Tipps Set To Join PSHOF

Borger's Gerald Myers, Happy's Joed Forbus and Quitaque's Tom Tipps will be the 92nd, 93rd and 94th members into this hall of honor during induction ceremonies at 2 p.m. January 24 at Amarillo College's Ordway Auditorium.

Tom Tipps who graduated from Quitaque High School in 1934, coached only one way—his way, and it wasn't easy either. "They'd run me out of town for coaching now the way I did in those days," said Tipps. "I was a tough man—a disciplinarian. Mostly, I was a teacher and a motivator. I had a tough man's approach, but the kids liked it in those days."

Tipps, an outstanding end at Quitaque, brought that approach to Pampa in 1947.

From 1947-53, Tipps teams were 54-17, the best winning percentage in history.

In 1953 Tipps was hired as assistant coach for Texas A&M. In 1957 Tipps went to the University of Washington as an assistant coach for the Huskies. During the years of 1957-69 Washington played in three Rose Bowls, winning two of them.

In 1970 Tipps became a college scout first for the Dallas Cowboys, then a pool scout for an NFL combine for eight years, and finally scouting college talent solely for the Green Bay Packers. A heart attack in 1987 prompted Tipps to retire.

Tipps, 75, and wife, Frances, live in Arvada, Colo., a Denver suburb. Their residence for 19 years, it was a midway base of operations when Tipps had scouting responsibilities from the Great Northwest to the Mississippi Valley.

Perhaps the most recognized name in Texas Tech basketball history, one of the top offensive linemen ever at West Texas State, and a successful football coach at Pampa and in the college ranks are the latest inductees into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

Longtime Panhandle Publisher Dies In Oklahoma Hospital

Ben Ezzell, longtime co-editor and co-publisher of The Canadian Record, died Tuesday night, Jan. 5, in Oklahoma City. He was 76.

Born in Alvord, he moved with his parents a few years later to Quitaque, where he graduated from high school in 1933. He spent a year at North Texas State College in 1934 studying pre-med, but decided to quit school and work for a year. The only job he could find was at a newspaper in Quitaque.

Well known throughout the Texas Panhandle for his lifelong commitment to journalism, he was Associate Editor of the Quitaque Post in 1935. The Post at that time was owned by Mr.

and Mrs. Cemet McDonald. He worked there until 1936, then went back to school, later working at Memphis Democrat and Floydada Hesperian. He had been at Canadian since 1948 until his death following heart surgery, Tuesday.

He married Nan, his wife of 50 years, while in the U.S. Air Force in 1942. They co-published the Canadian Record for 44 years.

Ben believed that his newspaper existed to right wrongs, to reward outstanding performance, and to tell the truth, a family friend said. He was inducted last April into the newly established Panhandle Press Association hall of Fame.

A memorial service was held at First United Methodist Church in Canadian, with an estimated 300 of his family, friends and peers gathering to honor the newspaper veteran.

Rainbow Trout Stocking For Theo Lake

Theo Lake, Caprock Canyons State park will be receiving the first rainbow trout for this year on January 14, 1993.

Twenty-six sites have been stocked with more than 64,000 rainbow trout during the first month and a half of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's rainbow trout stocking program.

Seventy sites, the most ever, are scheduled to be stocked with about 268,500 eight-inch to ten-inch trout. Last year, TPWD stocked about 257,000 rainbows in 61 sites.

The program is partially run with funds from the sale of Texas Freshwater Trout Stamps. The stamps are required, in addition to a valid fishing license, for all those fishing for freshwater trout in Texas waters. Those exempted from fishing license requirements are not required to possess a trout stamp. The department sold 26,774 freshwater trout stamps in 1991-1992.

Former Quitaque Pastor Bears Poignant Reminder

Baptist minister Mike Grebenik has a permanent reminder of the 1991 Christmas season: a .22-caliber bullet that is still lodged in his lower back.

It was a year ago in December that Grebenik was hitting golf balls at a Cimarron Hills driving range when a sniper's bullet ripped into him. Police believe it was a random shooting.

Grebenik, who had just started Rockrimmon Church the previous October, spent Christmas day at Memorial Hospital. Doctors cut his stomach muscles to repair or remove some of his organs. But his recovery was rapid. He was discharged December 29, was driving his car by mid-February, and could sleep on his stomach again by March.

But if Grebenik's physical recovery was speedy, he is still getting over the emotional and spiritual trauma of the shooting—and the memories it stirred up.

"Beginning in April, I went into a really major time of depression, and I just couldn't kick it," he said.

Grebenik, 40, sought the help of a Christian counselor. The process allowed him to face a host of memories that he had long suppressed.

One particular memory was chilling. He arrived home from school one day to find his parents locked into one of their many fights. His mother had a gun, he said. His

father grabbed the young boy to use as a shield. He let go of the boy and his mother fired, wounding her husband.

As counseling continued other troubling memories came forth. "By vocation, I was in a position of being a healer. But I needed to be healed, and there was a tension between the two," Grebenik said. "It was humbling to be 40 years old and just start coming to grips with things you thought you had dealt with."

Also complicating Grebenik's recovery is the biggest unknown: Who shot him? A year and a day after the incident, the pastor has yet to hear from the El Paso County Sheriff's Office about the status of the investigation.

As a result, there's no one for Grebenik to blame—or forgive.

"You can't forgive an abstract person," he said. "And that just makes the process longer and more difficult. Ultimately, it was Grebenik's faith that helped him to pull his life back together. His church is growing and he's taken up golf again."

"Things like (the shooting) either make you bitter or better," he said. "You just have to decide what you're going to do."

"There is life after pain. And if you will allow yourself to go through the process, things will get better."

Veterans receive job training through state program

I am a veteran of Desert Storm. Due to recent cuts in defense spending, I was discharged from the military and am having a hard time finding a job. Where can veterans find assistance with job placement?

Many veterans are facing tough times as military bases begin to close and the job market becomes increasingly saturated with recently discharged veterans. If you are within 48 months of your date of separation, disabled or are a veteran of the Vietnam Era or Persian Gulf War, you are eligible for job training and placement through the Veterans Employment and Training Program.

The Veterans Employment and Training Program (JTPA Title IVC) was created through the Job Training Partnership Act to increase the long-term employment and earned incomes of participating veterans. The Texas Department of Commerce and the Texas Employment Commission match funds dollar for dollar and join forces with community based organizations for veterans to maximize the delivery of the program.

The program provides veterans with on-the-job training, vocational training, job placement, job counseling and support services.
