Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church at Albany Sunday afternoon, Rev. H. M. Weldon, the pastor officiating.

Mr. Tollett is survived by his wife, the former Ethel Taylor of Baird to whom he was married Nov. 23 1933 and one son, Hubert Wayne, also one son J. R. Jr. and four daughters, Mrs. Bobbie Laru Baker, Galveston, Mrs. Stanley Irwin and Mrs. Lodella Green of Albany, all children by a former marriage. He is also survived by two brothers, F. M. and Elmer Tollett. Mrs. A. Tollett his step-mother of Baird and eight half brothers.

John Robert Tollett was born Jan. 23, 1884 at Woodson.

With the exception of two year residence in Big Spring he lived the remainder of his life in Baird Putnam, Cisco and Albany. He was deputy sheriff in Baird and Putnam for nine years and was elected constable of precinct No. 8 in Callahan county in 1929.

He joined the Pentecostal church at Fort Griffin 25 years ago, and was a member of the Masonic lodge.

Baird Faces Water Shortage

The water situation in Baird is becoming more serious each day and restriction of use of water for domestic purposes only may become necessary to prevent a water famine.

This is the most serious water shortage Baird has experienced since the present system was installed.

The City wells in the timber west of the city has furnished an adequate supply of water for all purposes but due to the increasing usage of water and the dry weather the past several weeks the supply is running short.

The city officials have asked that all conserve the water supply that no water be used for irrigating of lawns shrubby etc.

Jerry Laman Buried In Tennessee

FSA Farm Purchase Loans For Tenants

The Farm Security Administration is bringing its farm purchase program to Callahan County for the first time this year and tenant farmers who aspire to own land may make application now. No applications will be taken after August 31st 1940, it was announced today by the FSA Supervisor James S. McKnight.

Application blanks for these loans, made under provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, may be obtained at the FSA office located on the 3rd floor of the Courthouse in Baird Texas.

The loans are repayable over a 40-year period at three percent interest. A variable payment plan, whereby the payments are smaller in poor years and larger in good years, is provided. "This method of financing farm ownership is successful, the supervisor said, "as is being demonstrated by some 1,000 farmers in Texas who have received these loans and as a group have repaired more on them than has come due." No down payment is required, Mr. McKnight said.

"This program started small he stated "with a national appropriation in 1937 of only \$10,000,000 to cover the United States. As its success has been demonstrated this fund has been increased. The current session of Congress authorized \$50,000,000.

Farmers to whom loans are made are chosen by a committee of county farmers.

T & P Ry. Consolidate Divisions

Elimination of one of the three divisions of the Texas and Pacific Railroad and establishment of the operations headquarters of two divisions at Fort Worth were announced Wednesday by A. L. Chester, vice president of the road with officers in Dallas.

Chester said, effective Aug 1 the T & P would have two divisions, the western and eastern, and the superintendents of both would be located in Fort Worth. Heretofore the road has had three divisions, the Fort Worth, with headquarters there the Rio Grande, with headquarters at Big Spring, and the Louisiana, with headquarters at Alexandria.

L. L. Oliver, former superintendent of the Fort Worth division, will be in charge of the new western division, which includes Fort Worth and all territory west.

J. G. Brannon, former superintendent of the Louisiana division will be in charge of the eastern division, including all territory north and east of Fort Worth.

A. E. Pistole former superintendent of the Big Spring division will be assigned as a special representative of the road offices in Dallas.

Division forces will be adjusted in line with the above changes. J. E. Friend, master mechanic at Big Spring, has gone to Fort Worth as master mechanic of the Western division, and the general roadmaster (track department) of the Rio Grande division L. R. Stevens has gone to Fort Worth as general roadmaster of the Western division.

H. C. Vinsant, located at Fort Worth as master mechanic of the Fort Worth division, will be transferred to Marshall as road master of the Eastern division. F. R. Denney, former master mechanic of the Louisiana division, will be promoted to mechanical superintendent of the Eastern division and will be located at Dallas.

General roadmaster of the Eastern division will be R. J. Gammie former roadmaster of the Fort Worth division. His headquarters will remain in Fort Worth.

The shops will remain in their present locations, but clerical workers at Alexandria and Big Spring will be transferred to Fort Worth.
