Spectacular Memorial Day Events Planned For Hall County


The Hall County Veterans' Memorial Day ceremony will be held Monday, May 31 beginning with a parade at 11 a.m. located at the gin area in Memphis. "The emphasis this year will be on the families who have sons and daughters serving in the U.S. Military Forces," stated Hall County Judge Jack Martin. Everyone is encouraged to participate to show your support of the bravery and valor of the U.S. Military troops.

All citizens of the county are urged to attend in support of this unique program giving us the opportunity to honor those who have made tremendous sacrifices to preserve the freedoms and liberties that those of us at home enjoy. Immediately following the parade a Wreath Laying Ceremony will be held on the north side of the Hall Co. Courthouse. The four corners of Hall County will be represented at the ceremony in the laying of the wreaths, including Jim Robison representing Turkey, Billy Salmon representing the Lakeview-Brice area, Glen Bowman representing Estelline and Bill Ballew representing Memphis. It is hoped that this will be a very impressive and solemn ceremony in remembrance of all those having served in not only the present war but all wars in which the United States has been engaged.

Next immediately following the Wreath Laying Ceremony the Lakeview Co-op Gin members will be serving hamburgers at the Cyclone Football Stadium at a cost of \$5 each.

At 1 p.m. a free program will be presented at Cyclone Stadium to top off the day's events. The DEW Line Squadron of the commemorative Air Force will be demonstrating vintage World War II planes; then a demonstration of Fort Sill's Half-Section will follow on the football field. This is the only horse-drawn artillery remaining in the United States arsenal, and the members will demonstrate the way in which this type weapon was used in previous wars.

Bruce Tiffin's Bagpipe Band will play music appropriate for the occasion. Honorable David McCoy, 100th District Judge, will speak on the subject of remembering the families left at home while sons, daughters, fathers and other relatives are serving in Afghanistan, Iraq and other countries at present, and the families of military personnel in previous wars in which the United States participated. "It is important for us as American citizens to support and honor not only the men and women who have served, and those who are now serving our country, but also those who gave the supreme sacrifice of their lives for the defense of freedom," stated County Judge Jack Martin. "As Audie Murphy, a young man from Texas who became the most decorated soldier of World War II said, 'the heroes are those who died in defense of their country'. We can show our patriotism by our participation in this program and our presence as spectators." Judge Martin also stated that a Presidential message is expected for this unique Memorial Day ceremony.




**Hollie McKay & Tracy Pounds

Cooks Corner

Memorial Day is right around the corner, and millions of Americans will have a three day weekend and a cookout. This week I have some ideas for that outdoor event that are sure to be enjoyed by friends and family. While you are enjoying the holiday, please remember the servicemen and women we honor.

Grilled Pork with Pear Salsa

- 1/4 cup lime juice
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1-1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1-1/2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 pork tenderloins (about 1 pound each), cut into 1/4 inch slices

Pear Salsa:

- 4 cups chopped peeled pears
- 1/3 cup chopped red onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh mint OR 2 teaspoons dried mint
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 tablespoon grated lime peel
- 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

In a large Ziploc bag, combine the lime juice, oil, garlic, cumin, oregano and pepper; add pork. Seal bag and turn to coat; refrigerate overnight. Drain and discard marinade. Grill pork, uncovered, over indirect medium heat for 6-7 minutes on each side or until juices run clear. In a bowl, combine the salsa ingredients. Serve with pork. Serves 6-8.

Did you know that Karo syrup is a great tenderizer for meats? Try this barbecue sauce for any meat you are grilling this weekend.

Summer BBQ Sauce

- 1/2 cup Karo syrup, light or dark
 - 1/2 cup ketchup
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
 - 1/4 cup cider vinegar
 - 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
 - 1/4 cup prepared mustard
- Mix together all ingredients in a small saucepan. Bring to a gentle boil for 15 minutes until sauce thickens. Enjoy with your favorite meats.

Best Black Bean Salad

- 1 can (15 oz.) black beans, drained
 - 1 can (16 oz.) corn, drained
 - 1 red bell pepper
 - 1 green bell pepper
 - 1 yellow bell pepper
 - 1/2 cup red onion, diced
 - 1 garlic clove, minced
 - 1 teaspoon cilantro
 - 1/4 cup olive oil
 - 4 tablespoons red wine vinegar
 - 1 teaspoon lime juice
- Salt and pepper to taste. Seed and dice bell peppers. In a salad bowl, combine bell peppers, onion, corn, garlic and cilantro. Toss to mix. Add olive oil, vinegar and lime juice. Salt and pepper to taste. Toss again. Add black beans, toss well and serve with tortilla chips. Serves 6-8.

Aunt France's Lemonade

- 5 lemons
 - 5 limes
 - 5 oranges
 - 3 quarts water
 - 1-1/2 cups sugar
- Squeeze juice from four of the lemons, limes, and oranges; pour into gallon container. Thinly slice the remaining fruit and set aside for garnish. Add water and sugar to the juices; mix well. Add slices fruit. Refrigerate. Serve over ice. Makes 1 gallon.

Picnic Stuffed Eggs

- 12 hard-cooked eggs
 - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 - 1/4 cup sweet pickle relish
 - 1 tablespoon honey mustard
 - 1 teaspoon garlic salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Slice eggs in half lengthwise; remove yolks. Mash yolks with rest of ingredients; mix well. Stuff or pipe into whites. Refrigerate. Makes 2 dozen. God Bless America!

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for loss caused by drought that occurred from September 15, 2003 through December 31, 2003, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Hall County, Larry J. Goetze said today.

Also emergency farm loan applications are being accepted for losses caused by drought and high winds that occurred from August 1, 2003 and continuing, are being accepted at the FSA.

Hall County is one of the contiguous counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Mr. Goetze said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 100 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Mr. Goetze said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 28, 2004, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Goetze said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Memphis is open from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday through Friday.

Foreign Investors Must Report U.S. Holdings

Foreign investors with an interest in agricultural lands in the United States are required to report their holdings and any transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, according to the Hall County Farm Service Agency.

"Any foreign person who acquires or transfers any interest, other than a security interest, in agricultural land in the United States is required by law to report the transaction no later than 90 days after the date of the transaction," said Billy Foster, County Executive Director of the Hall County Farm Service Agency.

Foreign investors must file Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) Reports with the Farm Service Agency county office in which the land is located.

Poster said failure to file a report, filing a late report or filing an inaccurate report can result in a penalty with fines up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land.

For AFIDA purposes, agricultural land is defined as any land used for farming, ranching or timber production, if the tracts total 10 acres or more.

Disclosure reports are also required when there are changes in land use. For example, reports are required when land use changes from nonagricultural to agricultural or from agricultural to nonagricultural.

Foster added, "Foreign investors must also file a report when there is a change in the status of ownership such as owner changes from foreign to non-foreign to foreign or from foreign to foreign."

When the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act was signed into law in 1978, the reporting requirement was adopted as part of the same legislation. Data gained from these disclosures is used in the preparation of periodic reports to the President and Congress concerning the effect of such holdings upon family farms and rural communities in the United States.

SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available For Disaster Victims In Area

Businesses in Briscoe, Hall, Motley, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, and King Counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Drought, high winds, and static electricity that occurred July 1, 2003, and continuing, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing an application is December 23, 2004.

Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Confirmed In West Texas; First U.S. Case Since 1998

The country's first case of Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) since 1998 was confirmed Wednesday, May 19, on a premise with nine horses and eight head of cattle near Balmorhea, in Reeves County in west Texas. VS is a viral disease that occurs sporadically in the U.S., usually in southwestern states. The disease can affect horses, cattle and pigs, and occasionally, sheep, goats and deer, causing blisters to form in the animal's mouth, on teats or along the hooves, resulting in excessive salivation, lameness or oozing sores.

The clinical signs of VS can cause concern because they mimic those of a highly contagious foreign animal infection-foot-and-mouth disease (FMD)-which has been eradicated in the U.S. since 1929. Laboratory tests must be run to differentiate between the two diseases, when cattle, pigs, sheep or other cloven-hooved animals develop signs of the disease. Unlike FMD, VS also can affect horses and other members of the equine family. Although the disease does not affect food safety, infected livestock are withheld from slaughter until they recover.

"If your livestock develops blisters, erosions or sores, don't pass it off as another case of VS," Dr. Coats said. "It is extremely important that we collect samples and have laboratory tests run to determine the cause of illness. Report these signs of disease to your private veterinary practitioner or the TAHC immediately. The TAHC hotline number is operational 24 hours a day at 1-800-550-8242, and a TAHC or U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarian always is on call to take reports and work with your private veterinarian at no charge."

18 Watersheds Eligible For First CSP Sign-Up

With a Summer 2004 sign-up in mind, the USDA Natural resource conservation Service has announced that 18 watersheds across the continental United States will be the first areas where farmers and ranchers get a chance to participate in the conservation Security Program.

The 18 watersheds include two that are at least partially located in Texas. The first is the Hondo watershed that overlays part of the Edwards aquifer and includes parts of the following Texas counties: Medina, Bandera and Frio.

The second is the Punta de Agua watershed which straddles the Texas-New Mexico border and includes all or part of the following counties in the northern Texas Panhandle: Dallam, Hartley and Oldham; and parts of Union county in New Mexico.

The two watersheds cover over 1.7 million acres. The Punta de Agua covers 998,000 acres and the Hondo watershed includes 704,000 acres according to the NRCS.

Nationally more than 14 million acres of land and an estimated 27,000 farms and ranches will be eligible to apply for CSP participation.

The CSP is a voluntary program that supports ongoing conservation stewardship of agricultural working lands and enhances the condition of America's natural resources.

Nationwide the inaugural CSP sign-up will make some \$41.4 million of CSP funding available to reward farmers and ranchers for addressing specific resource concerns on their operations through the successful use of conservation practices. It is estimated that 3,000 to 5,000 contracts will be able to be written in the initial sign-up period.

NRCS is in the process of training personnel in the selected watersheds on the basics of the program with detailed training scheduled after publication of the interim final rule governing the sign-up process later in the summer.

June Agricultural Survey Is Opportunity To Provide Facts About Texas Agriculture

The Texas agricultural statistics service has targeted May 27-June 13 as the time frame for conducting the 2004 June Agricultural survey.

The June Survey is one of the more important survey programs conducted by TASS and is used to develop the first clear indications of potential acreage and production of major commodities for the 2004 growing season.

All farmers and ranchers selected for the survey are encouraged to participate.

The National Agricultural statistics Service conducts a number of survey programs throughout the year to establish projections for crop acreage, production and input usage across the United States.

Information gathered during the survey is used by a wide variety of people in the agriculture industry, as well as within the federal government, and it is imperative that the information provided is as accurate as possible.

The information provided by farmers and ranchers is used by a wide variety of people including industry analysts, extension agents, and farm organizations. The data is also often used in the development of agricultural policy.

By law the information gathered during the survey process is kept confidential and is combined with responses from other participants to develop the needed data and provide meaningful, accurate and objective statistics that help keep U.S. agriculture informed.

NCC Program Trains Cotton Industry Leaders

The National Cotton Council is still looking for applicants interested in being part of the 2004-05 Cotton Leadership Class.

NCC will accept applications from qualified U.S. industry members through July 1, 2004 and anyone interested in applying can visit the Cotton Leadership Program's web site at <http://leadership.cotton.org> to review the program curriculum, eligibility requirements and download the application.

The NCC's Cotton Leadership Program seeks to identify potential industry leaders and provide the leadership training.

The course is comprised of five sessions conducted across the Cotton Belt. Participants will visit with industry leaders; observe production, processing and research activities; and meet with lawmakers and government agency representatives during a visit to Washington, D.C. Participants will also attend the NCC's annual meeting and its mid-year board of directors meeting.

The program, now in its 21st year, is supported by a grant to The Cotton Foundation from DuPont Crop Protection and is managed by NCC's Member Services department. The 10 member leadership class is comprised of four producers and one participant from each of the other six industry segments.

The 2004-05 class is to be announced in August by the NCC's Cotton Leadership Development Committee. Committee Chairman Jimmy Sanford, an Alabama producer, says the U.S. cotton industry has benefited from dedicated leaders for decades, but the need to groom future leaders is imperative. "The leadership program is an ideal training ground for those men and women who would like to embrace the challenge of guiding this outstanding industry," Sanford said.

Last Week In Texas History!

May 20, 1906
The first car arrived in Amarillo. It was a one-cylinder Cadillac owned by Dr. W.A. Lockett.

May 20, 1893
An election to move Amarillo from a location on Amarillo Creek to its present location was approved 335-9.

May 20, 1719
French troops invaded Texas in an effort to drive the Spanish out of East Texas.

May 21, 1858
Senior Ranger Capt. John S. "Rip" Ford arrived back in Austin and reported his Texas Rangers killed 76 Indians, captured 300 horses and 18 women and children during their six-hour running gun battle in Western Oklahoma Territory. Only two Ranger were killed.

May 21, 1791
Philip Nolan obtained permission to hunt for wild mustang horses in Spanish Texas. He later became a spy for President Thomas Jefferson and was killed in 1801 during a fight with Spanish soldiers near Waco.

May 22, 1846
Ranger Capt. Ben McCulloch and his company became scouts for Gen. Zachary Taylor while camped near Brownsville. They led Taylor's soldiers into Mexico.

May 22, 1846
The first official U.S. Post Office in Texas opened at San Antonio.

May 23, 1934
Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow were killed in a shootout with Texas Rangers in Louisiana.

May 23, 1861
Col. John S. "Rip" Ford's Confederate troops were reorganized and became the Second Texas Cavalry Regiment. Later they became known as the "Cavalry of the West."

May 24, 1919
Prohibition was added as an amendment to the Texas Constitution.

May 24, 1841
70 Texas Rangers under Gen. Edward S. Tarrant, attacked and captured three Indian villages in the Battle of Village Creek. Capt. John B. Denton, for whom Denton County was named, was killed in the fighting.

May 25, 1921
The buffalo was selected as the official mascot and nickname for West Texas State Normal College.

May 25, 1865
Confederate soldiers abandoned Sabine Pass.

May 25, 1690
The first mission in Texas was founded in East Texas by the Spanish. It was called San Francisco de los Tejas.

May 26, 1865
Col. John S. "Rip" Ford dismissed the "Cavalry of the West" and took his family into Mexico.

May 26, 1839
Ranger Capt. John Bird and 50 Texas Rangers attacked 200 Comanche Indians and forced the Indians to retreat at the Battle of Bird Creek northwest of Temple.

May 26, 1541
Francisco Vasquez de Coronado arrived in the Palo Duro Canyon. He and his three Franciscan priests celebrated the Feast of the Ascension. This was the first Thanksgiving in the present United States, over 80 years before Plymouth Rock.

All that was left were those spurs, not even enough for chicken and dumplings after he got in the way of that twelve gauge.

We got for Easter one year, some baby chicks colored up right pretty and one of them lived to get a full set of feathers. I worked with that chicken and the only trick I could teach him was to play dead. He finally one day got to do it in earnest as one of the dogs cleaned his clock. Adios Bisquit.

I had a dog that was a biter not a barker, he had a horse that ran off with the clothes line and another that threw my dad and then just stood there and stared at him. A goose that would bite you if you turned your back on him and another dog that would eat watermelon with my younger brother.

Ours was a strange place to be around.


