## Rate Increase Requested By Energas Company

Energas Company has notified the 66 incorporated communities on its West Texas Distribution system that the company intends to implement an increase of approximately 6 percent in its overall revenues effective May 24, 1991. The company has also proposed to increase its service charges. Quitaque, Turkey and Silverton are among those affected.

About 211,000 customers are affected including all sales customers who are not on irrigation or special industrial contracts with the company.

By law, Energas is entitled to recover its cost of service through its rates and charges to customers.

The overall rate of return being requested by Energas in the current filing is 12.13 percent.

The last rate adjustment filed by Energas for the West Texas Distribution System was in 1984 and the subsequent increase of approximately 17 cents per Mcf was effective November 1, 1984.

## COMING SOON TO QUITAQUE

### New Telecommunications System To Be Utilized With Latest Digital Technology

GTE district manager, Jerry West, of Memphis, Texas announced plans to implement a new telecommunications system utilizing the latest in digital technology to the customers premise by year end 1991.

When complete, the residents of Quitaque will be communicating via a wireless digital radio system similar to that utilized in a cordless telephone. Each customer would be assigned their own frequency for a crystal clear conversation and absolute privacy, unlike some cordless phones. The system will utilize the existing wire and jack located inside the home as well as existing instruments.

When the customer goes off hook and pulls dial tone, the tone they hear will be coming from the GTE digital central office located in Memphis, Texas, approximately 45 miles away. The fact that the dial

tone will be coming from the Memphis office will allow the availability of custom calling features, such as call waiting, call forwarding, and speed dialing.

According to West, GTE has several digital wireless systems in operation throughout the United States but none serving an entire town which will make Quitaque the first fully wireless town of its kind.

GTE is teaming up with International Mobil Machines (IMM), a leading supplier of radio telecommunications service equipment, to bring the latest and greatest technology to

Quitaque, Texas. West noted that this type of system is ideal for rural environments such as Quitaque, where there is not a large concentration of customers in any one spot.

The Randall County Sheriff's Posse will once again sponsor the Panhandle Heritage Memorial Trail Ride. This is the eighth trail ride that will benefit the Panhandle Head Injury Foundation. join in the festivities may join the group in the park.

This foundation is a non-profit organization administered by the Amarillo Area Foundation for the Elizabeth T. Bivins Rehabilitation Complex.

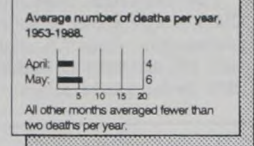
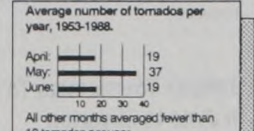

## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellations of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

**Informal Review:** Many times problems can be resolved informally with the appraisal district staff. If you have a problem, contact Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser, at the appraisal district office, or call (806) 823-2161.

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board:** If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing.) The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office in the courthouse basement.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

**Review by the District Court:** After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

**More Information:** You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district, BRISCOE C.A.D. BOX 728, SILVERTON, TX. (806) 823-2161. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

**Deadline for filing protests with the ARB**  
 (the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

**Usual deadline:** On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

**Late protests** (if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.) Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

**Special deadlines:** **Change of use** (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

**ARB changes** (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed) Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

# Farm Loan Emergency Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought and excessive heat are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located

in Floydada, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Becky Rainer said today.

Briscoe County is one of eight counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought and excessive heat.

Rainer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Ms. Rainer said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 9, 1991 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Rainer said.

The FmHA office is open in Floydada from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The City Council has determined that the situation of animals running at large is serious; therefore, the Animal Control Ordinance will be strictly enforced. Any animals caught in the traps will be placed at the dog pound and owners will have three days to pay a fine before animals can be placed back in the owners possession.

Any owners observed taking their animal from the trap will be fined accordingly. If the animals have not been vaccinated there will be a \$10.00 charge plus a \$5.00 fine each time the animal is caught the fine will double.

There is also a section of the Animal Control Ordinance that states: "When stray dogs or cats are found running at large, and their ownership is known to the agents of the Animal Control Committee, such dogs or cats need not be impounded, but the agent may cite the owners of such animals to pay a fine of violation of this article." The fine will be same as for the impounding of animals; and the fine will double each time the animals are cited.
