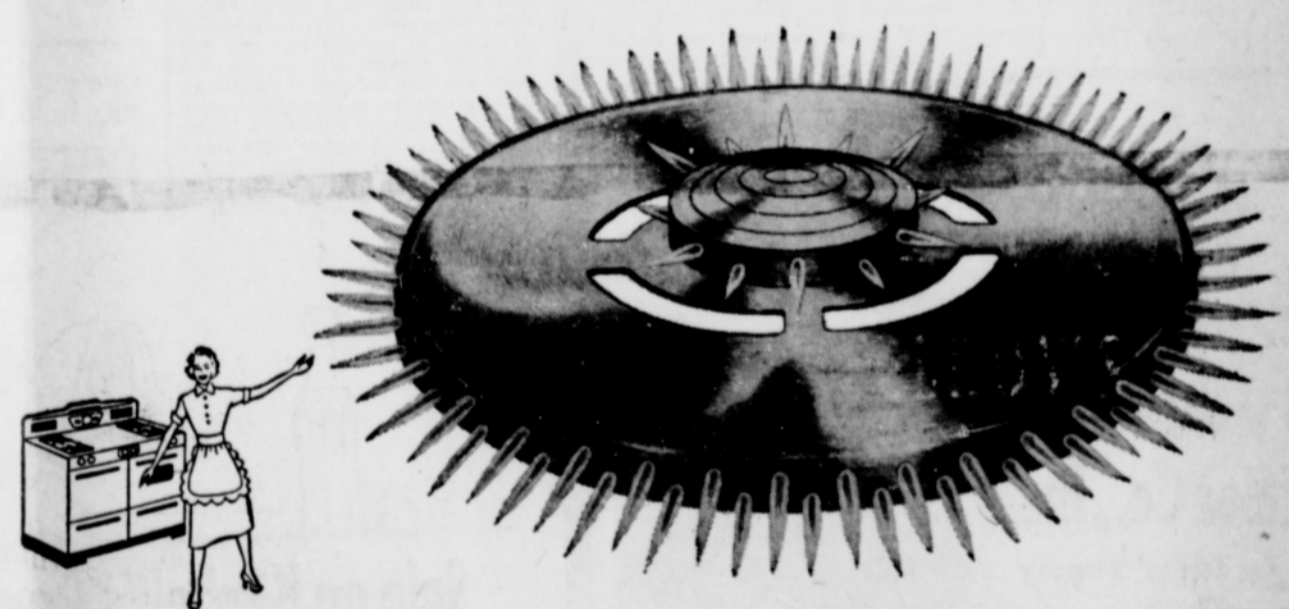

### Chicken Industry Crowding About Gains

Like the old gray mare, Biddy isn't what she used to be.

And Sunday, a flock of people who make it their business to know chickens gathered in Hotel Adolphus to scratch around for the latest information and maybe crow a little over the recent achievements.

The third annual convention of the Southwestern Association of Poultry, Eggs and Allied Industries was under way, with a day to go.

Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas processors were on hand. Esir Ablon of Dallas heads the six-state association.

Ablon crowed a little Sunday. Employees no longer sit by the hour and pick the feathers from chickens, he said. It's done by machine now, in assembly-line fashion.

"And today's chickens are more wholesome," he said, "because of a better scalding process."

Chickens used to be hand-scalded in 180-degree water before picking. Now, Ablon pointed out, they are doused in merely lukewarm water. And today, he added, chicken cleaning is one of the world's most sanitary food processing procedures.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

#### Sausage Macaroni Bake

- 1 cup small elbow macaroni
- 4 cups boiling water (can omit)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 cup fat
- 1 1/2 cups diced American cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard (can omit)
- 1 lb. bulk pork sausage
- 1/4 cup finely cut onion

Cook macaroni until tender in boiling water and salt. Drain macaroni, but do not rinse. Add milk, cheese and mustard. Mix well. Pour into a greased baking dish holding about 6 cups. Cook sausage and onion in a skillet over low heat about 10 minutes. Stir with a fork while browning to break up the sausage. Drain off fat. Spoon sausage and onion on top of macaroni mixture in baking dish. Bake on rack slightly below center of 350 oven (moderate) about 30 minutes, or until bubbly hot. Serve hot from the baking dish. Makes 4 servings.
