Carl and Bennie Brown accompanied by Robert and Willie Gragson drove to Amarillo Monday on business. They also ordered supplies made for the pins.

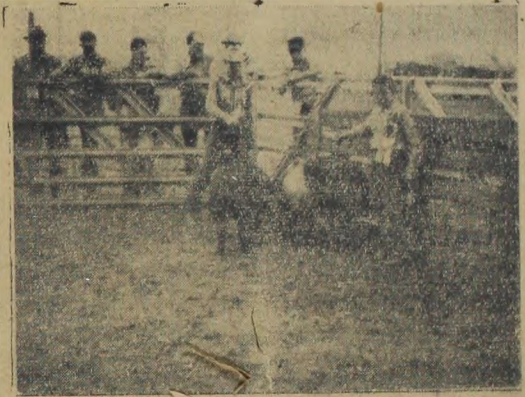
Much hard work, time and effort have been rendered this far on the building of the arena, as it is for a permanent rodeo site. We will enjoy and profit from the efforts exerted.

Irrigation Increasing In Number

IRRIGATION! The fastest growing thing in the Quitauque area. Since water has failed to come to the farmers for the past four years, the farmers are going after the water in ever increasing numbers here this year.

Not too many years ago it was thought impossible to get irrigation water in Briscoe County. In the last four to six years a few farmers have gambled and hit water suitable for irrigation and now drillers are almost a month behind in filling the demand for wells.

The farms using irrigation last year produced between one and one-half to two bales of cotton per acre. Many of the men who installed irrigation systems last year paid for them with one crop.

Because of the speed in which the program is growing and the fact that some farmers and drillers are not reporting their new wells, it is almost impossible to make an accurate and up-to-the-minute check on the entire number and location of wells.

Beginning with this issue the Post is printing a series of mystery irrigation farm pictures showing the farmers with their wells in operation. Names of the farmers, who will be referred to as Mr X., will not be revealed until the following week along with a story of their irrigation work and comments made during personal interviews.

Publication of the pictures is being sponsored by some of the local businessmen who have been invited to take part in the interviews and tours of the irrigation farms in this area.

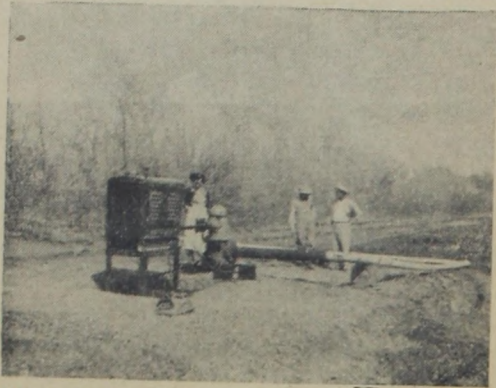
