Egg Production Will Decrease in Hot Weather

College Station. — As summer temperatures climb above 85 degrees, many poultry flocks will drop in egg production. Feed consumption will decrease & water consumption increase. Texas poultrymen should begin now to plan for adequate protection of their flocks during periods of high temperature, says Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman.

Increased water space, more effective ventilation systems, water sprays and shade are all being employed in an effort to thwart old man sun.

Normal body heat of a chicken is about 107 degrees. Chickens have no sweat glands upon therefore cannot depend upon evaporation for body cooling. This makes it necessary to take precautions during the summer to provide the birds with shade and ventilation.

About 85 percent of the sun's heat enters a poultry house as

radiated heat through the roof, says Wormell. It is important, therefore that roofing material be a light colored material that will reflect a large amount of sun rays, reducing the amount of heat absorbed by the roof. The roof should be 8 feet high at the walls and 12 to 15 feet high at the gable. This provides space for roof heat to dissipate in the ceiling area without reaching the chickens. Proper ventilation will carry heated air from the house before it reaches floor level. Roof overhang should be sufficient to keep direct sunlight off the floor and prevent radiated heat from that source.

It is wise to keep outside areas of the house free of tall grass allowing free air movement for ventilation, says Wormell. Keeping outside ground around the poultry house covered with short grass that is well watered helps prevent the warming of air moving into the poultry

house. Tall slot fences are being used to protect the northwest corner of the poultry house from the late afternoon sun. Heating of this corner of the house is reported to be a major cause of death loss during extreme heat.

Some poultrymen are using sprinkler systems or a garden hose to spray and carefully wet birds a few minutes of each hour during periods of hundred degree temperature. Good air movement is a must when the birds are wet. Otherwise stifleing humidity can develop which is harder on the birds than dry heat.

Poultrymen who are now providing facilities to give maximum protection against extremes of summer heat, will maintain a good rate of feed consumption and performance that will provide the summer profits needed for good year round

THE RIGHT - TO - WORK STATES—

In short, they protect him against coercion by either the employer or the union.

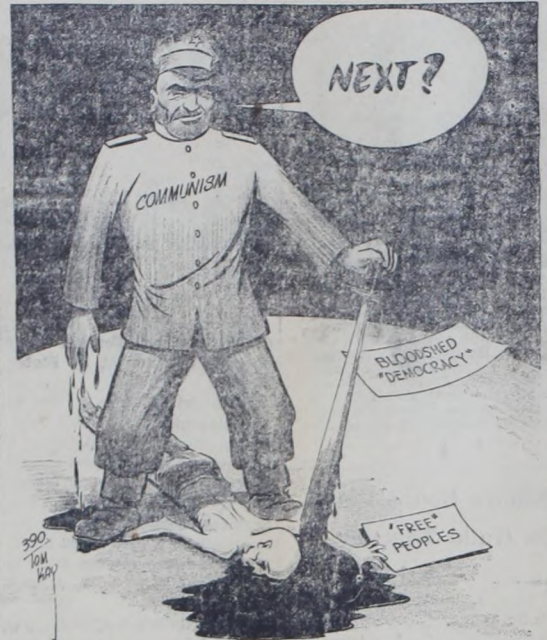
One argument against these laws is that they hurt the economy generally. But a survey made of the 12 states which have had the laws since 1947, and so have had a chance to see just what results have been, belies that absolutely. These states have matched or outstripped national average gains in such important barometers of economic health as nonfarm employment, business in operation, population growth, per capita earnings, retail sales, new construction and bank savings accounts. In some cases the differences are spectacular — — — business and personal savings, for example, increased 34 per cent more in the right-to-work states than in the others.

No one claims that the laws alone are the reason for such improvement. But the facts certainly prove that the laws in no way hurt workers or others.

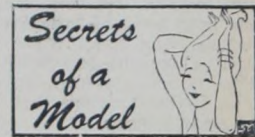
Going beyond the statistics, the truth

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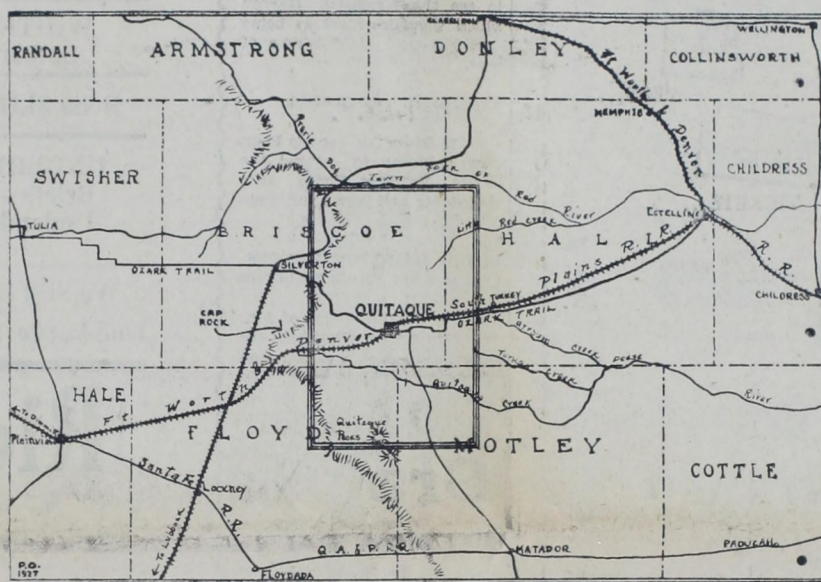
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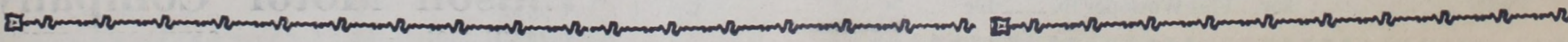
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CLARK FAMILIES RETURN FROM TRIP TO SOUTH TEXAS

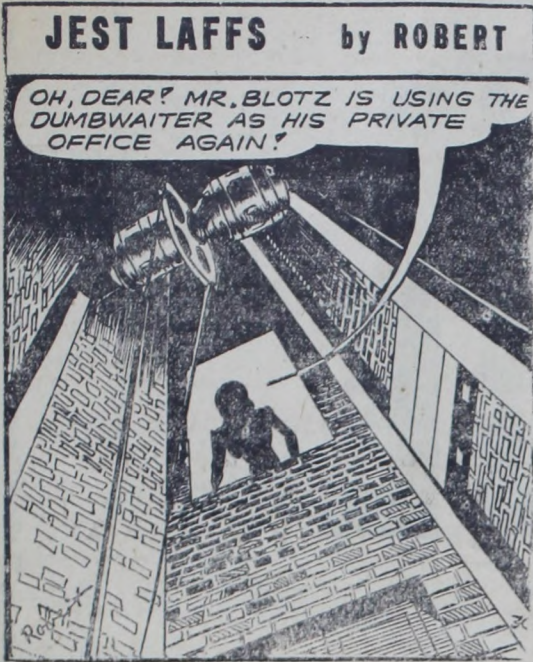

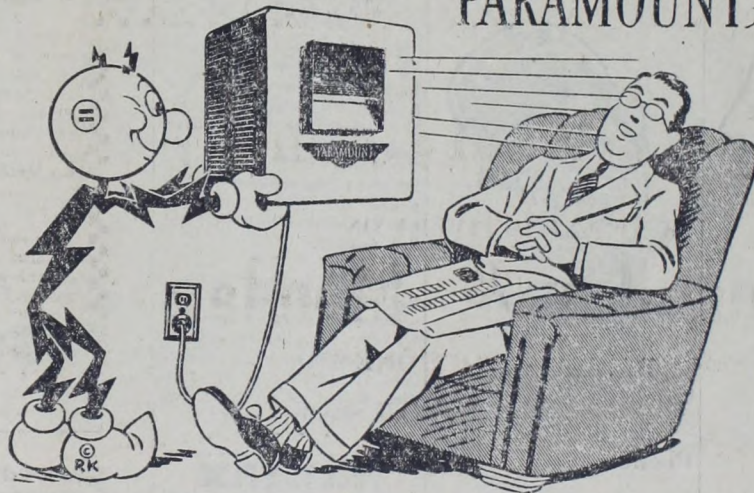

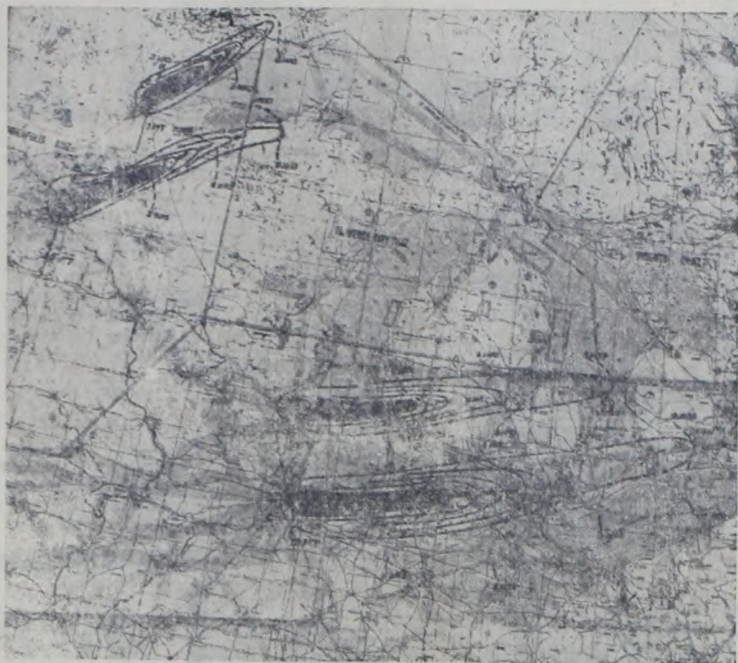
From Congressman WALTER ROGERS

RESTFUL HOLIDAY

Memorial Day was observed throughout the Washington area. Holidays are usually excellent days for Member of Congress to catch up on loose ends in the office. However, I decided that I would spend the entire day with the family. In order to plant myself firmly in their good graces, I went to the kitchen at seven o'clock to cook breakfast for them. Here I had my first hurdle of the day. I discovered that we had bacon and eggs, but no bread or toast. So, I quickly changed the menu to hot cakes. This settled the problem until I discovered that there was no syrup. I then found out that there is no way to concoct breakfast out of eggs, bacon and pancake flour, no matter what order you place them in. Not to be outdone I got into the car and went to find some small, enterprising merchant who was open on the holiday. I found one located on a main street lined with parking meters. Assuming that parking meters did not supply on holidays, I went into the store and made my purchases. Just as I was settling with the cashier, I noticed two officers who were obviously not observing Memorial Day, passing out parking tickets and headed in the direction of my car. I grabbed the groceries and made a dash for the parking meter in order to avoid being a law violator on a national holiday. soon be up and about. He told me that he had to make a trip out into the country to see a very sick patient. 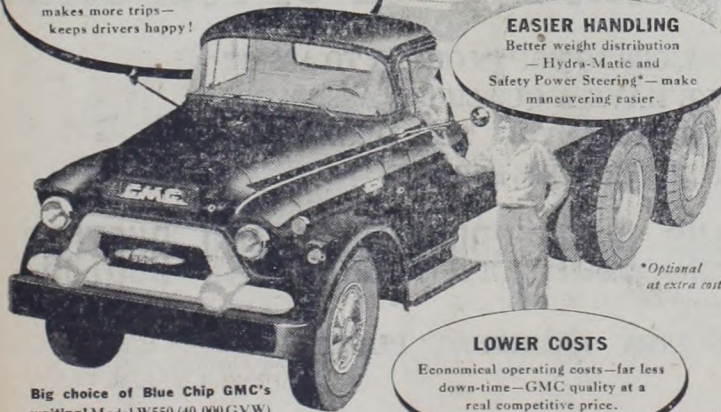
