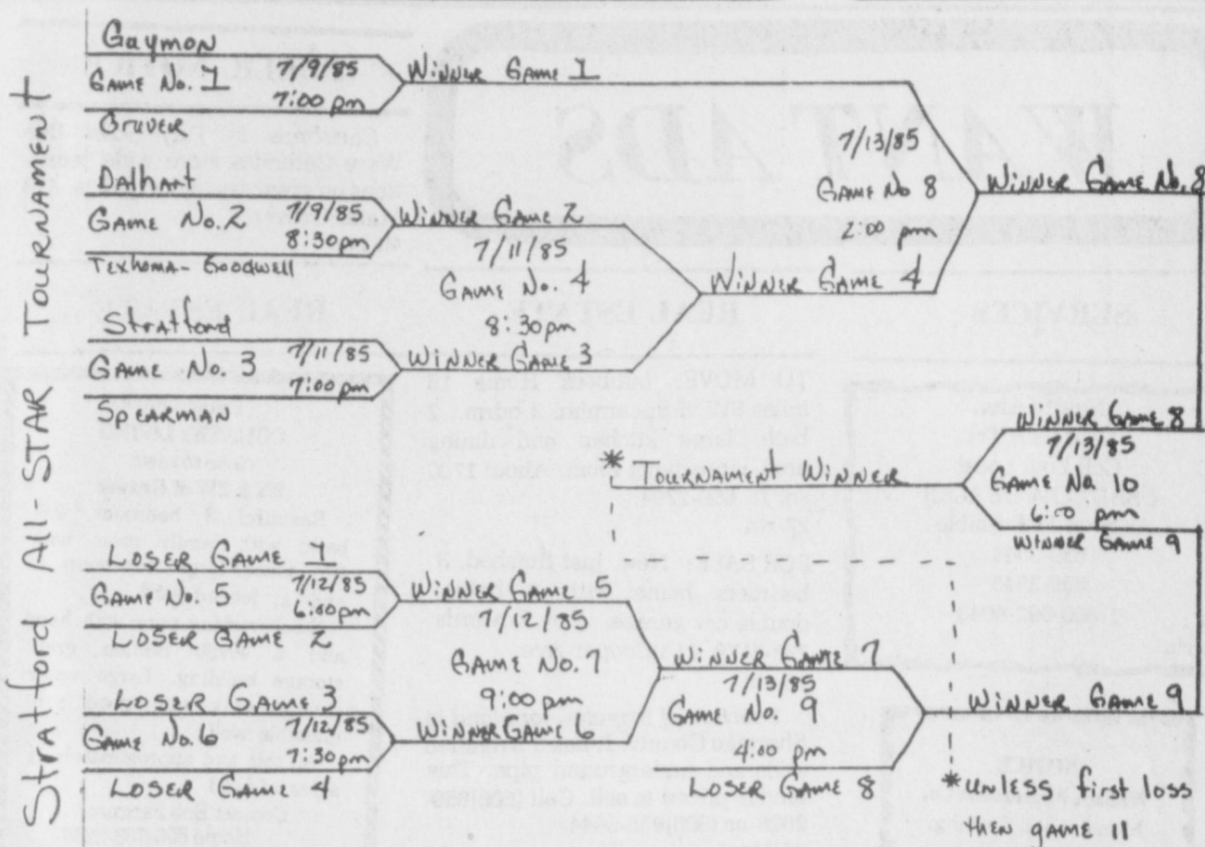

report if you will earn over the exempt amount. This year, the exempt amount is \$5,400 for those under 65 and \$7,320 for those 65 to 70. There is no limit for those 70 and over. And income from investments and pensions doesn't count, only wages you earn.

If you're nearing retirement age, you probably know you can apply for reduced social security benefits as early as 62. Or you can wait until you reach 65 and get full benefits. But no matter when you decide to retire, be sure to apply for benefits about 3 months before you want to start getting monthly checks. This allows enough time to process your application and you'll be sure to get your first check without delay.

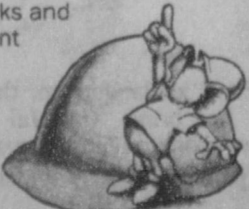
