## Irrigation Well Evaluation Offered By SCS

Natural gas prices have skyrocketed, and electric costs are not far behind. This, along with the steady drop in the water table, has caused drastic financial problems for local farmers. In

order to stay in farming, farmers are forced to become more efficient.

The Soil Conservation Service is doing irrigation well "pumping plant evaluations" to help farmers increase their efficiency. In some cases the savings in fuel cost in one year has more than paid for the cost of changing to a smaller size pump.

"Call or come by the SCS office and ask about our pumping plant evaluations. We will be glad to assist you in any way we can," says David Kellum, who is with the Soil Conservation Service. The phone number is 823-2320.

## Hamilton To Join Horsemen On Trail To Aid Head-Injury Victims

Leroy Hamilton plans to join the horsemen on the trail to aid head-injury victims. There will be approximately 130 riders on the trail for two days, and Leroy is very enthused about the opportunity.

The Randall County Sheriff's Posse announced the First Panhandle Heritage Memorial Trail-ride May 26-27 in an effort to raise funds for the Panhandle

Chapter of the Texas Head Injury Foundation. This is a non-profit organization which is in need of funds to establish adequate rehabilitation programs fostering a return to independent living for victims. All proceeds will be donated.

The ride will begin at 7:30 a.m. May 26 with a chuckwagon breakfast at the Tom Christian Ranch located 14 miles southwest of Claude. A pre-breakfast meeting of all qualified riders will be held to form travel groups of 25 to 30 riders.

The ride will start at 9:00 a.m., heading first down the north side of Palo Duro Canyon onto Dry Creek Trail, and proceeding southeasterly until reaching the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River. Riders will follow the river bed in an easterly direction and should reach highway 207 around lunchtime. After a short lunch break, groups will follow the river until overnight camp is reached.

Breakfast on Sunday will be at 7:30 a.m. with the ride scheduled to resume at 9:00 a.m. Shortly after a trail ration lunch, groups will leave the river and travel south until exiting from private property onto a county road. This county road will take riders to the gate at the back of Caprock Canyons State Park, where a park trail will be followed to horse corrals about three miles into the park, the end of the trail.

Sponsors for the ride are First National Bank, Quitaque, Rice Dry Goods, Quitaque Gin, Merrell Food and Valley Farm Store.

Refreshments of coffee and coffeecakes were served.

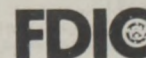
