The information also will be of interest to financial institution representatives, city planners, and county officials, as well as farmers and business leaders.

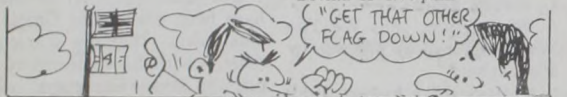

## Action Taken By City Council

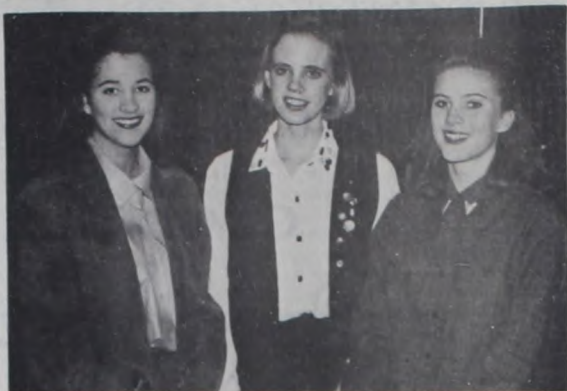
The Quitaque City Council met in a regular meeting on December 3, 1990. Action taken during this meeting included the passing of an ordinance defining the duties, powers, and responsibilities of the mayor and councilmembers and outlining procedures for adopting motions, resolutions, and ordinances. This ordinance repealed and updated the first ordinance of the City of Quitaque passed in 1927.

Also passed was an ordinance establishing an active and continuing records management program prescribing policies and procedures consistent with the Local Government Records Act.

Other action included the authorization of the purchase of a computer billing system for the City, and the establishment of a 10 percent delinquent charge to be charged to past due utility bills. This delinquent charge will be placed on all utility bills not paid by the 15th of the month and will become effective January 15, 1991.

## Public Urged To Take Precautions For Cold And Flu

According to Marlene Whitehead, R.N., of the Methodist Hospital Employee Health Department, the best way to prevent the flu is to have an influenza vaccination between September and December. Vaccinations are available through emergency clinics, doctor's offices and the health department; However, they all have certain requirements as to when they give vaccinations. Be sure and call ahead for an appointment.

No vaccinations are available to guard against colds. Whitehead suggests taking these steps to protect yourself from the sniffles:

**Go easy on stress.** The immunity system sags as the stress level soars.

Taking control of the stressors in your life is good for overall health, too.

**Get plenty of vitamins A and C.** Research suggests these vitamins kill cold bugs before they can inflict their bite. Vitamin A is abundant in fresh vegetables. Some excellent sources of vitamin C are citrus fruits, potatoes and tomatoes.

**Wash your hands frequently.** Colds are caught from viruses picked up from such things as door knobs, telephone receivers and handshakes.

**Don't smoke.** Smoking drains the body of vitamin C. It also stuns the tiny hairlike projections known as cilia, which keep airborne invaders from entering the lungs.

Don't confuse the symptoms of the flu with those of a cold. The flu usually hits more quickly than a cold and is usually accompanied by a fever and aches and pains.

## Pesticide Applicators Last Chance For CEU To Be December 13

One of the last chances this year for commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators to earn necessary continuing education units (CEUs) to comply with state requirements will be offered in Lubbock on December 13.

A one-day training workshop will be conducted from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the Lubbock airport. The center is on FM 1294 just east of 1-27 at the Shallowater exit.

The training has been approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for five CEUs, according to Curtis Preston, County Extension agent of Briscoe County. There is a \$10 fee for the training.

Commercial and non-commercial applicators are required by the TDA to receive five CEUs a year to retain certification. Private applicators will have until December 31, 1995 to receive a total of 15 CEUs.

Several county leaders were involved in developing these programs after many hours of planning. Their many hours of dedication are appreciated.

Agricultural profitability is a key issue that was identified in the 1987-1990 Long Range Extension Program. Agricultural related income for 1987 was estimated at 26.6 million dollars, for 1991 agricultural related income is projected at 22 million dollars.

Several factors contribute to the drop in agricultural income. Through educational programs, demonstrations, field day, and short courses, the Extension service can help agriculture producers reduce costs and maximize profits.

Some key issues that were identified for the 1991-1994 Long Range Extension Program were: Improving Agriculture Profitability, Wildlife Management, Marketing County Tourism and Recreation Assets, Building Positive Youth Values, and Improving Health Care and Nutrition.

Major educational programs planned for 1991 are: general futures and options workshop; crop insect management clinic, and an irrigation workshop.
