

Cotton planting season faces 2nd-dryest 12-month period on record

LUBBOCK — Planting cotton on the High Plains of Texas in 1995 hasn't been easy as the area suffers from the second driest 12 month period on record according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

Irrigated acreage, which comprises about one-half of the area's 3.5 million cotton acres, is estimated to be 80-90 percent planted through May 26. Irrigated cotton emergence to date is estimated at around 60 percent.

Dryland acres, on the other had, are estimated at on 5-10 percent planted with many producers contemplating whether or not to "dry-plant" some of their acres instead of waiting for a "planting rain" to come along.

Dr. Kater Hake, Extension Cotton Specialist for the High Plains region, says he expects, at least a portion of the areas unplanted dryland acres will be planted in a dry seedbed. Hake is advising producers who are thinking about dry-

planting cotton to be conservative and only plant part of their dryland acres in this manner. "Currently there is still enough time for producers to implement some strategy into their planting efforts," notes Hake. "We still have a little

time to get a planting rain. The key will be in getting the number of acres to be planted following that rain down to a manageable level."

Hake's advice is to dry-plant

Spirit Wind '95 will breeze into Muleshoe to perform at the First United Methodist Church Thursday, June 8, at 7 p.m.

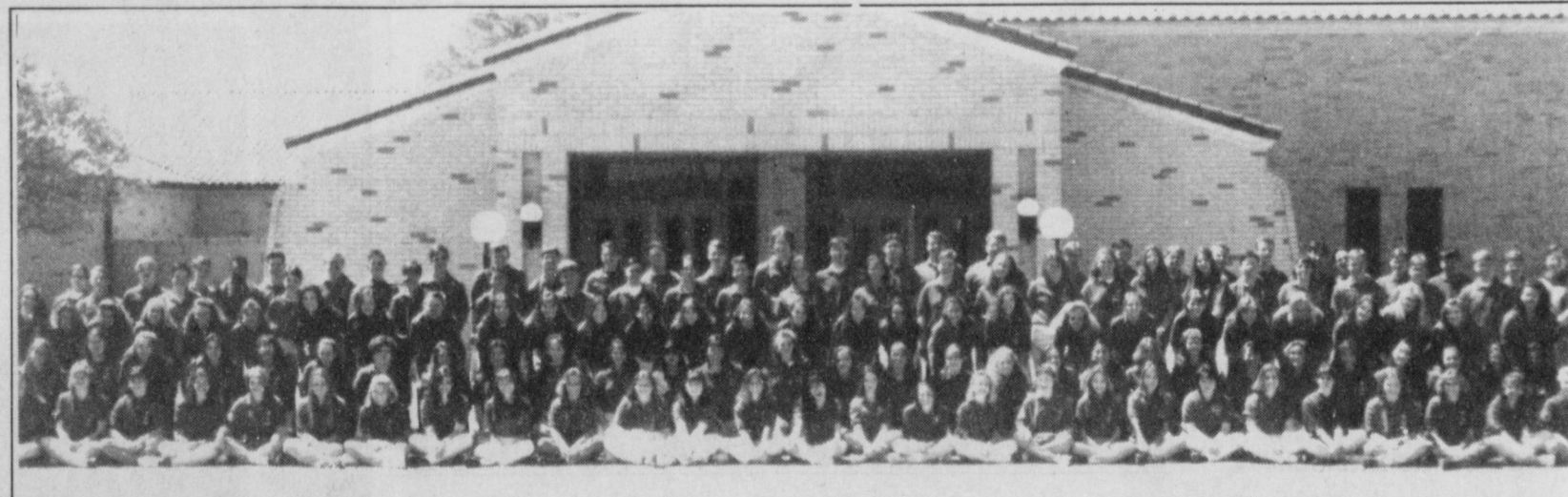
The choir is made up of more than 130 United Methodist senior high youth from all over the Panhandle and West Texas.

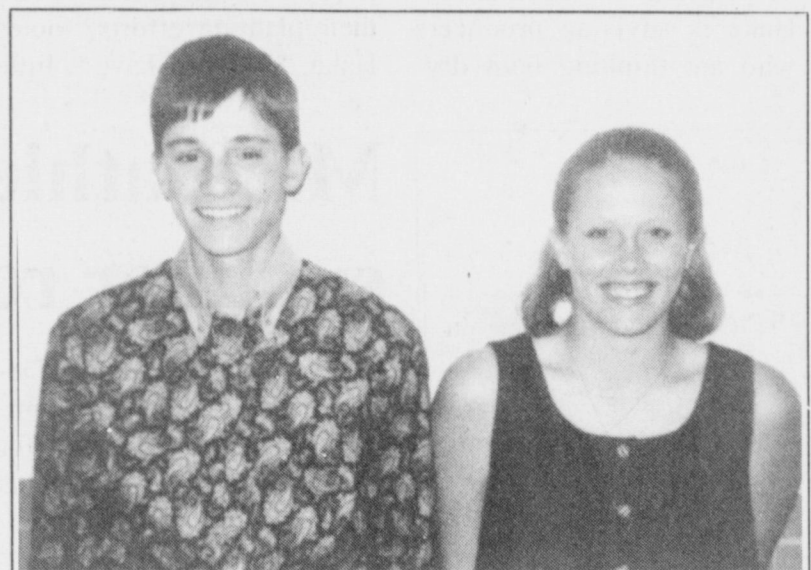

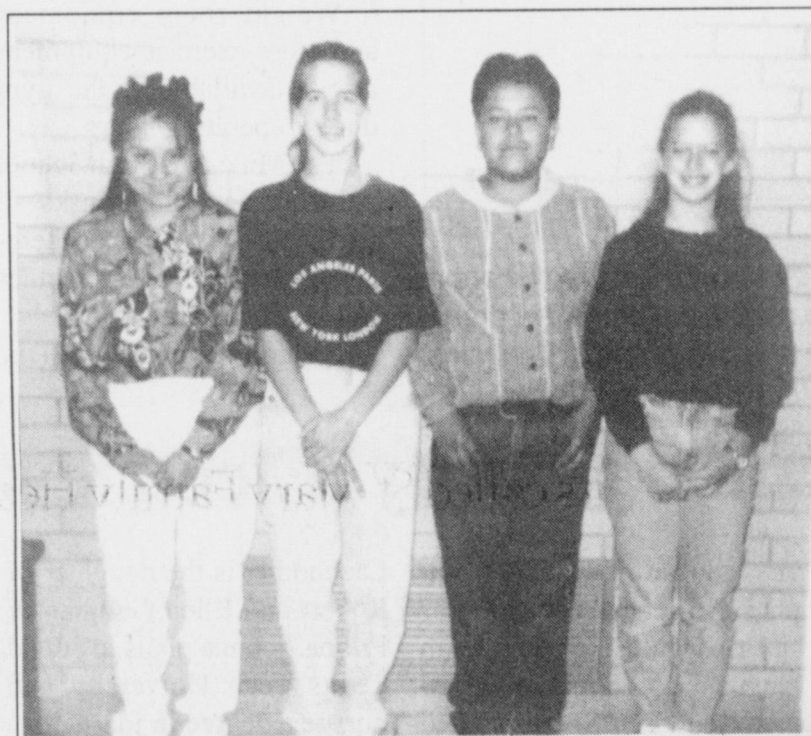

enough cotton acreage so that following a planting rain the producer can easily plant all unplanted acreage in 4-5 days.

Of the acreage already planted and up to a stand, most appears to be in good shape. Producers in some areas may see some increase in seedling disease pressure following several days of cool, damp weather; however, overall the crop is off to a fairly good start.

For producers concerned about the possibility of being prevented from ever planting the 1995 crop, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) just issued some revised regulations for producers with cop insurance.

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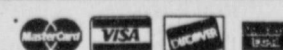

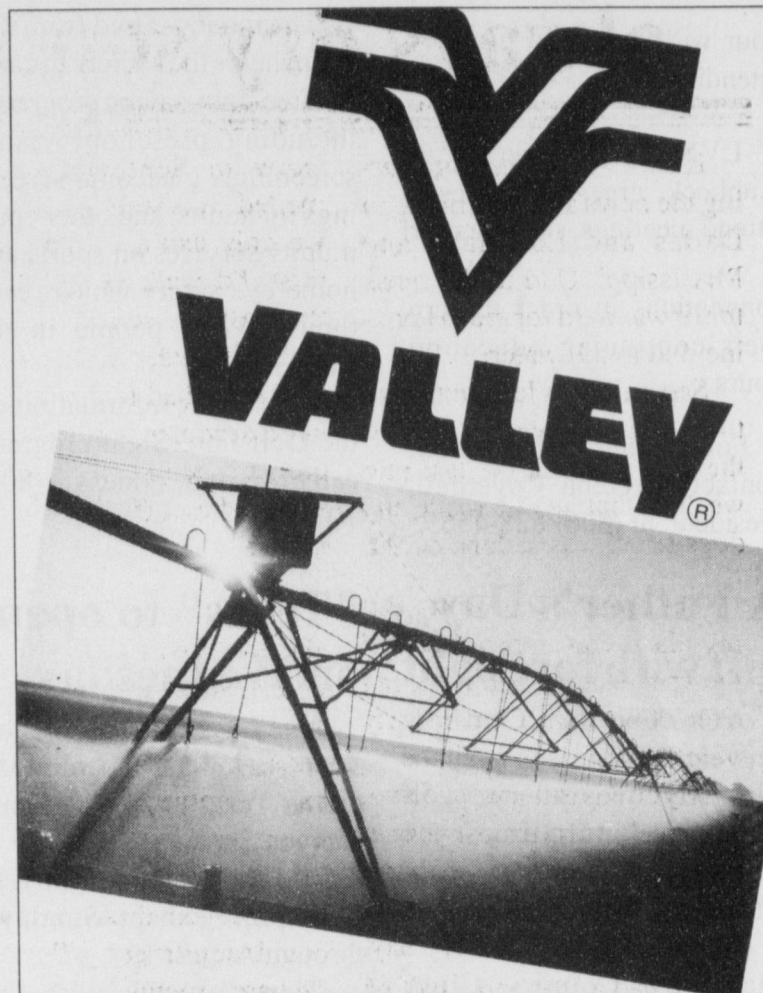
- Bring up the salary in the interview. Might as well let

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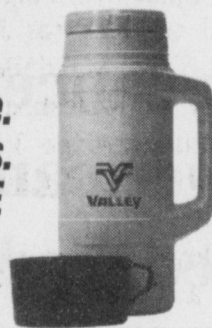
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Rain, rain, rain, but its always dry somewhere



It was an odd feeling hearing the news about flooding in Dallas and Louisiana and Mississippi. Odd in the sense that it was hard for me to imagine that much water.

See, rain was late getting to the plains this year. Up until the end of April, the last rain we had that would make the dogs smell was in June of '94.

The drought was spotty. But my place was in the center of the spot. I could see it raining over downtown Denver forty miles away.

My cow pasture wore down. My creek dried up last year in July. By August I sold my handful of trader cows after feeding up the last of my hay.

We had a foot and a half of

snow in September which melted in a week. All winter we only had a skiff now and then. I'd walk down through the pasture, scrape away an inch of powder snow and kick up dust. I had to set a post or two last winter. It was like chipping a hole in concrete. Took two inches off my post hole digger.

March came. It was miserable like it was supposed to be. Overcast, heavy winds, cold enough to suck body heat through wool socks. But no rain. I optimistically had the Coop fertilize the pasture. For weeks I walked out through the grubbed down grass and could see nitrogen pellets layin' on bare ground.

Then the last week of April it rained .4 inches. It was the first time my rain gauge had been wet since Newt Gingrich had been crowned king. The weather locked in and we've been gettin' a piece of each new storm from that moves through.

I bought some new trader cows. The last one calved in a late spring blizzard. Barely saved the calf. Mud returned to the corrals, to the roads and the floor mat of my pickup. Grass started greenin' up. To take advantage of the weeds and cheat grass around the house and barn I've strung so much hot wire up place looks like Flanders Field. My pasture looks like a lawn in Iowa.

The gutters have learned to

work again. The horse hooves are soft enough to trim without a hack saw. I found the leak in the shop I'd intended to fix a year ago. My hands quit crackin'. I actually saw earthworms huntin' the high ground.

It's funny what a couple inches of rain will do for your disposition.

I was in Obelin, Kansas the first week of May. They'd had a lot of needed rain. Maybe a little too much. They were getting anxious to plant corn but it was too muddy to get in the field.

One farmer said he wished ti would quit rainin' . . . even for a week. It occurred to me we better be careful what we wish for. It might come true.

year 2000, the number is expected to reach one in 75.

Outdoors lovers in Texas are especially susceptible to skin cancer. Studies have shown that the proportion of skin cancer in the southern and southwestern states is greater than anywhere else in the country. The incidence of skin cancer in the Dallas/Fort Worth area is two times that in St. Paul, Minnesota.

The American Cancer So-

ciety offers a few tips to help people reduce their risk of skin cancer:

- Use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 during all outdoor activities. Avoid sunburn altogether.

- Avoid direct exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. If you go outdoors, wear a hat and protective clothing.

- Don't go to tanning salons or use sunlamps — they expose your skin to harmful ultraviolet rays.

Writing in a recent issue of *Leadership* journal, Thomas Lindberg tells a story from Gordon Brownville's *Symbols of the Holy Spirit*. The anecdote centers on the famous Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen who was the first man to discover the magnetic

"We talk about being fragile creatures," Bible professor Mark Berrier comments, "but do you realize that after the sun and the stars have all gone out, God's people will still be alive? The life of God is like a song that goes on and on. Even when they kill it, in 15 days the strains begin again."

The Spirit is both the power and the proof of Christ's resurrection and of the new life that comes through him.

Lindberg writes that on his journey to the North Pole, Amundsen carried with him a homing pigeon. When he finally reached his destination, he opened the cage and released pigeon.

From the top of the world that bird flew all the way to Amundsen's home in Norway. You can imagine how delighted Amundsen's wife must have been when "she looked up and saw the pigeon circling in the sky above." The very presence of that feathery messenger told her that her beloved husband was still alive!

Muleshoe native signs book publishing contract

On the eve of the release of her first novel, *Darkside Exile*, Muleshoe native and author K. Terrill Fried has announced that she has just signed contracts with Northwest Publishing, Inc. for publication of her second novel.

Beyond There Be Dragons is the first sequel in the "Darkside Assassin" series that Fried has spent the last five years creating and marketing.

A third novel, *Genesis Awry*, is nearing completion. Fried says she's worked really hard to put together a series that will interest lovers of the Gothic genre.

Fried believes that readers

will never grow tired of fiction as long "as it is done in an entertaining and arresting style." She says that although her book is a fantasy, a lot of research has gone into the final text.

Fried began writing the Gothic series in 1990. The "Darkside," she explains, is the dimension that surrounds and permeates all of mortality and its people.

"Beings of the occult inhabit the supernatural realm, drawn for various reasons into its hellish depths — hellish because, for each who dares to cross over into the darkside, a price must be paid for practicing the forbidden magics in the pursuit of immortality."

Fried says each individual's price is both damning and devastating. "The occult is lies and deceit, an erosion of the senses as years turn to centuries that bring on a slow disintegration of the human soul."

All the "Darkside" works are dominated by the central character, Morgan Saint-Evanston, who is an 11th-century Irish assassin.

Morgan is hardly the typical hero some novelists of the genre portray. Instead, he is an alcoholic with mood swings and a wicked temperament.

"Pushed to destroy himself

because of the guilt lurking in his past, he (Morgan) is slowly being driven insane by the very legacy that propelled him into the dimension of the occult," Fried explains.

His only hope of salvation lies in Julienne Hunter-Belmadae, the woman he has loved and lost. Her soul has been resurrected, tempting Morgan to repeat the tragedy that sent her to her death and himself plunging into a world of the occult.

Fried said that as a reader who could not find a satisfying horror series to engage her imagination, she believed her own ideas might have merit.

Unable to find a series that dealt with immortality as utter damnation, she infused a tragic love story with a new twist by introducing a supernatural horror element.

Fried, who is 29 and unmarried, lives in Grants, N.M., with her parents Jana and H.W. Moore. She is planning personal appearances to promote her series throughout the United States beginning in late June.

In addition to the "Darkside" novels, Fried is working on a biography of Lieutenant Steve Bell of the Grants Police Department.

Bell was serving as a consultant for Fried's third novel,

which includes the character Detective Jess Blake. After getting acquainted with the Grants police officer, Fried decided that his life "of true courage" as a detective in a wheelchair was something she

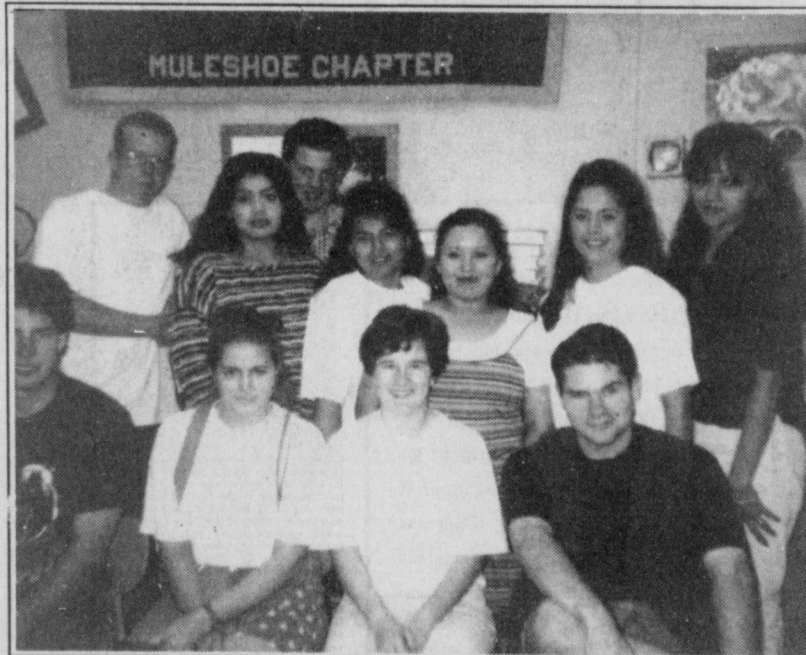

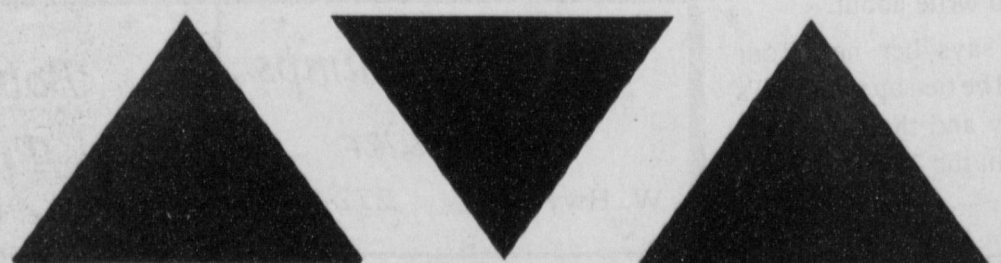

At the Muleshoe "Monday Trades Days" the merchants gifts were \$40 in cash. The social evening was on Main Street under lights, featuring a band, orchestra concert and a street dance.

1945

The June 7th *Journal* reported that Bailey County residents bought two thirds of their E Bond quota.

Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Killough received two postcards from their son, Morris, who was a civilian prisoner of the Japanese.

On June 21, the *Journal* reported that Bailey County was shy of its war bond quota. There were only eight days left and Bailey County still lacked \$22,596 having its quota.

Bailey County and Muleshoe now has new veterinarian. His name is Dr. Jim Cass. He has moved here from Brownfield and has opened an office.

1955

Remund-Wilson Dry Good Store opened for business on north main. (The store was located where Poyners' was).

Walter Harrison, who farmed five miles northwest of Muleshoe, delivered the first load of wheat to the Muleshoe Elevator.

The City of Muleshoe installed new street lights on Main Street and built new sewage systems south of town.

The First United Methodist Church broke ground for a new church building. Clarence Stephens was the pastor.

1965

Muleshoe is getting ready for a big July 4th celebration. It will start with a dedication of a historical marker at the old cookhouse at the Janes Ranch on July 2.

The parched farms around Muleshoe finally received rain — too much rain! The crops were washed out, the roads flooded and playa lakes were full.

Second Lt. Arthur C. Splawn entered the U.S. Air Force pilot training at Williams AFB, Ariz. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Splawn of Muleshoe.

Father's Day specials at Anthony's included wash & wear men's slacks for \$5. Specials at Perry's were mens neckties for 66¢.

The July 4th celebration will see the dedication to the "Mule." Muleshoe's famous mule "Old Pete" was the model.

1975

The Muleshoe Jaycee-Ettes sponsored a "Little Miss Firecracker" contest for July 4th. Winners were Amy McGehee in the three year olds; Tammy Lowe in the four-year-olds; and Karen Kennemer in the five-year-olds. The each received a gift and rode in the July 4th parade.

Bobbie Harrison and Billie Downing, secretaries for the Bailey County Farm Bureau, attended the Farm Bureau Office Secretaries Conference at Dallas recently.

Among the specials listed at Gibson's for Dad's Gifts was an AM/FM police-weather portable radio for \$9.49.

The Muleshoe area was ravaged by heavy rain and hail on June 23, 1975. Some crops were heavily damaged. Cars were washed off the road in the YL Community, northeast of Muleshoe.

1985

The wheat harvest has been slowed by the recent rains. Despite the slow harvest, Bailey County had an above average harvest.

The Muleshoe schools are planning a "giant" school reunion over the July 4th celebration. Classes of 1924-1960 are planning reunions.

The George Strait concert at the Bailey County Coliseum drew a crowd of over 2,000 people.

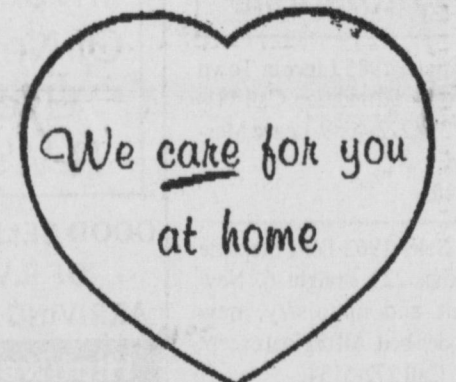
