## SOMETHING . . . . To Think About

Dear Editor:

We hope you heard Paul Harvey broadcasting over the ABC network from Chicago on Sunday night, August 14th. But whether you did or not, we think you will want to have the gist of his report to the nation on the Soviet's "new look."

"I am going to repeat Mr. Manuisky's words once more," said Mr. Harvey. "I have such a few minutes here. There are so many hours and days and weeks that you will be exposed to the smile and the hypnotic soft talk and the lullaby . . .

"Twenty-four years ago in Moscow he said: "War to the hilt between Communism and Capitalism is inevitable. Today, of course, we are not strong enough to attack. Our time will come in 20 or 30 years. To win we shall need the element of surprise. The bourgeoisie (that's you and me) will have to be put to sleep. So we shall begin by launching the most spectacular peace movement on record. There will be electrifying overtures and unheard-of concessions. The Capitalist countries, stupid and decadent, will rejoice to cooperate in their own destruction. "So brash was his plan that we sat in stunned disbelief. Then, incredulous, we shrugged and yawned and went to sleep . . .

"Until just a few million lives too late."

The Board of Supervisors of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District has set up a field day next Tuesday afternoon on the No. 3 Long farm in the Dreesy community.

The demonstration will include the use of legumes and seeding with special equipment. The election of a supervisor from Zone 2 immediately after the demonstration begins at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 4.

The Cross Plains Ins Implement Co. will furnish the equipment and seeding the winter legume.

Following the demonstration the landowners present will elect a supervisor from the zone, which is that part of Callahan County that drains into the Colorado River. All landowners in the zone are urged to ballot for a supervisor.

Landowners who have represented the zone on the board previously include A. E. Young and Rufus Miller. Cross Plains is now serving as supervisor from Zone 2. The supervisor elected will serve a five-year term with the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District.

### Montgomery Trial Continues In Abilene

Twenty-eight witnesses have been placed on the witness stand as the state completes its case Wednesday against John D. Montgomery, Cross Plains farmer, charged with murder of his wife on Feb. 2 of this year.

The trial is being held before Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge, in 42nd Dist. Court, Abilene. Montgomery was tried in Baird on March 7-10, but the jury failed to reach a verdict.

Testimony was resumed at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, as the trial enters its fourth day. Defense lawyers Dallas and Davis Scarborough began their efforts to prove Montgomery innocent before a jury of 11 men and 1 woman.

Giddens (1,900 Sand) Field five miles northwest of Putnam in Callahan County has gained a new well.

It is Trumter Petroleum Corp. of Ft. Worth No. 9 Fred Hart, Section 7, D&A Survey. Daily potential was 61.12 barrels of 38 gravity oil and 47 per cent water. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,906½-21 feet.

Four projects were announced for the McGraw (Cross Plains Sand) Field 4½ miles west of Cross Plains. They are slated for 1,700 feet with rotary.

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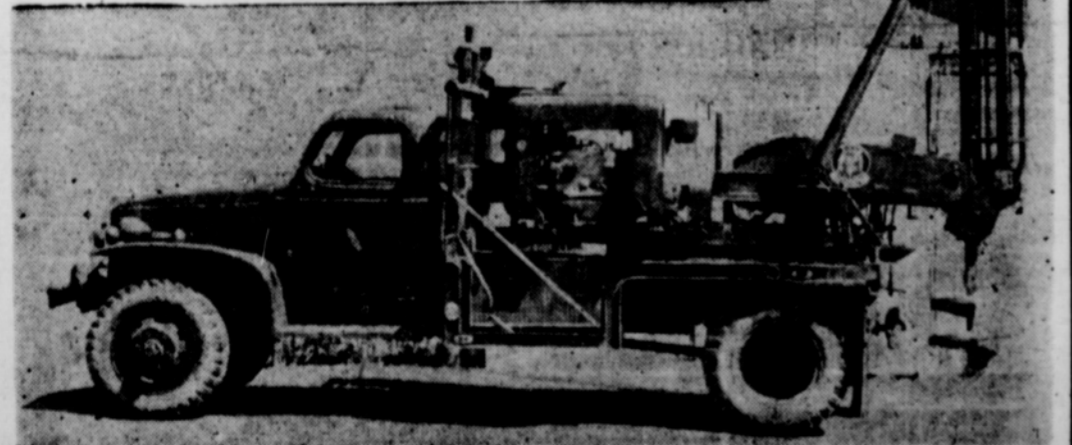
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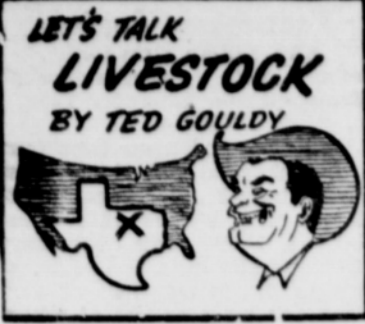
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This higher surge carried slaughter kinds upward as stocker buyers invaded the classes that have been selling largely for slaughter.

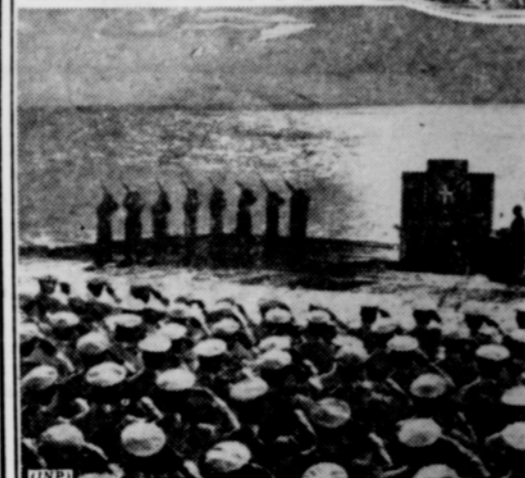
