## Public Hears Plans For TCDP Funding

A public hearing was held September 21, 1987, by the City of Quitaque, to inform the public of the funding available for community development, of all eligible activities under the Texas Community Development Program, and the use of the past TCDP contract funds.

Mayor Merrell called the meeting to order, and introduced Judy Munden of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission who explained the TCDP grant process. Ms. Munden also told the group what funds would be available for this region, what activities would be eligible, and what past TCDP funding was used for by the City of Quitaque.

The grants are to serve two objectives, Ms. Munden said. First, they are to benefit low-mod income persons, and second, they are to fund projects

which are emergencies in nature.

She also announced that October 1, 1987 is the meeting date for the Regional review committee, and December 3, 1987, is the application deadline.

David Brunson, city secretary, told of the project pro-

posed by the city council as a TCDP project. The project would replace the 100,000 gallon ground storage tank with

a 200,000 gallon ground storage tank, at approximately \$45,000.00; replace two booster pumps at \$5000.00 each; and add an automatic valve between the ground storage tanks and replace appropriate valving at approximately \$2,000. The entire project would be less than \$70,000, Brunson said.

There was general agreement from the public as to the project proposal, and the meeting adjourned.

**CHRISTIAN FLAG TURNS 90**

The 90th anniversary of the Christian flag, one of the oldest unchanged flags in the world, will be celebrated the weekend of Sept. 26-27 in churches across the United States.

It is estimated that more than 240,000 churches in the United States display the flag in their sanctuaries -- usually behind the altar and on the side opposite the American flag.

The idea for a "Christian" flag emerged from a Sunday-school rally in 1897 at Brighton Chapel, Coney Island, N.Y.

When the rally's featured speaker failed to appear, Sunday-school superintendent Charles C. Overton became anxious about keeping the crowd interested and remaining at the rally.

He began talking about an idea for a flag that symbolized the Christian faith, suggesting that it ought to have a red cross on a blue field in the upper left hand corner. The rest of the flag ought to be white, he said.

Mr. Overton challenged anyone in the congregation to make a flag such as the one he described.

The following Sunday, the first

Christian flag was unfurled.

The is no record who made the flag. It was not until 1907 that the flag was manufactured on a commercial basis.

### YOUTH FITNESS: MYTHS AND FACTS

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) is calling for more physical education programs in schools—those that stress lifetime fitness activities—and greater family involvement in fitness at home. The AAP corrects some common myths about youth fitness:

**MYTH: Children Are Fit.**  
**FACT:** In many ways, children are less fit and more flabby today than in the 60s. Studies show that up to 50 percent of children are not getting enough exercise to develop healthy hearts and lungs.

**MYTH: Most Students Pass Standard School Fitness Tests.**  
**FACT:** Each year, 18 million school children take the Presidential Fitness Test—a series of exercises to measure strength, flexibility and endurance. Only two percent of students who took the "President's Challenge" in 1984 received the award.

## New Sales Tax Rate Goes Into Effect Oct. 1

Beginning Thursday, Oct. 1, Quitaque and Turkey residents will begin paying the new state sales tax of 6 cents on the dollar, plus the one-percent local option tax, or 7 cents.

"The tax change will not only hit items which are now currently taxed, but a number of newly taxable items and services," according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Oct. 1 is also the effective date of an increase in taxes on cigarettes, going up from 20.5 cents per pack to 26 cents a pack.

The Legislature this summer extended the sales tax to several broad categories of services such as garbage collection, janitorial and custodial services, property surveys, lawn care, landscaping, pest control, security services. It will also include information furnished by credit bureaus; and debt services, such as adjustments and repossessions.

The extended tax base is expected to add more than 64,000 Texas businesses to the state's tax rolls, joining the more than 420,000 merchants and businesses already collecting sales taxes.

Included in this category are the taxes on soft drinks and diluted fruit juices when sold in any form, food and drinks sold by restaurants, hotels, drug stores, mobile vendors and vending machines; natural gas and electricity used by restaurants in storing or preparing food and items sold in vending machines for 16 cents or less.

Bullock said, "Businesses need to reprogram cash registers and alert workers and staff about the new rate taking effect Oct. 1."

The new tax base also includes telephone services, membership fees and dues charged by private clubs, admission charges for events jointly provided by a non-profit and a for-profit organization, and some transportation charges on the sale of goods.

A fee for obtaining a sales tax permit and an increase in the state's motor vehicle sales tax and hotel/motel room taxes went into effect on Sept. 1.

A rollback in the state's motor fuels tax from 15 cents to 10 cents per gallon was also cancelled on that date.

On Jan. 1, 1988, the sales tax will be further expanded to data processing services, including word processing, data entry, retrieval and search as well as payroll and business accounting, data production, time sharing and computer management.

Taxes will also be due on repair and remodeling services, except on new construction and owner-occupied residences beginning Jan. 1.

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
