WALTER ROGER'S NEWSLETTER THE NEW SESSION

On January 10th, 1962, the House of Representatives of the United

States Congress convened for the second session of the 87th Congress. The session commenced with the usual handshaking and greeting among the Members returning to the Nation's Capital for further considerations of old problems, and attacking the new. The oath was administered to the new speaker by the man who has served longest in the House, to-wit: the Honorable Carl Vinson of Georgia, Chairman of the Committee on Armed Services. The new Speaker then administered oaths to the new Members replacing those who had passed away or resigned. The year 1962 has already claimed another Member of Congress in the passing of my good friend, John Riley of South Carolina. John was a southern gentleman in the best traditions, a man of staunch character and great ability. It will be most difficult for the people of South Carolina to replace him.

Since this is the second session of the 87th Congress, it is not necessary for all the Members to be sworn again, nor to reconstitute the several Committees of the Congress. Hence, can be started without delay. The Committee Chairmen have already begun to outline the year's work and set meetings of the Subcommittees and the full Committees. It is hoped that by doing this the unfinished work of the last session may be quickly concluded and the new work for this session can be attended with dispatch. This would make it possible for this session of Congress to adjourn some time in mid - summer, rather than being held over until the fall. The wives and children of the Members have been most anxious that some plan be worked out so that the Members could spend some time with their families during the summer vacation periods. For a number of years it has been impossible for the families to make the usual vacation plans while the children were out of school. This situation finally developed into a mild revolt last year by some of the Members' wives. Although this revolt was unsuccessful, the feeling is still prevalent and it may be expected that the issue will be revived until some action is had. It is my feeling that Congress could adjourn by July 15th. If this is done, it will mean that work must be pushed without delay in all of the Committees.

There is no doubt but that there will be many heated debates during this session on the several subjects mentioned in the President's

State of the Union message. There also a number of bills left on the calendar from the last session which will prove controversial.

On the subject of international matters, you can expect to hear much from the Select Committee which we in the Congress last session formed for the purpose of looking into shipment of goods to Red and Red-satellite countries. In fact, information will be forthcoming within the next few days as the opening salvos in clearing up this problem and in putting a stop to practices that should not be followed.

There will be opportunity for action on three measures passed by the House last year. One of these, H.R. 4469, bars the employment on waterfront facilities and U. S. merchant vessels of persons who refuse to appear or to answer questions on Communist affiliations or commit perjury before any Federal agency. Another, H. R. 3247, clarifies the term "organized" as used in the Smith Act to make it apply

to continuing as well as original Communist activities. This bill will plug up a legal loophole that the Communists were trying to avail themselves of. Another is H. R. 8465, which prohibits shipments in interstate or foreign commerce of articles imported to the United States from Cuba. This measure passed the House and it is hoped that it will become-law this year.

The Congress should also address itself to continuing and vigorous action to ferret out possible infiltration of Communists or Communist sympathizers into the Federal government or any organizations doing business with the Federal government. This is a continuing job and one that must be of primary concern at all times. Several measures which I have introduced can be effective weapons in this battle to assist the security agencies of our government in fighting this battle. I expect to prepare and introduce others as the needs of the enforcement agencies are made known.

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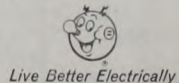

one million pounds of emergency bedding supplies elsewhere. Church World Service materials are requested and distributed by church representatives on the scene.

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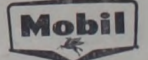

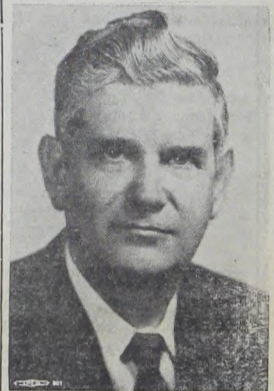

SOIL TESTS HELP YOU 'SEE' YOUR SOIL

The old adage, "Nothing succeeds like success," certainly applies to soil testing. The success enjoyed by the state's Soil Testing Service has fired the enthusiasm of farmers more than any new development in a long time.

Soil testing has shown many farmers the way to higher yields and bigger profits.

A pertinent fact about your soils is that neither you, nor anyone else, can look at them or feel them and say a great deal about their fertility. Much can be said about its potential and productivity, however, from a visual observation. For example, a soil may be well drained, be in good physical condition, and

have thick topsoil, but still be poor in fertility.

This is where soil testing enters the picture. Although you can't see or feel the fertility status of your soil, a soil test can "see" it for you.
