





T HE climate of New Mexico is delightful and that of the Pecos Valley is almost ideal. The valley is so far south that the rigorous weather of the north never reaches us and the sammers are extremely mild because of the elevation.

The summer nights are always cool and pleasant—never sultry. No matter how warm it may become during the day, as evening approaches the air becomes cool and refreshing. The mild weather lasts until the winter months. Tais year, 1907, to the present time, December 20, there has been no snow, no ice to speak of and but little frost. Roses bloomed in the yards until the middle of the present month and old settlers say that it is nothing unusual for this weather to continue throughout the entire winter season.



Owing to bright sunshiny weather, fully 90 per cent of the hay raised in the Peccs Vallev can be saved in choice marketable condition so that top prices can be secured; while in Texas, Kansas and other alfalfa districts, in many seasons not more than 50 per cent can be cured so it will sell at satisfactory figures.

In addition to the states referred to as contributing to the demand for Pecos Valley alfalfa, many shipments have been made to Cuba during the past year. 


