News From The County Agent's Office

When to water your cotton? This seems to be a very important question that farmers face about this time of the year. I was talking to Bill Gunter, area agronomist Lubbock, Texas, the other day about the time of the first application of water and its effect on cotton. Bill said, "An extremely high level of water or too early watering may encourage excessive vegetative growth at the expense of boll set." This seems to happen quite often on fields where heavy applications of nitrogen have been applied.

Generally speaking, we would like to see the cotton receive an adequate amount of water during peak bloom stage. This is when the cotton is approximately 75 to 120 days old. At this time the plants are using about .25 in. to .40 in. of moisture per day. Due to differences in time required to cover a field, some fields may need water at the sight of the first white bloom while others might wait longer. If the first watering can be applied at the proper time, the chances of excessive growth and delayed maturity will be small. I have just received the main

provisions of the New Trailer License Law. They are as follows:

1. Exempts cotton trailers up to 10,000 pounds from the regular expensive full license fee.
2. Requires, however, that a \$5.00 fee be paid to have each trailer registered and licensed. This is required for the ensuing or current calendar year or unexpired portion thereof and applies to trailers and farm semitrailers with a gross weight exceeding 10,000 pounds. This applies to gins and farmers.
3. Trailers not exceeding 4,000 pounds gross vehicle weight are exempt from license and registration.

The following safety measures will be enforced:

1. Trailers weighing from 4,000 to 10,000 pounds are restricted to 30 miles per hour speed limit.
2. Adequate safety hitches are required (pinned or locked).
3. Reflectors and lights must be present and operative.

A letter last week to the Flo mot board of trustees, informed that improvements in the school plant and faculty personnel had removed the "warned" classification, and objections of the agency.

The school, which operates under the "sparse population" law, has been restored to accreditation, according to standards prescribed by the agency.

Superintendent Hobson Burris and the board of trustees are now making plans to renovate two school busses to the extent of completely new motors and chassis, to be ready for the fall opening of the new school term.

Crop prospect for the Quitaque area continued to be very bright as soaking rains fell all over the area for the past week.

Last Thursday .30 of an inch was measured in the official gauge at the City Hall and then Saturday night an official 2.20 of slow-falling moisture was caught at the City Hall. Monday night an additional .35 fell to bring the month's total to almost three inches.

Saturday's rain was as fine as any we can remember for July, falling so slow that almost none of it ran off.

Heavier amounts that was recorded at the City Hall were reported all over the area, with up to 6 and 7 inches reported in some spots east and southwest of Turkey, however, these heaviest falls were spotty. Up to four inches were reported and most farmers were ready for the moisture.

Crops are looking very good all over our trade territory and the moisture will make cotton and feed prospects look very good, barring complications. The weather forecasts are predicting more rain for the next day or two for the area and local farmers are hoping that floods will continue to pass our area by.

Most of the farmers around here had gotten their crops hoed out and fields for the most part were very clean when the rains came. The additional rain will possibly call for more of the same, however.

GRAVESIDE RITES HELD FOR GRAHAM INFANT

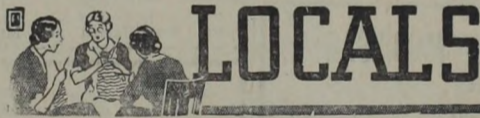

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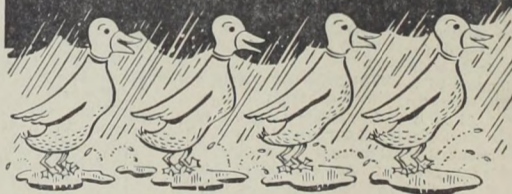

HI-PLAINS HI-LIGHTS

Cordova barley and a cross of Texan and Ludwig were the earliest to mature in a test of eleven varieties of barley at the High Plains Research Foundation. The eleven varieties were planted October 15, 1960, and were harvested May 29 through June 1, 1961 at Halfway.

The yields in the test were as follows: Rogers, 116.4 bushels; selection No. 48-59-38, a cross of Cordova and Kido, 115.4 bushels; Wintex, 114.7 bushels; Cordova,

113.2 bushels; a cross of Texan and Ludwig, 100.7 bushels; selection No. 41-54-757, a cross of Cordova and Omigi, 100.6 bushels; selection No. 48-53-75, a cross of Cordova and Kido, 100.3 bushels; selection No. 41-54-133, a cross of Cordova and Omigi, 92.3 bushels; Kearney, 91.2 bushels; Tennessee Wintex, 90.1 bushels; and Harbine, 85.7 bushels.

Farmers who graze their barley will be interested to know that the two which had the earliest growth were Cordova and a cross of Texan and Ludwig. These two varieties were also the first to mature.

All varieties were irrigated and had a fertilizer application of pre-plant on October 7, 1960 of 300 pounds of 10-30-10 and top-dressed in March, 1961 with forty pounds of nitrogen in the form of ammonium nitrate.

The barley test was conducted at Halfway by Delbert Langford, Associate Agronomist. This test is included in the intra-state fall-sown barley variety test conducted in co-operation with Texas A and M, under the supervision of Dr. I. M. Atkins.

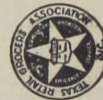
