Community members are urged to attend this meeting to learn how to best help the youth of our community.

Ed Ainsworth is the father of three children (11, 13, 16) and the husband to one wife (17 years). He is a lover of teenagers, camp director, conference speaker and has high expectations for this generation. He believes that if teens are challenged properly they will make quality decisions for their future.

In 1994 Ainsworth began *Whiteheart Communications* in response to a desperate cry from teenagers, parents, and all those who work with teenagers. From every corner of society people are looking for answers to teenage

sexuality. Lets face it, we cannot deny that there is a major problem in our nation on this issue.

We know that it costs you, the taxpayer more than 17 billion a year, which is what our government spends on teenage pregnancy each year. In the last 14 months, Ed Ainsworth has spoken to more than 16,000 students in Junior High, High School, and College with an "Abstinence Only" message. "Just Say No" is a great slogan but Ed Ainsworth believes that it is not enough to cause the American teenager to want to live a sexually pure life. He believes that someone must tell the "How".

Mr. Ainsworth uses some very creative and interactive teaching methods that involve the students in the learning process. His goal is for the students to listen and remember, so he uses



videos, role-play, visuals, music and a very educational game.

Those students who attend these presentations are challenged to remain virgins and are given some very practical reasons why. *Why wait?* Because you want to wait for real love. *How do I wait?* They are given practical tools as to how not to go too far. The value of waiting or *The Value of Virginity*. All of this brings to mind those who are already sexually active. Hope is given to these students as Mr. Ainsworth teaches a very clear definition of *Secondary Virginity*. He teaches what it is and how to get there.

Turkey-Quitaque CISD Trustee Election Results

The Turkey-Quitaque CISD held an election on Saturday, May 4, 1996 to elect three new trustees for the school district.

Six people were running for the three seats. Greg Ramsey of Quitaque came in first with 75 votes in Quitaque and 77 from Turkey with a total of 152 votes.

Mark Allen of Quitaque received 92 votes in Quitaque and 40 votes in Turkey with a total of 132 votes.

Larry Curry of Turkey received 61 votes in Turkey and 71 votes in Quitaque for a total of 132 votes.

Bettie Green of Turkey received 117 votes with 76 coming from Turkey and 41 from Quitaque.

Brent Guest of Turkey received 70 votes from Turkey and 27 from Quitaque with a total of 97 votes in all.

Gene Payne of Quitaque received a total of 42 votes with 12 from Quitaque and 30 votes from Turkey.

One hundred and twenty-five voted in Turkey and one hundred and nine voted in Quitaque.

Results Of Turkey Election

Saturday was Election Day in Turkey for the office of Mayor and two City Council Members.

In the race for mayor, George Colvin won with 79 votes while Don Howard received 16 and Albert Greene got 11 votes.

For Council Member Place 1 Louis Randall cornered the place with 69 votes to Mary Ham's 33 votes and Marge Chaney's 5 votes.

In the race for Council Member, Place 4, Vicki Lindsay received 104 votes and Richard Greene received 3 votes.

Thunderstorm Ignites Grass Fire In Hall County

Turkey - A severe thunderstorm that produced funnel clouds ignited a grass fire in Hall County on Monday, officials said.

However, the county also received up to four inches of rain in some areas of open range, negating the threat of fire, said Ken Schneider, lead forecaster at the National Weather Service in Amarillo.

Shortly before 7 p.m., lightning sparked a fire in CRP grass just south of Turkey, said a spokeswoman for the Hall County Sheriff's Department.

The fire was brought under control within an hour and did not cause major damage, she said.

The National Weather Service in Lubbock issued tornado warnings for Hall County around 7:15 p.m. Monday, indicating a developing twister five miles east/northeast of Turkey moving south/southeast.

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



OVEN ROASTED CATFISH WITH SWEET ONION MARMALADE

Ingredients:

- 2 pounds thinly sliced sweet yellow onions (approximately 8 small onions)
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme, leaves only
- 1 quart heavy cream
- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 8 genuine U.S. farm-raised catfish fillets
- Salt and pepper (to taste)

Directions:

The Marmalade. Place onions in a heavy bottomed saucepan and add the stock. Cover the pan and cook over moderate heat for 15 minutes. Remove the cover and add the thyme leaves. Continue to cook for about 45 minutes, until the onions start to color and the liquid is almost evaporated. Add cream and continue to cook until the mixture is thick. Add the vinegar and cook for 2 additional minutes.

The Catfish. Lay the fillets on a flat surface and salt and pepper each fillet. Spread 1 tablespoon of sweet onion marmalade on each fillet. Beginning at the small or tail end, wrap the fillet onto itself to produce a tight spiral. Secure with a toothpick.

Place the catfish in a shallow baking dish, keeping them from touching. Top each with 1 tablespoon of sweet onion marmalade. Bake at 350 F° for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and let sit for 5 minutes. Place 3 tablespoons of marmalade in each of the 4 warm plates and top with cooked fillet. (Be sure to remove the toothpick.) Serves four.

Sometimes it seems they are the only people who do remember the hundred little things that mean so much in the smooth operation of the family's life. And it's not holiday sentimentalism to point out that mothers may forget their own birthdays, but they can all remember every last birthday and anniversary of their entire relationship.

RAIN AGAIN, AND AGAIN

Our Saturday-Sunday downpour gave us 1.2 inches in little over 36 hours, and our Monday night downpour (and "pour" is the word) added 1.6 inches in less than 3 hours. At this date the official recorded rainfall in the City of Turkey since Jan. 1 totals 7.62 inches. Heavier rains were noted, however, in other nearby locations. John Sharp reports failure of a set of terraces east of town which were engineered to hold a total of 3 inches of rain per hour. The failure of this heavy earthwork is taken as an indication that well over the theoretical 3 inches fell on these particular terraces, and speculation runs as high as an estimate of 6 inches of water received per hour in several small areas east of Turkey.

Word from the ranges tells that every last earth tank is full to the brim and running around, many of them for the first time since they were built during the drought years.

Gnavus Club Hears Patrolman Gardner Speak On Safety


The Gnavus Club met, April 16 at the Legion Hut with Mrs. J. G. Nipper as hostess.
