General Election Slated This Saturday

The General Election is scheduled for Turkey and Quitaque, Saturday April 4th. Everyone is urged to get out and vote for the candidate of your choice.

Quitaque has three names on their ballot for councilman and you can vote for all three. Turkey has some choices on their ballot. Place 2, Steve Farley has no opponent. Place three has two names on the ballot, Arlowene Williams, the incumbent with Tommy Beck, the opponent. Place five has two names on the ballot, Lorene Setliff, the incumbent and Russell the opponent.

How Turkey Got Its Name

Wild turkeys have roamed these plains and hills for many years. Their greatest enemy was the coyote and the bobcat, but the wild turkey could hold his own for he could fly one half mile at a high rate of speed.

At night he had to have tall trees to roost in so it would be out of reach of the animals.

All during the day light hours the turkey would roam the prairies in search of berries and acorns and a variety of green plants.

Just before sundown the wild turkeys by the thousands would head for the turkey roosts. These were large trees on both sides of the creek, which was later called Turkey Creek.

Another roosting place was in the tall trees at the Shoe Nail ranch down on Kent Creek. The third place was at Pease river. It was also a nesting place for it had a lot of under brush and plenty of water.

The first store called Turkey was in a one half dugout about one mile south west of Turkey. The first school house was close to Kent Creek and only had school one day for it burned down that night. Another one was in a small building with apple crates for seats was used until a better building could be built. The first gin was also at this location, the apple crates were used until the new building was finished.

Who Came By Covered Wagon?

Well, there are a few people still around who came here by covered wagon. I well remember the three year drouth in Mitchell county, near Colorado City. The drouth was so bad we did not make even one bale of cotton. Pappa had two wagons and one surry and at the end of the three years he owed the bank \$245.00, but had to rake and scrape to pay that off. There was but one thing left to do, and that was to hitch the horses to the covered wagon and head for greener pastures, which we did. We started out with one uncovered wagon, with a surry trailing behind pulled by two horses and one covered wagon following with Mamma and the kids riding in it. My older brother drove the horses. It fell my lot to ride in the surry and take care of old Spat, our dog.

The first night we landed in Snyder, as there were several wagon yards in town. We picked one out just like people stop at motels today. After unharnessing our horses and feeding them with feed we bought from the wagon yardman, he assigned us to one large room. Us kids made down beds and slept on the floor. From then on we slept out in the open by the side of the wagons. One night we camped on the bank of the Brasos River, but decided to pull across the river to make camp. As there were no bridges in those days, we had to pull across in the deep sand. To do this we had to put all four horses on one wagon, then unhitch and go back across after the other wagon. We were lucky to have pulled across that night, for the next morning the river was on a big rise and the water was at least ten feet deep. A man living close to where we camped came down to our camp and spent yarns about the river until way into the night. I remember one thing he said, "the river is so boggy and the quicksand so quicky it will bog your eyes out if you look too long." We pulled into Quitaque on the seventh day on the road. I had rather make the trip in a car, but the old covered wagon was "okay" then.

Large crosses marking these places can be seen against the sky for many miles.
 One of the old customs that comes from early times is coloring Easter Eggs. Colored eggs were used in the spring celebrations of the ancient Persians, Egyptians, Greeks and Romans. You may think that the celebration of the belief of everlasting life, is very far indeed from celebrating Easter with prettily decorated eggs, but, it is not so strange as it seems, for the egg itself, within itself, is the beginning of new life.

Pvt. Roush Completes One Unit Training

Superintendent's Corner

These have been busy times at the State Legislature. More than 4,300 bills and resolutions were filed the first 60 days of the legislative session and hundreds of the bills are related to education. Among the many pieces of legislation related to education are topics such as elections, class size, career ladder, seat belts for school buses, and the ever-present education funding.

In light of the state financial crisis, most observers are convinced that school districts in Texas will be forced to take a cut in education funding next school year. Governor Bill Clements is supporting needed legislative changes in a number of costly areas, but is still convinced that education can absorb further reductions in state aid. Although specific legislation concerning school finance has not been introduced, the Governor has submitted a plan for state aid to school districts.

The Legislative Budget Office has presented impact figures to the House Education Committee which reflect how selected options would affect school district funding. The basis of the study describes an attempt to find the best way to cut seventeen percent from school aid which the present law provides. A proposed cut of seventeen percent seems to be the absolute maximum which would be acceptable to the Governor and he would prefer a figure in the neighborhood of five to ten percent.

The Governor's plan for reductions in education include a number of big cost items. The primary areas which are targeted for either reduction or elimination are vocational education, small district adjustments, career ladder allocations, compensatory education, and bilingual education. Included in the attempt to reduce state aid to school districts is the possibility of increasing the local fund assignment. The local fund assignment is a designated dollar amount which school districts must furnish locally to finance a part of the educational cost.

Current law provides that Valley School receive \$2,963. per student in average daily attendance for the current school year. Depending upon the various available options, Valley School could lose \$154 or more per student next year under the Governor's plan. The loss of \$50 thousand is a lot of money to such a small school district. Perhaps the Governor will help provide a way to cut our existing costs.

Don't forget to vote in the School Trustee Election on Saturday. Three board members will be elected to serve three year terms and one member for a two year term of office. The election will be held along with city elections in Turkey and Quitaque. It is an honor, a privilege, and a duty to vote. Exercise that right!

The new Tax Reform Act requires taxpayers to show the Social Security number for each dependent age 5 or older listed on tax returns after January 1, 1988. Valley School is assisting the Social Security Office in its effort by allowing the use of school records and handing out information to the students.





Eddie Owens Accredited By PRSA

Eddie Owens, APR, director of public services at Wayland Baptist University, has been Accredited by the Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) under its Professional Accreditation Program.

Owens earned the distinction recently after having successfully completed a comprehensive examination administered by the program.

Accreditation is a voluntary certification program open only to PRSA members with at least five years experience in the public relations profession.

The accreditation exam tests a candidate's knowledge of public relations practice, communications theory, management science and general understanding of the profession. It is structured in such a way that a candidate must have extensive experience in the profession to attain Accreditation.

Less than three percent of the 143,000 public relations practitioners in the U. S. have achieved the Accredited status, according to the PRSA Accreditation Board. Owens is one of only two Accredited practitioners in West Texas.

A member of the WBU staff since 1979, Owens is a 1975 graduate of Wayland and holds the master of arts degree in public relations from Texas Tech University. He is also presently serving as president of the Texas Baptist Public Relations Association. Eddie is the son of Lottie Owens of Quitaque.



On the Road to Weight Loss
Dieting can be compared to taking a long trip by car. Your destination or goal is weight loss, and your eating plan is like a road map used to get to your destination of desirable weight.

You're in the driver's seat! Your route to a lower weight should take into account your lifestyle, schedule, budget, and specific health needs. Your reducing plan must be safe and provide all the necessary nutrients your body needs each day. The best diet is one you can live with for the rest of your life!

Most people first think of calories as being all-important in a weight reduction program. But food is more than calories. It furnishes all of the essential nutrients we need for good health. A reducing diet should supply the proper balance of nutrients through a wide variety of wholesome foods with a controlled level of calorie intake.

Nutritionists advise against reducing calories below 1,600 a day for men, and 1,200 calories a day for women. Most people can lose one to two pounds per week at that level.

Diets that limit your food choices to only a few foods are usually unsound. A variety of foods is much wiser and more likely to provide all the necessary nutrients. It also makes it easier to "stick to" the diet and not get bored with the lack of variety.

Most weight loss plans also recommend physical activity or exercise to burn extra calories. To lose one pound, you must either eat 3500 calories less or burn 3500 calories in exercise. A combination of diet and exercise is usually the most effective weight control plan. Exercise increases the body's metabolism or rate at which it uses food energy.

Before setting out on your weight loss trip, especially if it involves a vigorous exercise program, or if you have a special physical condition, discuss your

diet and exercise plans with your doctor and have a checkup.

These animal projects ranged from dairy heifers, beef heifers, lambs, and pigs; all of which were fed by the 4-Hers as their livestock projects.

Exhibiting at El Paso were Clay Schott, Clay Merrell, Langdon

Reagan, Russ Baird, Wil T. Bomar, Josh Brooks, Bradley Brunson, Christina Stephens, and Jeannita Stephens. Top placing pig at El Paso was shown by Russ Baird, with his heavy weight Hampshire barrow placing eighth. The highlight of the El Paso trip was a stop at Carlsbad Caverns on the return home. Parents providing transportation to the show were Wayne & Betty Stephens, Mr. and Mrs. P. J. White (grandparents of Merrell boys) of Wellington, and Bennie Reagan.

Special thanks go to Dale Smith for providing his 20-foot stock trailer to transport the pigs to the show.

The trip to San Antonio in mid-February proved to be as exciting and much more successful. In the lamb show, Robbie McWaters placed his middle weight Hampshire lamb tenth and received \$5.00 / lb. for him in the premium sale. Others exhibiting lambs and doing very well were Clay Schott, Clay Merrell, Warren Merrell, and Christa Tucker. In the junior barrow show, Julia Graham placed her heavyweight barrow fourth in the Hampshire show, Wil T. Bomar placed 20th, Penni Fogerson placed her heavy weight Yorkshire fourth, Bradley Brunson placed his lightweight Hampshire 16th, and Clay Merrell placed 21st with his middleweight Hampshire. All of these animals made the premium sale and received prizes ranging from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per pound for their animals. Others exhibiting barrows were Clay Schott, Langdon Reagan, Lance Bradford, Josh Brooks, Christina Stephens, and Jeannita Stephens.

Special thanks go to Doug and Jennie Bradford, Perry Brunson, Jack & Ruby Graham, and Jan & Warren Merrell for providing help and assistance in transporting the kids and animals to San Antonio. A total of 28 parents and 4-Hers attended the show this year.

Only one week following San Antonio, the 4-Hers and parents rushed to prepare for the Houston Livestock Show. A total of 37 parents and kids attended to exhibit 28 different animals. Warren Merrell and Clay Schott exhibited their scramble heifers (won in 1986 at Houston) and attended the scramble banquet. Over 2000 people attended this year's scramble participants awards banquet. Warren received second place recognition for best pictures during the year. Clay Schott placed third in Shorthorn Scramble Show and Warren placed 15th in the Holstein Scramble Show. Both boys exhibited again in the overall junior show and did not place.

Langdon Reagan also exhibited his Shorthorn heifer in the junior show and placed 6th, doing extremely well.

The junior lamb show proved to be just as exciting. Highlighted by Clay Merrell placing his heavy weight southdown tenth, and received \$5.25 per pound in the premium sale. Others exhibiting lambs were Robbie McWaters, Kim Burson, Keeley Burson, Clay Schott, Bradley Brunson, and Brandi Brunson. Brandi was recognized by the junior Lamb show officials with the Hard Luck Award for breaking her wrist the night before the show day. Brandi's lamb was auctioned off in her name for \$24.00 per pound but the dollar amount goes in the Lamb Show Scholarship fund. Brandi will receive a cash award of approximately \$100.

The junior Barrow show continued to be exciting, grueling, and sometimes disappointing. The animals must first get through the preshow at Brenham, Texas to qualify for Houston. 2,800 pigs arrived at Brenham, and only 1300 were allowed to continue to Houston. Briscoe County 4-Hers qualifying for Houston totaled 9 of the original 17 head competing. 4-Hers meeting hard luck at Brenham were Robbie Weaks, Jeannita Stephens, Brandi Brunson, Russ Baird, Lance Smith, Josh Brooks and Jeremiah Brooks, Delynn Fitzgerald (FFA).

Of the others competing at Houston, Lance Bradford placed 12th with his heavyweight

Berkshire, Clay Schott placed eighth with his heavy mid-weight Hampshire, Penni Fogerson, showing under Silverton FFA, placed her Yorkshire 12th. These barrows all made the premium sale and received prizes ranging from \$1.50 to \$2.50 per pound.
