Elections Held Last Saturday

There were a total of 70 who voted Saturday in the City of Turkey election, with four absentee votes also. For Place 2, Arlowene Williams received 58 votes and Marjorie Bain got 59 for Place 3. Place 5 had two persons, running. Lorene Setliff won over Steve Farley, 39-33.

In the School Trustee election, Jarrell Rice received 58 Turkey votes and Murry Wayne Morrison, 59. These were both incumbents. There were several write-

in votes cast.

In Quitaque only 36 votes were cast. The incumbents for the City Council were Murry Morrison, 35; O. R. Stark, 36, and Elgin Conner, 36.

The Valley School voting at Quitaque gave incumbent Murry Wayne Morrison 98 votes and Jarrell Rice, also an incumbent, 98 votes, with five write-in votes cast for five different individuals. The total votes cast in the school election were 105, with 38 from Quitaque and 66 from Turkey.

Unusual Weather For April

The snow storm Monday night seemed a bit unusual for the month of April. Your Turkey editor recalls 45 years ago, on April 8, 1938, when there was a "real biggy" of a snow storm that lasted about two or three days in Lipscomb County. But as stories were being exchanged with Johnny Peery, his snow story for Turkey was really bad. Many of you "old timers" may remember about that one. Anyway, we need not be surprised as our weather patterns seem to be changing.

In Quitaque, rain and snow measuring .50 of an inch of moisture was received April 1, then Monday, April 4, there was a ground cover of snow which left .10 of an inch of moisture.

The Quitaque editor adds her story to the ones from Turkey. In 1935, the year your editor graduated from high school, there was a red sandstorm preceding a snow that covered the ground on May 6. It could happen again!

In the 800 relay, Valley took second place with 1:57.8. The girls were Mary Dowd, D'Anna Smith, Karen Ramsey and Karen Clinton.

Candy Jones took first place in the 100 meter dash with 13.2 and Karen Ramsey took second place with 13.4.

In the 200 meter dash, Candy took first place again, with 28.1 and Karen Clinton took third with 29.6.

D'Anna Smith took first place in the shot put with 32'7/4".

Candy Jones took first place in the long jump with 15'5" and second in the triple jump with 30'0".

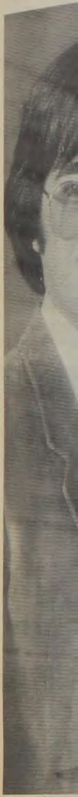

Turkey UMW Begins Study

The Turkey United Methodist Women began the study of The Pacific Islands Monday, April 4, in the chapel of the church. Faye Armstrong, leader, gave a very interesting and informative overview of the study. She displayed a number of articles she and her husband had brought back from their missionary service in Hawaii and Indonesia. These articles were arranged artistically around the room and on tables.

Mrs. Armstrong explained that the many islands are usually divided into three groups, Micronesia, which means "Little Islands" including the Mariana, the Gilbert, Marshall and Caroline Islands, which many people remember hearing about from World War II days and several from this area served in the Armed Forces at these places. The Melanesia group is another, the word meaning "black" consisting of New Guinea, Fiji and the Solomon Islands. The people live in small isolated villages in the hot, humid jungles. The other group is called Polynesia and includes Hawaii, Western and

American Samoa, Tonga and the Cook Islands. She said the rainfall was from 10 to 476 inches a year. She mentioned that the island in Hawaii where Melinda Hinkson grew up was one of the

islands that had 476 inches of rainfall. These Pacific islands represent 700 languages and 29 million square kilometers.

The president, Fredia Fuston, presided over a short business

session. Totsey Bain gave the opening prayer and Kathleen Green gave a devotional on Stewardship of time, strength, love, hope, courage and comfort to others. Some plans were

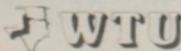

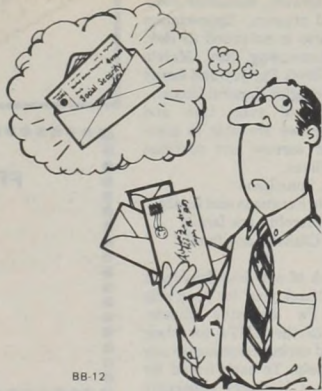
