Former Hall County Hospital Administrator Killed In Plane Crash Near Bastrop County

Two hospital administrators and a hospital board member from Perryton, and a Booker physician were killed early Friday when the light plane in which they were flying crashed in a field in Bastrop County about 25 miles east of Austin.

Jerry Leon Weatherly, 44; Donald Douglas Holmes, 36; and Roy Henry Grunden, 34, all of Perryton, and Dr. V. S.

Christopher, 41, of Booker died in the crash, said Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman Mike Cox.

The men were flying from Perryton to Austin for a Texas Medical Foundation conference, said Lawrence Ellzey, board president of Ochiltree General Hospital.

Witnesses told Bastrop County sheriff's deputies on the scene they heard the

plane's engine sputter, and said it appeared the pilot was trying to land in the field, said County Sheriff J. Beggs.

The engine stalled and the plane flipped and crashed nose down, the witnesses said. The plane broke into pieces on impact, and the propeller was buried in the ground.

The Federal Aviation Administration called DPS at

8:43 a.m. Friday shortly after losing radar and radio contact with the plane.

A DPS helicopter happened to be in the area on a training mission, and the pilot radioed that he spotted the crash at 8:51 a.m. Officers arrived on the scene approximately 10 minutes later.

Weatherly was Ochiltree County hospital administrator, and was a native of Hall County, growing up around Turkey. Grunden, a native of Cheyenne, Wyo., was nursing administrator at the Perryton facility, where he had moved last summer from Childress.

Christopher, a native of India, had a family practice clinic and had just established a nursing facility in Booker. He was piloting the plane.

Holmes, an X-ray technician, served on the board of directors of Ochiltree General.

Their deaths were a great loss to the community, a spokesman said.

Appraisal District Has Hopes For Computer

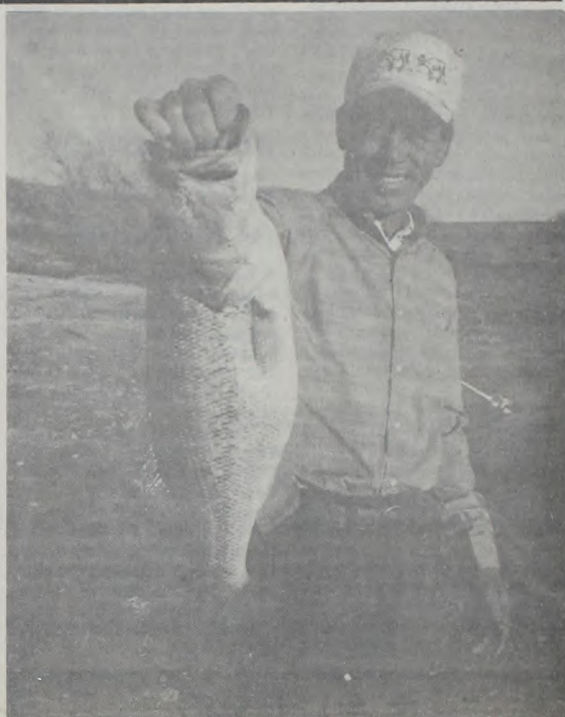
This will be a good show with lots of competitive kids.

Poached Fish

Summer memories are made from a meal of fresh fish, ice tea, corn-on-the-cob, salad and watermelon. This recipe uses common pantry items that you'll more than likely have on hand when you've suddenly got a fresh catch.

- 2 lbs. fish fillets, skinned
- 2 tbsp. oil
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup chopped celery
- 2 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 cup hot water or white wine
- 1 cup parsley
- 2 sprigs parsley

In a large shallow pan, saute the onion and celery in oil until tender. Place skinned fillets on top of vegetables, or roll each fillet, secure with a toothpick, and place on vegetables. Add water or wine and seasonings. Cover and simmer about 8 minutes, or until fish flakes when tested with a fork.

Carefully transfer fillets to a heated platter. Serve with a heart-healthy lemon parsley sauce or horseradish sauce.

Yield: 8 Servings

Fish tip: If you catch your fish in the market, look for firm flesh, shiny scales and bright, protruding eyes. Use within two days of purchase.

Search For Infant's Body Draws Blank

A search for the body of an infant reported seen at a roadside park last week turned up no body, and no other leads, Bristow County Sheriff Dick Roehr said Friday.

A man who claimed he saw the body of an infant in a trash bin at a roadside park on state Highway 86 between Silverton and Quitaque on Monday contacted authorities Thursday afternoon. The man began feeling guilty about the incident, Roehr said.

The delay may have cost authorities any chance of finding the body, if it indeed exists.

Roehr said he is convinced the man is telling the truth, but trash from the roadside parks is removed by a private firm contracting with the Texas Highway Department, and incinerated and buried at either Pampa or Memphis.

Roehr and Pampa police officers, aided by heavy equipment and jail trustees, made a thorough search of the Pampa landfill, Roehr said, but found no human remains. The incineration schedule at Memphis left no chance of finding a body that would have been taken there earlier in the week, he said.

The man reporting the incident told authorities the sighting scared him, and he didn't want to become involved. Roehr said he doubted he would charge the man with a crime because he had cooperated in the investigation since reporting the sighting. The body was described as an infant or near-term fetus, possible Hispanic.

Social Security Administration News

Most Social Security benefits to dependents or survivors of retired, disabled, or deceased workers end if the person divorces or remarries. But benefits to disabled widows and widowers 50-59, and to widows and widowers 60 or older can continue upon remarriage.

The same rule applies to disabled surviving divorced spouses 50-59 and to surviving divorced spouses 60 or older.

Benefits to a child getting checks because he or she is under 18, or 19 if a student, or disabled will generally end if the child marries. Checks to a spouse getting benefits on the record of a retired or disabled worker will end if the marriage ends in divorce unless the spouse is 62 or older and the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Checks for a widowed mother or father getting benefits because she or he is caring for an entitled

child will end if the parent remarries.

There is an exception to these general rules. If an otherwise eligible person receiving benefits as a widow, widower, or adult disabled in childhood marries a person also getting one of these benefits she or he can continue to get benefits.

Benefits will also continue if a person receiving benefits as a widowed mother or father or adult disabled in childhood marries a person getting benefits as a retired or disabled worker. A retired or disabled worker's benefits are never affected if he or she marries or divorces.

More information about how divorce, marriage, or remarriage affect Social Security benefits can

be obtained at any Social Security office.
