"The cost of telling the truth is less than the cost of telling lies. . . . Thus the president of one of America's largest corporations explains why good advertising is honest and in good taste.

He pointed out that a manufacturer often has millions of dollars invested in a new product before it reaches the market. The seller risks this total investment in his advertising. However, the buyer risks only a few dollars when he tries the product.

"The basic commandment today in successful advertising is, 'Thou shalt not bear false witness.' All sensible advertisers found this out a long time ago," the executive said.

"Naturally, advertising attempts to make itself as attractive as possible. But who would say this is not a desirable attribute as in other things, including women.

"As a result, advertising by constantly pointing out a better way of life, has contributed enormously to the tremendous advance in public good taste," he stated.

These comments by a major national advertiser have a special meaning when applied to local retail advertising. The local retailer may not have millions of dollars invested in his business. But the risk taken by a local advertiser is a total risk. The integrity and good name of an entire local business is tied to the quality of its advertising.

As national advertising is a mirror of the hopes and aspirations of the nation, local advertising is a mirror of the quality of a community and its units of business.

The quality and quantity of local newspaper advertising may indicate to a stranger if a community is a "good place to live."

Giants Still First In League Standing

OIL-GAS WELLS STIMULATE CALLAHAN COUNTY'S ECONOMY

More than \$6.8 million a year of economic stimulation for Callahan County flows from its oil and gas wells each year, an annual study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed today.

"As one of the 206 producing counties in Texas, Callahan County's economy is sensitive to fluctuations in the oil industry generally," commented W. A. Landreth, Fort Worth, Association president. "Long range, the demand for oil looks strong and current production rates continue to provide Texas a major source of its income. On the other hand, Texas operators are beset by competition from other oil producing areas, government ceilings on natural gas prices, heavy tax payments, and a price for crude oil that is insufficient to encourage the amount of exploratory drilling that is needed to find future reserves."

Based on the latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Callahan County in 1965 produced 2.2 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$6.6 million and 1.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$199,400 and ranks 110th among Texas counties in production.

In addition, plants which process natural gas for liquids such as natural gasoline, butane and propane, in 1965 produced more than 3.2 million gallons of liquids valued at \$152,000.

A major distribution of income from sales of oil and gas went to county landowners in royalty payments totaling more

than \$847,100. In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1947, oil and gas operators drilled 124 wells in Callahan County. Of these 28 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association estimated that operators in the county spent more than \$2.7 million in drilling last year, of which \$1.5 million was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$316,518 in production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners. Crude oil production paid \$302,560 and natural gas production, \$13,958.

Texas Employment Commission figures for 1966 show that some 74 workers directly employed in oil and gas operations accounted for a payroll in excess of \$233,764.

Additional value is given oil and gas from the operation of processing plants. The Oil and Gas Journal lists 1 natural gasoline plant in the county with a capacity of 5.0 million cubic feet per day.

Social Security Decisions May Be Carried To Courts

(ED. Note: This is the second of a series of six articles, telling of safeguard against wrong decisions in the social security program, prepared by the Baird Star by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security district manager.)

Last week's article told how a dissatisfied claimant could disagree with the denial action taken on his claim and request and receive formal reconsideration of his claim by a different set of people from the ones who turned him down at first. But if his application is still denied, there are more possibilities to suggest.

If the claim is again denied after such reconsideration, the claimant still doesn't have to give up and accept the decision if he feels it is wrong. He has six more months in which to request a hearing, in or near his community, by a Hearing Examiner. There he may bring witnesses and/or new evidence if he wishes.

The areas of disagreement are talked out in a semi-judicial atmosphere, after which the Hearing Examiner studies the file, consults precedents, and in disability claims may secure the opinions of medical consultants and vocational experts. He then issues a decision upholding the previous denial, or reversing them and awarding the claim. If he denies the claim, it's still not the end of the road. Next week's article will explain further actions possible.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Exercising his veto power to cut appropriations, Gov. John Connally sliced off \$3,214,121 of the one-year general appropriation bill and killed 37 bills passed by the 60th Legislature.

Nine of the vetoed bills called for total annual expenditures of \$12,819,760 beginning September 1, 1968.

By way of explanation of his line-item vetoes in the appropriations bill, Connally said, "I endorse the actions taken by the Legislature to provide the funds needed to meet the state's increasing services to its people. However, there are several items of expenditures for which money was appropriated that I do not consider essential or justified."

Connally deleted a \$600,000 appropriation which would have allowed the New Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences at Houston to lease and operate hospital facilities. "This item was not requested by the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation in its budget request, nor was it included in my budget recommendations or those of the Budget Board," the Governor explained.

A \$300,000 appropriation for additional Phase I construction at the Corpus Christi State School also was vetoed. Connally said it was not requested by the MHMR Department or in budget recommendations submitted by the Legislative Budget Board or by Connally. He pointed out that the 1965 Legislature appropriated \$2,224,000 for the proposed school.

Connally slashed \$800,000 off the appropriation for the University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio. "With construction of the medical school and teaching hospital and the recruitment of faculty and staff in process, the number of students actually enrolled will be limited during the 1968 fiscal

year," the Governor said.

"Even after vetoing this item," he continued, "the medical school's appropriation for the 1968 fiscal year will exceed my recommendation by \$685,795 and will represent a 145 per cent increase over the amount appropriated for the current year."

Also vetoed was \$325,000 earmarked to the State Department of Agriculture for expanding market outlets for Texas' agricultural commodities. Connally explained that "The appropriation of \$325,000 duplicated in purpose a major portion of the \$500,000 'special program' appropriation for marketing and market outlet research, quality research, statistical reporting and other programs relating to agriculture."

Other bills vetoed included those extending the curfew for alcoholic beverage drinking until 2 a. m. in the metropolitan counties, doubling retirement benefits for legislators and improvements in state employees'

retirement benefits, prohibiting employment of youngsters under 21 in stores which sell beer and liquor, permitting broader powers for the State Soil & Water Conservation Board, allowing the State Comptroller to seize property for tax debts and sell it without court action, setting up special county boards to assess tax values on agricultural land near cities, and granting cities police powers on private property such as shopping center parking lots.

COSTLY OVERTIME — Extension of the federal minimum wage act to state hospital and school employees would cost state government in Texas at least \$14,000,000 a year, according to Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin.

Martin says he intends to keep fighting inclusion of state institutions under the act all the way to the Supreme Court.

Three federal judges in Maryland recently handed down conflicting opinions on the issue but not a final order.

Under the new appropriations bill all state employees will get more than the required federal minimum wage. Big catch financially is that the federal act also requires time and a half payment for overtime -- or an hour and a half compensatory time off for every hour of overtime worked during the same pay period. Texas employees get compensatory time off (no cash) on an hour for hour basis.

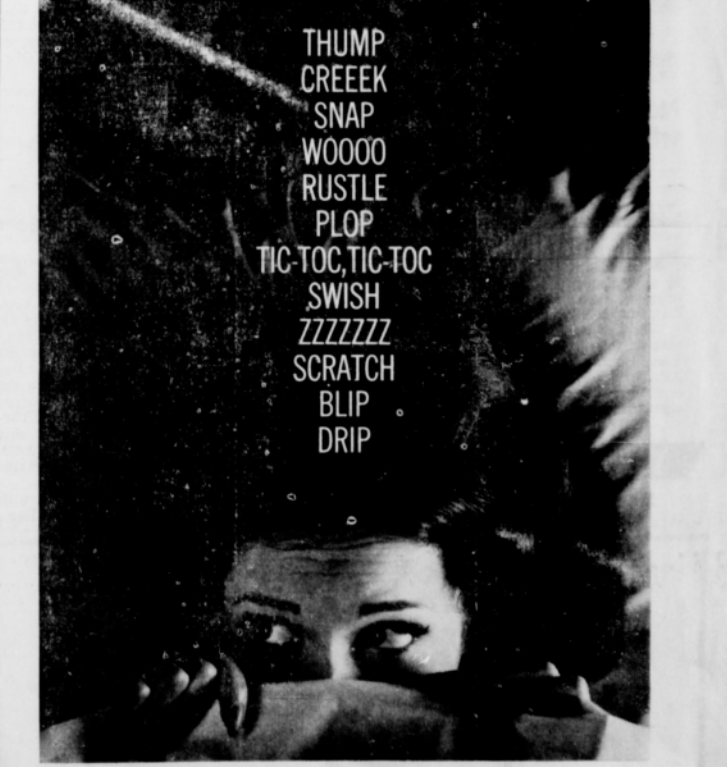

sey were Mrs. Verda Sprawls of Putnam, and Bro. Larry Jordan and wife.

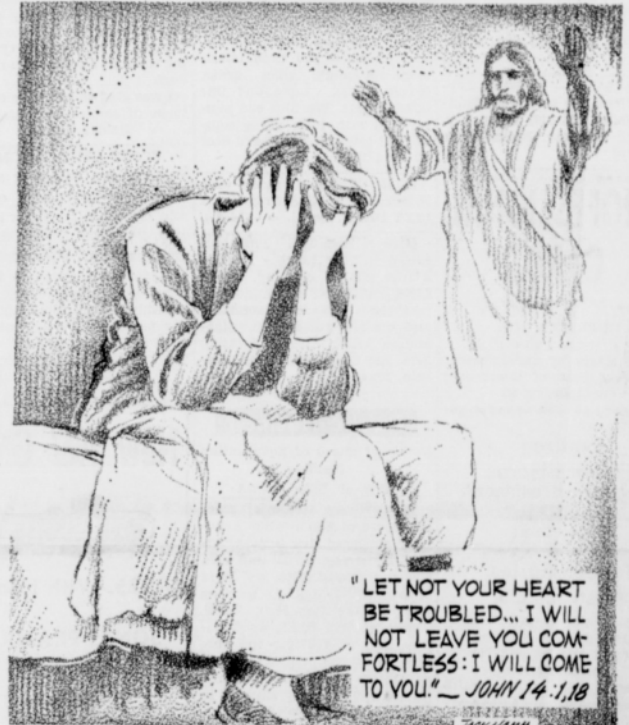

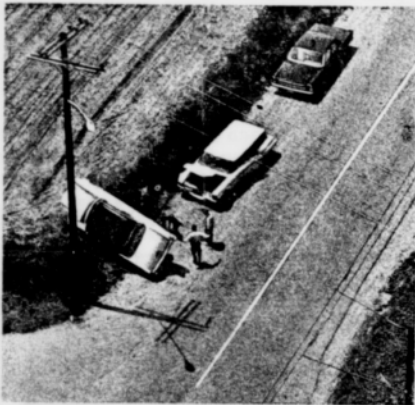

He will now proceed on to the next phase of his training under the Naval Aviation Program leading to his Navy "Wings of Gold."



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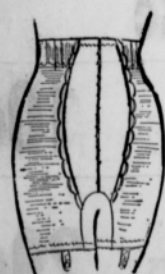

Private Receives Bronze Star

Martin Lindley, Private third class in the United States Army, has been awarded a Bronze Star Medal for action taken in Vietnam December 16, 1966.

Pvt. Lindley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Lindley of Brownfield and nephew of Mrs. Joe T. Wheat of Baird, distinguished himself by heroism in connection with military operations against and armed hostile force while serving with Troop E, 2nd Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in the Republic of Vietnam.

On this occasion, Lindley was participating in a mounted patrol in Bien Hoa Province when his armored vehicle came under enemy fire. Immediately gaining the initiative, he began to deliver an intense volume of fire on the enemy in order to permit the maneuver of the remaining armored vehicles.

Suddenly his track detonated an anti-tank mine. Although injured in the blast, Lindley continued to maintain suppressive fire on the Viet Cong.

Having been given permission to evacuate the vehicle because of fire, he voluntarily, with complete disregard for his own safety, remained with the vehicle and continued to fire on the enemy positions.

Private Lindley's heroic actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Lindley, a graduate of Eastland High School where he played football and baseball, took his basic training at Fort Polk, La., after being inducted into the Army in May, 1966. He left Fort Polk for Vietnam, where he was wounded twice and has received two Purple Hearts, in July, 1966.

He married the former Creeda Maria King, a Semonile High School graduate, in his parent's home in Brownfield in June of 1966. She has remained in Semonole during his overseas duty.
