#### **DANGER!**

If public connership were the answer to any area's electric power roblem. Nebraska should be in a splendid position. For it is the "I-public-power state.

However, the realization seems far away from the ideal. The Omaha World-Herald, in an editorial entitled "Disaster Approach-ing," says, "The out-state Nebraska public power districts argently need more electricity to meet the growing demands"--and if they on't ift it pronto, brown-outs and black-outs are inevitable.

A short time ago Nebraska's Governor Ander.On told a meet-ng of spokesmen for these districts: "You've been working on his problem two years. Something should have been dcae to start power generating plant a year ago, two years ago. We must have colution!" lint no solution has as yet appeared."

The World-Herald describes the situation thusly: "The public districts have become so enneshed in controversy among them-elves, in rivalry and jealousy, trat they cannot arree on which one of them shall ould the needed generating capacity. As a con-equence, nobody builds it-and the economy of most of the state i in danger."

#### FEWER BUT BETTER

. . . . .

The Herald, of Ashton, Idaho, recently had something worth-while to say about the agriculture situation and outlook. It is par-ticulary relevant now, in the light of the concern many people feel over the decline in farm income following the extremely high peak reached during the war in Korea.

The Herald said. "By actual records, the farmer's buying power is increasing faster than the buying power of people not on farms. "There you have the true facture. Farmers today are fewer," but they're better. Total farming income, therefore, is divided income a smaller number ... Increased mechanizatior ... more efficient methods ... increased and better use of fertilizer and modern watering systems-all these add up to a bright future for the competent farmer."

The Technological revolution that began less than a century ago is still on a full-speed ahead basis. In the lest 15 years alone, the mander of formers and farm workers has gone down almost 40 per cent, while farm production has risen 30 per cent. This is the result of the enormous impact of modern agriculture. There can be no doubt but that both consumers and good farmers have benefited enormously-both financially, and in the coin of better living.
