Beau Boulter Will Host

Farm Seminar

Congressman Beau Boulter (R. 13) announced today that he will host a seminar Friday, Feb. 13, on the agricultural credit problems facing many farmers and

the agricultural credit problems facing many farmers and ranchers, and the credit options open to them. Mr. Vance L. Clark, Administra-tor of the Farmers Home Adminis-tration in Washington, and the State Director for FmHA for Texas, Mr. Lynn Futch, will be present at the seminar to discuss the credit opportunities available through the FmHA, and to listen to comments and suggestions from comments and suggestions from agricultural lenders and bor-rowers. They will specifically ad-dress the Guaranteed Loan Pro-gram offered by the FmHA, in cooperation with local commercial banks and PCA's.

The seminar, which will be held at the Texas A & M Research and Extension Center (6500 Amarillo Blvd. West) will begin with a morning session for agricultural lenders, followed by an afternoon for area farmers and ranchers. The morning session will run from 8:45 a.m. to 12 noon, while the afternoon session is scheduled to begin at 1:25 p.m. and end at 4 p.m.

Congressman Boulter, Mr. Clark, and Mr. Futch will hold a news conference at 10:30 a.m. at the A & M Extension Center.

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New Heart Device At Methodist Hosp.

A FREE PEOPLE

Methodist Hospital has been elected as one of six sites in the nation to perform clinical investi-gations with a new heart-assist device that may save the lives of as many as 20 heart surgery as many as 20 heart surgery patients a year in the Lubbock

area. Symbion, Inc., manufacturer of the acute ventricular assistance device, has chosen Methodist Hospital to use the equipment under U.S. Food and Drug Administration approval. Dr. H. Andrew Hansen, a Lubbock cardiovascular surgeno on staff at the hospital, is the only physician now authorized here to implant the device.

the device. Hansen expects the device to be used at Methodist Hospital for the first time sometime in early

spring. The device, called AVAD, is an The device, called AVAD, is an extertnal system of plastic tubing implanted during heart surgery. In the past, patients who were un-able to be weaned from a heart-lung machine had only the intra-aortic balloon pump as a mechanical assist during surgery. "AVAD bypasses the side of the heart that is injured or in failure and allows the heart to recuperate," Hansen said. "We estimate that the lives of between 12 and 20 patients a year can be





However, credits earned before 70 continue to supplement the benefit. To see how credits can boost benefits, let us say you are now 65 and could get a \$500 Social Security check. Instead, you decide to work full time to 68 when you retire. Your benefit would increase by 9 percent, or \$45 a month. The increase due to the credits would be \$540 for the year.

Your statement will include an estimate of what your full retirement bene-fit may be. If you plan to work past a way, you can then add an anount for delayed retirement benefit. 




