





## Clyde Bulldogs Favored In 10-A Basketball; Cross Plains, Second

Two teams, Clyde's Bulldogs and Cross Plains' Buffaloes, tower head and shoulders above the rest in District 10-A and should battle right down to the wire for coveted championship this season.

But Clyde, which won the title with a fine 6-2 mark last year, gets the nod to repeat on the basis of a fine 13-4 record to date and the ability of two standout cagers — Barton Scott and Johnny Paylor.

Albany, the 1960 Class A state football champion, appears to be the only team capable of challenging Cross Plains for second but the Lions may take a while to get rolling. They were involved in grid playoffs up until mid-December and have played three basketball games to date.

Eastland is a solid choice for fourth place with Santa Anna and Early expected to fight it out in an attempt to escape the unwanted cellar position.

Clyde lost only one basketeer via graduation (all-area performer Joe South) and returns seven numeral winners off last year's team.

Paylor and Scott, both polished seniors, head the list. Scott, a 6-4 postman, is the team's leading rebounder and consistently scores in twin figures.

Paylor, a 5-11 all-district selection last year, is the team leader and most productive scorer, averaging over 15 points per game.

Other returning lettermen for Coach J. W. (Spud) Aldridge are 5-10 junior, Tommy Cook, 5-9 junior, J. B. Hicks, 5-9 junior Von McClure, 6-1 senior Tom Polson and 5-8 soph Johnny McClusky. Hicks, McClure and Cook join Paylor and Scott in the starting unit.

Other prospects include 6-2 Harold Kniffen, 5-9 Joe Howe and 5-11 Thomas Spears.

The Bulldogs which open the season Jan. 13 at Abilene, won third place in the McMurry Tournament this season. Their four losses have been to Class B powers Jim Ned and Talpa-Centennial and Class AA teams Anson and Comanche.

Cross Plains which has broken even (8-8) in 16 games this campaign, has six lettermen back from last year — including all-area performer Tommy Adams.

Adams, who will earn his third monogram this year, is the Buffaloes' leading scorer and rebounder. The 5-11 senior has ripped the nets for 170 points.

Coach Bill Gunn is short on height but he has a well-balanced club. John Baird, a 6-1 junior and the only starter over 6-0, has tallied 160 points and 5-10 junior Doug Dallas 122. Dwayne Clark, 5-10 junior, and Bill Watson, 6-1 junior, are the other starters.

Other varsity players include 6-3 junior Glen Lawrence, 6-1 junior Jay Wilcoxon, 6-0 frosh Charles Barr, 5-8 soph Darrell Wyatt, 5-10 soph Max Howell and 5-8 soph C. D. Shields.

The Buffaloes finished second in their own tournament this year, losing to Talpa in the finals. They placed sixth in the Howard Payne Tournament.
