Near Two Million Dollars On Deposit In First National Bank of Baird

Reflecting the prosperous condition of Baird and Callahan County as a whole, The First National Bank of Baird in its statement as made to the Comptroller at the close of business on June 30, 1943 shows: \$1,977,561.81 on deposit; Combined resources of the bank total \$2,108,288.48. Of this amount \$736,549.24 is in U. S. Bonds and other U. S. Obligations and \$148,585.47 in loans and discounts.

Officers and directors of the First National Bank, which was organized in January 1883 include: Tom Windham, President; Henry James, Vice-President; Ace Hickman, Vice-President; A. R. Kelton, Vice-President; Bob Norrell, Cashier; Howard E. Farmer, Assistant Cashier; R. F. Jones, Assistant Cashier.

R. F. Jones who has been an employee of the bank since 1923 recently succeeded his brother Clifford V. Jones, who is now with the U. S. Navy. Clifford had been an employee of the bank since 1922. The official family of the First National Bank have all been with the bank over a period of years, giving careful and efficient attention to the business which is largely due the continued and substantial growth of the bank.

Bob Norrell, cashier, on whose shoulders rests much of the responsibility of the bank's business, is a veteran, being with the bank since 1908 and has served as cashier since 1915 and he is always at his post with a friendly greeting and a word of cheer for all.

Prairie Fire Does Much Damage

Fire which broke out yesterday afternoon on the N. B. Holloway farm west of Rowden, where they were bailing Johnson grass hay, burned off approximately 2000 acres. The Holloway field was burned off and some bailed hay was burned.

The fire spread to the Jane Patton Hall ranch burning off the east side of a 1000 acre tract, then spread to the Frank Windham and Lerner Henry pastures.

Farmers and ranchmen of the community joined in the fight against the flames. It was the worst pasture fire in this section in some years—only the fact that there was little wind prevented it being a disastrous fire for the grass is very dry. No livestock was lost in the fire.

46 Grade I Passenger Car Tires
23 Grade III Passenger Car Tires
20 Truck Tires for all Trucks, Pick Up and Trailers.

There remains to be issued after the fifteenth, 16 Grade I tires; no Grade III tires and 7 truck tires.

The tire board has been notified by the State Ration Board that there would be no supplement to the quota. At the time of this report there was on file, in the ration board office, applications for 463 tires.

SILAGE MAKING TIME

Silage making time is here. To make good quality silage, such feed as grain sorghum and sweet sorghum should at least be in the stiff dough stage. It is better to have the grain getting hard provided the majority of the leaves are still green. The feed should be packed into the silo so as to exclude excess air. If it is chopped with a cutter, the pieces should be in half inch lengths or less and distributed in the silo with pieces of stalks and leaves well mixed. The trench should be filled one foot above the level of the ground for each 4 feet of depth in order to prevent the silage from settling below the level of the ground. In covering the trench, first put on a 5 of 6 inch layer of dirt, and wet it thoroughly. A second layer or equal depth should be placed over this, but should not be wet. Trench silos should be constructed to provide adequate drainage. If the leaves of the feed, being put into a silo, are green and the stalks contain enough sap for juice to run out when twisted, water need not be added. If it is dryer than this, add enough water to make the silage feel damp when a handful is squeezed. While filling a trench silo, the packing can be done with a tractor or horses.

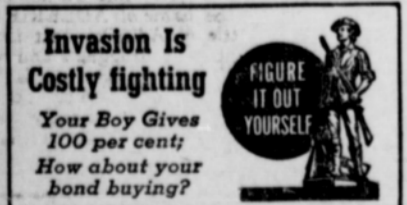
