

FROM BAD TO WORSE!

We thought (wishful thinking) that perhaps we had reached the peak in our fight to save Callahan County Hospital, but every day it grows more and more.

Callahan County Hospital has been fortunate to have, all through this mess, three nurses who were willing to tend the sick and suffering regardless of which Doctor was treating the patient. If medication was ordered, it was given, if they could be of any assistance at all, they were willing and glad to relieve the suffering.

Now two of these are gone, by Board action. When they asked for a reason for dismissal, they were told that the Board ordered their dismissal, and no explanation was forthcoming. Of course, they waited on the two "fighting doctors" patients also. Both are Callahan County residents and have been for many years. The two new nurses are from Abilene, driving back and forth to work here, and are drawing more money per month than the two residents. Doesn't make sense to me.

These two "fighting Doctors", the men who worked for every month, even had to transfer some of the \$10,000.00 Certificate of Deposit, are fighting, we'll admit, but not to control this Hospital. Neither of them would have this Hospital as a gracious gift. They are fighting a situation where a nurse questions every diagnosis, which is surely not a trait of any Registered Nurse we ever heard of. She questions medication, operations and even throws instruments when it doesn't suit her. In every hospital in Texas, the Doctor is responsible for diagnosis, operations, medications and everything else, but here they are not only questioned but their orders are changed on charts and are not carried out. Some of the nurses even refuse to give medicine or wait on their patients at all. But they are drawing their salaries to wait on the sick, regardless of race, color, or the name of a Doctor.

Coupled with the fact that the Hospital is losing money every month, even had to transfer some of the \$10,000.00 Deposit into the Operating Fund to pay expenses, and even contrary to the letters put out before election and signed by some and denied by others, our Hospital is not in a healthy condition, and it is not running smoothly.

There are as many hospital patients today in other hospitals as ever, but not here. Due to this "mess", the Doctor has permitted to get a jump or two ahead of them, and the fact that certain Doctor's patients are taboo, those who can be going to other hospitals. We don't blame them.

Baird Schools Open Tuesday, Sept. 7

The Baird Public Schools will swing the doors wide Tuesday morning, Sept. 7, with approximately 410 pupils enrolled. A slight increase over last year. Approximately 110 will be in High School with some 300 in Elementary School. Registration will take place Tuesday and classes start Wednesday morning. Buses will make their regular runs Tuesday.

Lunches will be served Wednesday with prices set at 25c for Elementary School and 30c for High School students.

Ellenburger Discovery Due For Baird Area

An Ellenburger discovery well looms for the area five miles northeast of Baird in Callahan County.

It is Wm. D. Austin, Abilene, No. 1 James L. Snyder, Section 142, BBB&C Survey.

No. 1 Snyder was drillstem tested from 4,418 to 4,448 feet in the Ellenburger. The tool was open for 30 minutes.

Gas surfaced in three minutes, and oil flowed in 18 minutes. Recovery was 1,700 feet of free oil, and 100 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was from 360 to 1,010 pounds. Shutin pressure in 30 minutes was 1,810 pounds.

Operator at last report was running pipe for completion in the Ellenburger.

It was a deepening project, having previously been abandoned by Austin below the Moran Sand. It is 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Red Horse Field.

Location for a new wildcat has been staked in the county. It is to be drilled 2 1/2 miles northeast of Clyde.

The test is The Chicago Corp. No. 1 Joel Griffin, having a proposed depth of 3,900 feet with rotary.

No. 1 Griffin spots 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of Section 82, BBB&C Survey.

Curtis Jones Well Yields 100 Barrels

Production tests were being made at E. L. Dunn, et al, of Abilene No. 1-A Curtis Jones, et al, Section 103, BBB&C Survey, located in the west city limits of Baird, Callahan County.

Operators report the project has been flowing and pumping an estimated 100 barrels per day. Production is from perforations at 1,225-34 feet in the Tannehill Sand treated with 250 gallons of acid and formation ruptured.

Casing is set at 1,309 feet, total depth.

Owners in addition to Dunn include Joe and Jack Speed of Abilene, and Jess Lord of Ft. Worth.

2759 Votes Cast In Run-Off Election

A total of 2759 votes were cast in Callahan County in the Run-off election held last Saturday. Interest was high in the Governor's race all over Texas and in the Callahan County Judge race over the county.

In the race for Governor, Ralph Yarbrough carried Callahan County with 1383 votes to Allan Shivers 1339. Few Brewster, Associate Justice Supreme Court, Place 1, received 1382 votes while opponent Alfred M. Scott polled 785 votes. Lloyd W. Davidson, Judge Court of Criminal Appeals received 2708 votes.

In the State Representative race, Paul Brashear, of Cisco, received 1548 votes to 1071 votes for Omar Burkett, also of Cisco.

For County Judge, Lester Farmer polled 1390 votes to return to office. Joe Pierce, his opponent, received 1322.

Scott Bryant was winner in the race for Commissioner, Prec. 1, with 837 votes over J. A. McKee with 603.

E. E. Shelton polled 658 votes to win the Justice of the Peace, Prec. 6 place. Lee Straley was chosen as Prec. Chairman, Prec. 17, with 55 votes with Sidney Harville getting 45 votes. Ray Bowen was elected Prec. Chairman, Prec. 18, with 3 votes.

Callahan County Due 2 Wildcats

Tom Gordon, Abilene, and associates No. 1 John Berry is to be drilled as a 1,995-foot rotary project in Callahan County.

Location is five miles northwest of Clyde and one-half mile southeast of the Three Aces Field.

It starts 947 feet from the north and 947 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter in Section 58, BBB&C Survey.

Location for a 1,995-foot rotary wildcat was staked three miles southwest of Eula as R. V. Stockton, et al, No. 1-A Wiley A. Stephens.

Site places it 845 feet from the lines of Section 54, LAL Survey.

Potential has been filed with the Railroad Commission for C&S Oil Co., Brownwood, No. 1 J. L. Dugan, Section 7, Block D, SP Survey.

Located five miles north of Clyde, it is a 2,000-foot northeast outcrop to the St. Patrick Field.

Completion was on a pump for a daily gauge of 14 barrels of oil, plus 60 percent water. Production is from 29 perforations at 1,532-35 feet. Casing is set at 1,551 feet. The hole bottomed at 1,630 feet.

Plugging report has been filed with the Railroad Commission for Fain & McGaha No. 2 C. B. Snyder, Jr., et al, Section 6, Block C, T&N Survey. It was drilled as the confirmation in the new I. X. (Conglomerate) Field. The test was a north offset to the discovery.

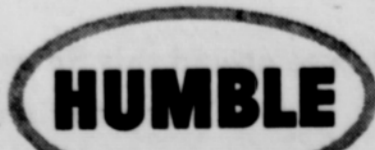

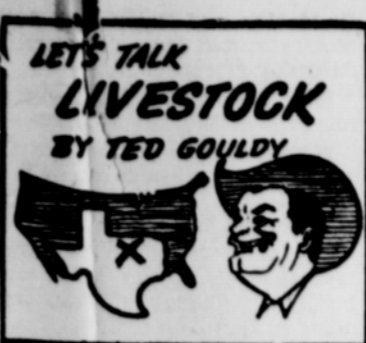

FEEDER'S OPTIMISM SUPPORTS PRICES

Movement of cattle and calves to market at Ft. Worth and all around the market circle this week was again seasonally heavy. The drought continued to pinch larger and larger portions of the Southwest and this condition brought "shipping day" to more and more farms and ranches.

For the most part the packers were singing the blues over the condition of the dressed meat trade and the fact that currently their slaughter is running far behind a year ago at Ft. Worth and other Southwestern packing centers.

This gloomy mental attitude was not shared by the buyers of stocker and feeder cattle and calves. Order buyers and dealers at Ft. Worth said they could use many more high quality stockers and feeders than they are getting in the runs, and it appeared that feeding of cattle in the 1954-55 season would be at a heavy rate.

Corn Belt and Western States feeders had a good year last year with estimated profits by the USDA running between \$30 to \$40 per head. While this was above average, the spread between feeder costs and fat cattle prices has narrowed somewhat this year, the feeders were apparently able to see a favorable margin still.

This served to take thousands of calves and yearlings out of packer channels and into stocker and feeder channels. At Ft. Worth Monday, the good and choice quality stocker calves and yearlings drew \$15 to \$19, a few calves higher, older steers and long aged yearlings drew \$18 downward.

Slaughter calves were bid lower and in many cases sold well below last week's high time. Cows were steady to 50 cents lower, most of the more desirable kinds selling pretty near steady and the junkier and excessively grossy kinds taking the dip. Bulls were weak to 50 cents lower and sold fully \$1 below two weeks ago. Fat steers and yearlings drew steady prices, with choice fat kinds topped in the \$20 to \$23 bracket.

HOG PRICES TUMBLE; LOWEST IN WEEKS

Top hogs sold at \$21.75 at Ft. Worth Monday, a break of 75 cents per hundred under last week's close. This was the lowest point in several weeks.

Packers reported pork sales were lagging and pointed to breaks in wholesale pork prices last week of from \$4 to \$9 per hundred at some of the Eastern population centers.

Supplies of hogs were increasing seasonally to some extent, but it appeared the pork was running into a combination of hot weather and liberal supplies of other kinds of meat as the principal factors in their downfall.

Packers pointed out that a heavy percentage of the hog requires some time to cure and process and with the Fall season at hand and its increased supplies coming up the long-term view on pork prices was definitely inclining downward barring unforeseen developments.

SHEEP AND LAMBS HOLD STEADY AT FT. WORTH

Despite lowered dressed meat reports from Midwest and from Eastern centers, in the past several days the lambs and sheep held steady at Ft. Worth. Some steady support from the stocker and feeder buyers was a prop under the market as was the fact that receipts were rather light. There was steady demand for breeding types of ewes when they had quality and were of suitable ages to go back to the country.

Good and choice fat lambs topped at \$18 to \$19, and were considered by the trade as quotable to \$20 and \$21 when they were suitably fat and conditioned. Stocker and feeder lambs were quotable around \$12 to \$16. Slaughter ewes sold from \$3.50 to \$6 and stocker ewes ranged from \$6 to \$10, a sizable string of good ewes at \$16 going back to the country from Ft. Worth Monday that averaged 215 pounds.

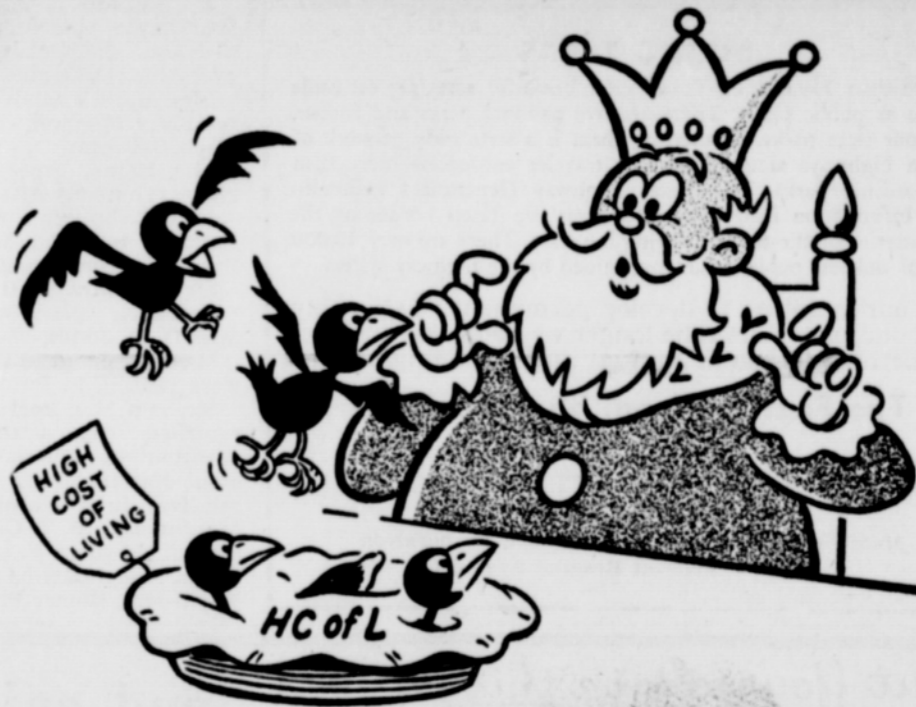

Easy Icebox Cookies

Broadcast: September 4, 1954

1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup soft shortening
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup soft shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup Pet Evaporated Milk

Sift together onto a piece of paper the flour, baking powder and salt. Put shortening into a 1 1/2-quart bowl. Add sugar and vanilla and mix until light and fluffy. Stir in about 1/2 of flour mixture. Then stir in about half of the milk. Stir in about 1/2 of rest of the flour mixture. Then stir in rest of milk. Add flour mixture that is left and mix well. If dough is soft, chill before shaping. Divide dough into 2 portions. Shape each portion into a roll 6 inches long. Wrap separately in waxed paper. Chill at least 2 hours, or overnight. When dough is firm, cut into 1/4-inch slices. Put slices on a greased, flat cookie pan. Bake on top rack of 375 oven (high moderate) 10 minutes, or until light brown. Makes 4 dozen.
