

Callahan Wildcat Slated In Vicinity Of War-Kirk Field

Location for a 1,850-foot rotary wildcat was staked nine miles northwest of Cross Plains in Callahan County. It is Woodson Producing Co. & Western Petroleum Co. No. 1 Mrs. Naomi Lydia Heyser.

Drill site is 1,550 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of the west 320 acres in Wm. Scurlock Survey 211. That puts it two miles west of the War-Kirk field.

Operator at last report was drilling below 5,759 feet at S. C. Herring, Abilene, No. 1 Roy L. Duke, Section 20, Block 8, SP Survey, wildcat six miles southwest of Clyde. Contract depth is 6,000 feet.

Cosden Petroleum Corp. No. 1 TXL, Section 13, Block 6, SP Survey, wildcat four miles northwest of Oplin, was plugged at 4,892 feet.

A. T. Halbert, Stamford, No. 5 John F. Berry, Section 56, BBB&C Survey, was potential five miles northwest of Clyde in the Three Aces Flippen Field.

No. 5 Berry gauged 216 barrels of 41 gravity oil per day. Flow was through a 1/4 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 80 pounds tubing pressure from an open hole at 1,682-1,739 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 400-1.

Johnson & Warren of Fort Worth and Cisco No. 1-C Fred Heyser, Subdivision 3, J. H. Pickens Survey 221, was completed eight miles northwest of Cross Plains in the War-Kirk Field.

Daily gauge was eight barrels of 44 gravity oil, plus five percent water. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,850-51 1/2 feet. Another oiler for that same

field is Bryan, Brown and Cannon of Abilene No. 2 Odom Heirs, T. H. Brown Survey 215.

No. 2 Odom Heirs gauged 38 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 10 percent water, per day. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,798-1,802 feet.

Allen Dykes, Abilene, and associates staked two locations four and one-half miles northeast of Clyde in the Dykes Cook Sand Field.

No. 1-E Kattie V. Dugan, contracted for 2,500 feet with rotary, spots 990 feet from the south and east lines of Section 84, BBB&C Survey.

Site for No. 4 Kattie V. Dugan is 330 feet from the south and east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 84, BBB&C Survey.

Another new project for the Dykes Cook Sand Field is Sohio Petroleum Co. No. 6-A Kattie V. Dugan, slated for 1,600 feet with rotary. Site is 330 feet from the north and east lines of the southeast quarter in Section 84, BBB&C Survey.

Paine Production Co., Dallas spotted No. 10 Troy L. Gifford in the Three Aces Field. It spots 2,350 feet from the north and 1,000 feet from the west lines of Section 57.

In the Box Palo Pinto Field, eight miles east of Abilene, Callahan Rotary Co. of Abilene No. 3 Willie Moore is a project slated for 3,750 feet with rotary. Drill site is 330 feet from the north and 1,003 feet from the east lines of Section 28, BAL Survey.

Location has been announced for Burt Oil Co. No. 1 Olivina Loven, four miles north of Oplin in the Loven Ranch Field. Site is 220 feet from the south and east lines of the northwest quarter in Section 363, G. W. Denton Survey.

Clyde Man, 91, Dies

James Franklin Osborn, 91, retired farmer and resident of Clyde since 1905, died at his home here at 3:15 p.m. Sunday. He had been ill for the past two years and seriously ill for the past three months.

Born in Erath County Aug. 22, 1862, Mr. Osborn was married March 21, 1880, to Sarah E. Beauchamp in Bosque County. She died Aug. 30, 1898.

To Mr. Osborn's first marriage were born five children, all of whom survive. They are a son, the Rev. William F. Osborn of Temple; four daughters, Mrs. Mary Jensen of St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Annie Denison of Grass Valley, Calif., and Mrs. Ellen Herndon and Mrs. Rosa Elliott, both of San Angelo.

He re-married June 21, 1900, at Palo Pinto to Mary Phipps, who survives, and to this union were born six children, all surviving. The children are two daughters, Mrs. Belle Page of Lubbock, Mrs. Florence Yonkers of Clinton, Miss.; and four sons, Alva D. Osborn of Roswell, N. M., J. J. Osborn of Clyde, Samson Osborn of Las Cruces, N. M., and John E. Osborn of Carlsbad, N. M.

Also surviving are 31 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

Mr. Osborn moved from Bosque County to Clyde in 1905 and had lived at his present residence since 1913.

He was a former Sunday school teacher and active worker in community union churches here and in Bosque County.

Funeral for Mr. Osborn was held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the family residence. Bailey Funeral Home was in charge.

Snow Geese Pace Legal White Game

Emphasis on safe passage for the southbound whooping cranes led to the point by wildlife authorities that another big white bird—the lesser snow goose—will be fair game in Texas when the waterfowl season opens November 6.

But, the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission pointed out that there is little likelihood that the snow goose, the most abundant of all the geese of this continent, could be mistaken under any reasonable conditions for a whooping crane.

The whooper has a wing spread of twice that of a snow goose. The white tipped wings are almost identical but in flight the long, black legs of the whooper protrude far behind whereas the shorter red legs of the snow goose fold back within the body length.

The Executive Secretary said there should not be any difficulty in distinguishing between the whooper and snow goose in legitimate shotgun shooting range. The same applies to the egret, pelicans and swans, he added.

Injured Persons Leave Hospital

Callahan County Hospital attendants announced the release Monday of all eight persons injured in a two-car collision about 4 p.m. Sunday night eight miles east of here on U. S. Highway 80.

Investigating highway patrolmen blamed rain for the accident, saying it reduced visibility for one driver, B. F. Barrett, Jr., about 30, of Odessa, causing him to run into the rear of a stalled car. The stalled car, driven by F. W. McCorkle, 41, of Andrews had drowned out on a bridge.

Injured but released after treatment were Barrett, Mrs. Barrett, 27, their two daughters, Patricia Ann, 7, and Vickie, 2, and Mrs. C. E. Shepard, 25, of Snyder, all riding in the Barrett automobile; and Mrs. McCorkle, 36, and the McCorkle's two daughters, Betty, 8, and May, 5, riding in the McCorkle car.

Neither McCorkle nor Shepard, husbands of the injured women, was hurt. A 9-month-old baby of the Shepards, Virginia Ruth, also escaped injury.

LET'S MAKE IT EQUAL

It seems that the City of Baird is blessed with trivial misunderstandings and problems that require much time and effort to work out to the satisfaction of all concerned. The City Council of Baird is doing a good job and we believe are doing their level best to satisfy the majority of the tax-payers.

Some time ago, a certain group of men here in town advanced the idea of cutting a road to the Texas & Pacific Lake, which the City acquired from the Texas & Pacific Railway Company, and also acquired an easement for a road to the lake. Certain individuals offered to pay the expense for the road. Nothing ever came of this.

Recently, within the last thirty days or so, a road was cut to the lake from the South side, across City property, without permission from the City Council. This road is not a public road, as it has a locked gate at the highway. This we do not understand. If the private road is allowed to remain for the sole use of one or two individuals, where do the tax-payers of the city come in? The majority of the people of Baird cannot take their boats to the Texas & Pacific lake because they have to go in by way of the park and carry their boat some 75 yards across the tracks, up the dam and down on the other side. It doesn't look right to us that a few can do as they please, and the majority be penalized by having to walk in to the lake, and if they wish to use a boat, get all his neighbors to go down to help him carry it in.

The man who has the lake property leased has been very nice to permit cars through his property to reach city property, but the road is very rough and really impassable when wet.

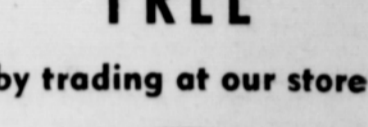
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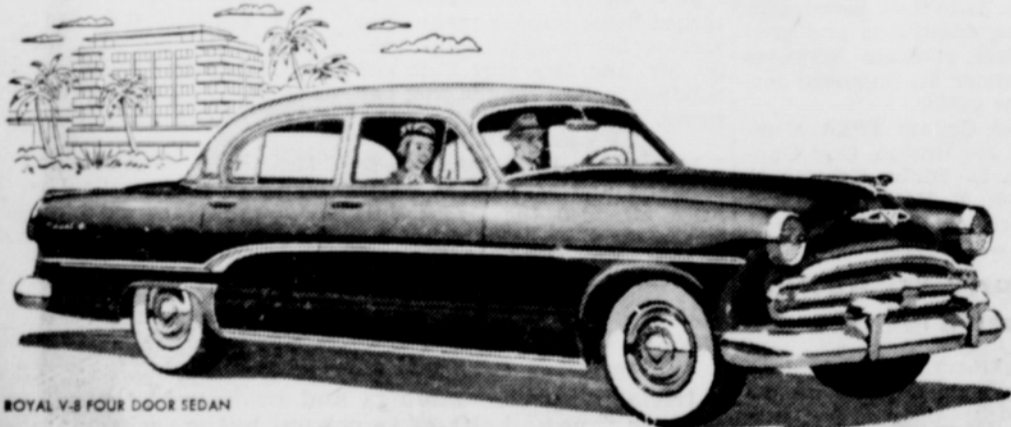
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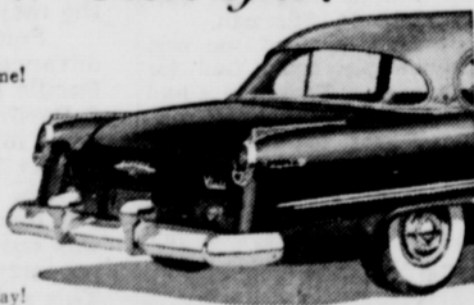

3-D TAXATION

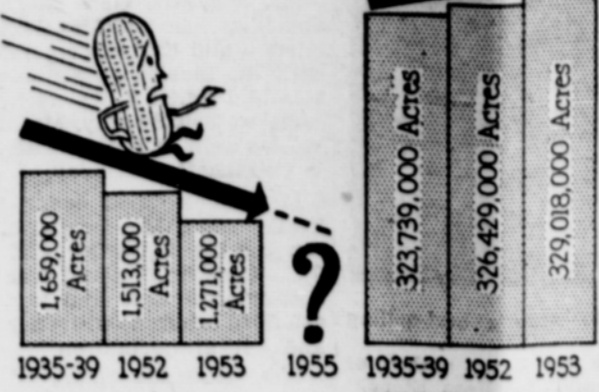
The Chamber of Commerce of the United States recently pointed out, in a statement prepared for the House Ways and Means Committee, that while 3-D is the newest thing in Hollywood it's an old story to millions of American taxpayers.

These taxpayers are investors—the people who put part of their savings in the stocks of corporations and thus make possible employment for tens of millions of other people, as well as themselves, and keep the vast economic machine running.

Here's how 3-D taxation works. First, the investor must pay a tax on whatever he earns—which includes the money he later uses to buy his stock. Second, the corporation in which he invests must pay a tax on its earnings before it can pay him any dividends. Third, whatever he gets in the way of dividends is taxed again. In short, the investor pays income tax on taxed dividends of taxed savings!

That this is a gross injustice to investors goes without saying. But the investor's interest is the smallest factor involved. In the long run, the main sufferers from such punitive tax policies are the American people as a whole. For when we discourage investment in enterprise, we discourage industrial expansion and progress—and everything which makes for more and better jobs, and higher living standards for us all. That's why 3-D taxation is a problem that affects everyone.

All kinds of farm crops have been bringing in more money the past few years than they did before the war. And even with higher prices, the number of acres planted of all crops taken together has been increasing. But peanut acreage has lost ground. If this trend continues, every year there will be fewer peanuts and more people to eat them.

Our population is getting bigger every year, yet the Farm Value of the peanut crop has dropped from more than \$246 million (@10 1/4¢ per pound) in 1948 to about \$150 million (@11¢ per pound) in 1952. A vote against peanut acreage control in December can reverse this trend.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULD



A standing joke in Washington when the head of some foreign government visits here is to remark, "Wonder how much this will cost us?" In other words, when the President, the Prime Minister, or a King visits us, we usually wonder how much money they are asking for their governments.

The "gag" of how much it will cost us for the visit is usually not too far from the truth. However, there are exceptions, and one of them is the present visit of the King and Queen of Greece.

It is true that many American dollars went into Greece to assist that government in combatting the Communists soon after the close of the last war. Not only was there a civil war taking place in Greece, but they were actually invaded from the North by Albanian and Bulgarian Communists. The Greeks did a marvellous job in ridding their country of Communists within their own ranks, as well as repelling the invasion from the North. They did so with American arms, and under the direction of American military officers. Turkey, likewise, rebuilt itself to a point of considerable strength, with assistance from the United States.

We might ask ourselves, "Why be so concerned about these countries lying between the European and Asiatic worlds?" For centuries, Turkey and Greece have been buffer states between the great Middle East and Eastern Europe. The Middle East and Africa have valuable stores of natural resources, as well as teeming millions of people. The only thing between Russia and the vast oil supplies in Iran,

Iraq, and Saudi-Arabia is Turkey and Greece. These countries have proved their opposition to the Communists and are friends of this Country.

The King and Queen of Greece are just like you and me. They both speak English and are as easy to talk with as any individual you might meet in this Country. They want the same freedoms and liberties which we want in this Country, and are great admirers of the United States.

King Paul and Queen Frederika are now in Washington on an official visit. I have had occasion to meet them and the opportunity of talking with them briefly on two occasions. It is surprising how much they know about the United States. They are friendly, and although they are a king and queen, they apparently can be as common as an old shoe. They are interested in Texas, and Texas being a favorite subject of mine, they heard considerable about it.

The drought situation is common to many parts of the Country. Here in Washington, and in the East generally, it is very dry. One of the biggest problems is fire. Thousands of acres of dry timber have been destroyed in Maryland, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia in the last several weeks. Warnings are constantly given the public against carelessness, but somehow fires start and spread rapidly in the dry vegetation.

This time of the year is always very beautiful with the autumn leaves of many colors, but this year it is less so because of the dry weather.

It was highly interesting to attend a conference with Secretary of State Dulles in connection with his talks with Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Bidault of France regarding top-level conferences with Russia. Also included in the discussion was the dispute between Italy and Yugoslavia over Trieste, and the big question of doing something about Japan, in order that she may eventually be able to defend herself.

"As It Looks From Here"

The belief that the seasonal peak of cattle movement had passed was further enhanced by the lighter runs of cattle and calves around the major marketing circles Monday.

This factor, coupled with rains over much of the Southwest, was enough to spring a stirring rally in prices that wreathed the faces of cowmen with smiles all over the Stockyards at Ft. Worth.

While the advance was uneven and some sales showed more climb than others, the general picture was one of climbing prices. Sales 50c to \$1 per hundred above last week's close were the rule.

Some spots were up considerably more. As an example there were 113 small calves of 202 pounds at Ft. Worth Monday shipped from the Kokernot Ranch at Alpine. These calves drew \$20. Mates to them a week ago sold at \$15.50 with a trim. While the general advance was not so pronounced as this case, it was typical of the way the stocker trade came to life on the heels of the rain.

Reports of rain from sections of the winter wheat grazing areas could be expected to revive speculative interest in cows, calves and yearlings suitable for such pastures. Some open weather could bring up the green stuff in jig time.

While the runup in prices was most noteworthy on the cattle and calves, other species shared the better tone.

Hogs drew steady to 75 cents higher prices, small butchers and shippers setting a fast pace and buying most of the top hogs 50 to 75c above last week's close.

In the sheep barn, slaughter lambs and slaughter yearlings were strong at 50c or more higher. Some spots were \$1 or more above the close last week, the kind and condition considered. Feeder lambs drew strong prices. Old ewes were strong to 50c up.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$17 to \$22, and common and medium sorts sold from \$10 to \$16, some shelly kinds below \$10. Fat cows drew \$9.50 to \$12, and canners and cutters sold from \$6 to \$9.50. Bulls sold from \$7 to \$13.

Good and choice fat calves sold from \$13 to \$17, with some outstanding fancy heavies of around 600 pounds to \$18 to \$20. Common and medium slaughter calves drew \$9 to \$13, with culls at \$7 to \$8.

Good and choice stocker calves sold mostly from \$14 to \$18, with a few lightweights to \$20. Stocker cows drew \$7 to \$12.50. Stocker and feeder steers and yearlings sold from \$10 to \$16.

Deer Charges Prove Costly

Texas courts are cracking down on pre-season deer hunters, according to the Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission.

He cited three separate \$200 fines in the latest arrest reports, all levied against persons killing deer out of season.

The Director said the three different cases were held "particularly reprehensible" by the courts since all involved protected deer even in open seasons.

Two were fawns and one was a spiked buck.

Further evidence that the persons raiding the herds shot without looking came in two other cases. One was for killing a doe and the other for shooting a fawn. Both drew \$100 fines.

The arrest report also contained cases for headlighting deer and for running deer with dogs.

Civil Service Exams

Examinations have been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for filling positions of Fishery Marketing Specialist, paying a salary of \$3,410 a year; and Oceanographer, Naval Architect, and Aeronautical, Marine, and Welding Engineer, all paying from \$3,410 to \$10,800 a year.

The positions to be filled from

the Fishery Marketing Specialist examination are in the Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of Interior, and are located in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test and have had appropriate education or experience. Applications must be filed not later than December 29, 1953.

The positions of Oceanographer, Aeronautical Engineer, Naval Architect, Marine Engineer, and Welding Engineer, are in the Department of the Navy and in other Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. Oceanographer positions may also be filled throughout the United States. To qualify for these positions, applicants must show appropriate education, or experience in the field of work for which application is made;

no written test will be given. Applications will be accepted until further notice.

Further information, including instructions on where to send applications, and application forms may be obtained from most post offices or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Questions & Answers

Q—I am now on active duty, and I am covered by a free \$10,000 indemnity. If anything happens to me, would it be possible for my family to collect the \$10,000 in a lump sum?

A—It would not be possible for your beneficiaries to receive a lump sum payment. Under the law, payments are to be made in 120 equal monthly installments of \$9.29 per \$1,000 of indemnity.

Essay Contest For School Students

Students in the 11th and 12th grades in all of Texas public, private, and parochial schools were invited by Harry Benge Crozier, Chairman of the Texas Committee for Employment of the Physically Handicapped, and H. P. Hackney, Commander, Department of Texas, Disabled American Veterans, to participate in the 6th Annual Essay Contest sponsored by the two organizations.

Crozier said that rules of the contest had been sent to all High School Superintendents and Principals and those students interested should contact their respective schools.

Commander Hackney stated the essay, on the subject "The Physically Handicapped - Competent, Dependable Workers," could be a lucrative project for the winners. He pointed out prizes for the State Contest will be \$100 first plus a gold medal, \$60 second plus a silver medal, \$40 third plus a golden-bronze medal, \$20 fourth plus a bronze medal, \$10 fifth.

Mr. Crozier said the first place essay in the State Contest would be submitted as the Texas entry in the National Contest. Prizes for the latter contest are \$1,000 first, \$400 second, \$300 third, \$200 fourth, \$100 fifth, plus all national winners receiving an

expense-paid trip to Washington, D. C.

The D.A.V. in Texas will pay transportation to Austin, Texas, for the State winner to attend their state Convention in June, 1954.

Crozier said for entries in the essay contest to be considered they must be postmarked not later than midnight February 5, 1954, and addressed to Chairman, Texas Committee for Employment of the Physically Handicapped, c/o Texas Employment Commission, Brown Building, Austin 19, Texas.

Crozier and Hackney said background material for the students is available from any one of the Texas Employment Commission local offices; through the Rehabilitation Division, Texas Education Agency; or by writing Disabled American Veterans, Department of Texas, P. O. Box 2061, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas.

- 1/2 cup coarsely broken, unsalted nuts

Sift together onto a piece of paper the flour, baking powder and salt. Mix in a bowl until light and fluffy the shortening, sugar and orange rind. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in about half of flour mixture. Add milk. Stir in rest of flour mixture. Fold in corn flakes, raisins and nuts. Drop dough from a teaspoon, about 2 inches apart onto a greased cookie pan. Bake on rack slightly above center in moderate oven (350) for 15 minutes, or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes 4 dozen.
