Patriot's Homecoming Is Roaring Success

The Valley Patriots overcame a strong offensive effort by the Northside Indians to post a 63-57 homecoming win Friday at Patriot Field.

A 44-yard touchdown run by the Indians' Jason Watt and Brandon Morris's successful PAT combined for an Indian lead of 8-0.

Valley's Kirk Garner then took it in from the 1-yard line to close the gap to two points. The kick was no good. Bubba Clardy tackled Jason Watt in the end zone for a safety to tie the game, and with 59 seconds left in the first quarter, Garner took a quick pitch around right end and went 43 yds for the score. The kick failed.

Northside was determined to stay in the game as Watts ran in from 9 yards out. The kick was good and the Indians had the lead again 14-16.

Clay Edwards hit paydirt for the first time of the game with a 66-yard run; the kick failed, but Valley had the lead.

Watts then ran 22 yards to give the lead back to the Indians.

With 1:07 left, Bradley Price hit Chad Powell on a 7 yard touchdown pass. The kick failed but the lead was back in Valley's hands 26-24.

Northside was able to get one more score with a 1-yard run by Morris, and with no time on the clock Northside had a 26-30 lead. Morris scored again with a 1-yard run and kicked the extra

points to increase their lead to 12 points.

Price then hit Cory Pointer on a 6-yard pass and the kick was good by Ron Brittan to bring Valley within 4 points. Edwards

scored on a 14-yard run and the kick was good. Valley took the lead 42-38.

Northside's Morris ran in from 6 yards to regain the lead,

and after a 48-yard punt by Jason Smith, Jason Watt went 74 yards for another touchdown and a 50-42 lead.

Clay Edwards then ran in

from 52 yards, the kick by Brittan was good and things were all tied up. Bubba Clardy went in from 12 yards out to give

Valley the lead, but with only 2:16 to go, Morris tied the game at 56 each. Northside failed the extra point and threw for a 1 point conversion and a 57-56 lead.

With only 1:16 left in the game, Clardy gave Valley the lead for good with a 15 yard touchdown run.

Jason Smith intercepted a pass to end the last drive for Northside.

Merrell Homeplace Given Family Heritage Award

Mr. and Mrs. Truman Merrell and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Taylor were in Austin recently where they were presented a Texas Family Land Heritage certificate for the Merrell Homeplace founded in 1890 in Floyd County.

Jim Hightower, Texas Agriculture Commissioner was present for the ceremony. The program, sponsored by the TDA, honors farm and ranch families who have kept their land in continuous agriculture production for a century or more.

In this year's 17th annual Family Land Heritage Program, the TDA honored 117 Texas farm and ranch families from 76 different counties.

The ceremony marked the first time that properties from Cameron, Floyd, Irion and Kent counties were honored.

The Merrell Homeplace was founded by David and Mary Frances Merrell in 1889, but the first documented proof was April 4, 1890. Floyd County was formed in 1890.

The Merrells moved to Floyd County from San Saba. Warren and Johnnie Merrell lived on the homeplace until their death. Truman and Melba Jo then moved to the big house, having already been living on the place since they married in 1950.

Hightower told the audience of approximately 550 who attended the ceremony at the LBJ Library on the University of Texas campus, "The achievement of these productive agriculture families is remarkable indeed. You and your ancestors have nourished the land to produce crops and livestock for 100 years."

He continued, "Your devotion to the land proves you are protectors of the land, keeping it productive for future family members to inherit. We are here today to thank you for your hard work and dedication."

In addition to the certificate, honorees are entitled to purchase from TDA a metal gate sign designating their property as a "Texas Century Ranch."

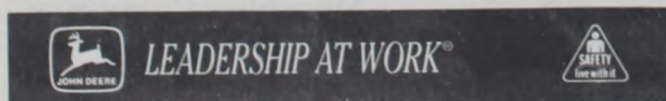

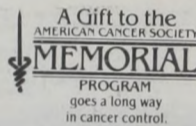
