Government Commodities To Be Distributed

Cheese will be given away in Quitaque Tuesday, February 17th (afternoon only) and Wednesday February 18th at the City Hall. Turkey is set for Friday, February 20th at the Senior Citizens room in Turkey.

You must bring verification of income with you, such as check, deposit slip, check stub, Income Tax statement, Social Security

statement, or statement from employee.

Types of income that you must report are: Gross wages or salary, Social Security benefits, Veteran's benefits, Worker's compensation

benefits, Regular insurance payments, military allotments, child support payments, net self-employment

income, regular monthly cash contributions or allowances that help the household meet its usual living expenses, unemployment compensation, income from rental property & net farm income.

You are eligible to receive commodities if you receive AFDC, Food stamps, medical assistance of SSI, but you must furnish verification.

These rules are set up by Texas Department of Human Services and must be abided by.

COMMODITY PROGRAM TO BE FROZEN

We have been notified through Panhandle Community Services in Amarillo that USDA has held up funding to the states because of a presidential order.

If Federal funds remain frozen the commodity program will be discontinued after the February distribution.

You need to write to your Congressman and encourage his support in getting funds for this valuable and needed program.

Beau Boulter Will Host Farm Seminar

Congressman Beau Boulter (t-13) announced today that he will host a seminar Friday, Feb. 13, on the agricultural credit problems facing many farmers and ranchers, and the credit options open to them.

Mr. Vance L. Clark, Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration in Washington, and the State Director for FmHA for Texas, Mr. Lynn Futch, will be present at the seminar to discuss the credit opportunities available through the FmHA, and to listen to comments and suggestions from agricultural lenders and borrowers. They will specifically address the Guaranteed Loan Program offered by the FmHA, in cooperation with local commercial banks and PCA's.

The seminar, which will be held at the Texas A & M Research and Extension Center (6500 Amarillo Blvd. West) will begin with a morning session for agricultural lenders, followed by an afternoon for area farmers and ranchers. The morning session will run from 8:45 a.m. to 12 noon, while the afternoon session is scheduled to begin at 1:25 p.m. and end at 4 p.m.

Congressman Boulter, Mr. Clark, and Mr. Futch will hold a news conference at 10:30 a.m. at the A & M Extension Center.

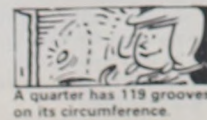

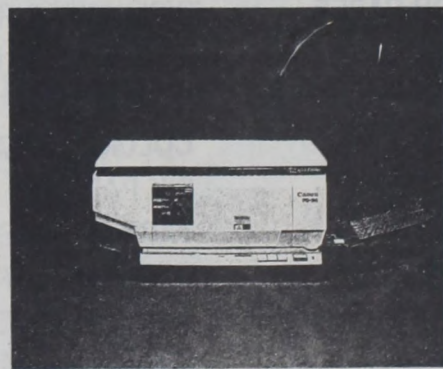

Extension Service

 The 1987 Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show went off without a hitch and can be termed "Nothing short of a huge success." The hard work of all the FFA members, 4-H members, and parents was very impressive. It always astounds me how people support youth activities such as this, in such a tough economic time. The entire community's support for the program is very encouraging to me, the Ag teachers, leaders, parents, and the children. You can be assured, through your support, that you have invested in the future of some boy or girl who will become a leader of tomorrow. I sincerely thank everybody who contributed to this year's event. Without you, nothing could have been accomplished.

4-H members are preparing, this week, to carry pigs, lambs and heifers to El Paso (Feb. 6-11), San Antonio (Feb. 11-20), Houston (Feb. 27-March 8) and San Angelo (March 11-14). Your continued support for them in the next 30 days will be much appreciated. A total of 72 animals are entered at

the major shows just listed. I wish each of these members and the FFA members in our county the very best of luck at each of these shows.

I urge you to contact my secretary, Norma Garcia, in the morning hours, of any problems or help you need. HAVE REASON FOR PRUNING WOODY ORNAMENTALS

Don't whack away at woody ornamentals in your yard unless they really need pruning.

Some of the right reasons for pruning include removing dead or winter-killed growth or balancing the top with the root system when setting out new plants.

Exposing the structural form of plants such as crape myrtles can be done by removing overly dense growth or small, twiggy limbs that cross one another. Also remove diseased or insect-injured wood as well as storm or accident-damaged limbs.

Shrubs can be rejuvenated by removing older branches at the base, says Aaron. Pruning also can help develop a desired shape or size as well as aid in producing better flowers and fruit.

If possible, avoid severe pruning, advises Aaron. It is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to sensitive inner branches. Never leave stubs that invite insects and disease to enter.

Plants which bloom in early spring with the appearance of new leaves should be pruned after they flower. Those that bloom later in the spring or summer should be pruned during the dormant season.

For any pruning operations, always use sharp tools, adds Aaron.

For additional pruning information, get a copy of B-1347, "Pruning and Training Landscape Plants," at the county Extension office.

Social Security News

You probably know Social Security pays full retirement benefits at 65 or a permanently reduced amount as early as 62. But did you know you can get an extra "bonus" if you decide to delay retirement past 65?

Here is how you earn delayed retirement credits if you will soon be 65. You earn a credit of 1/4 of 1 percent for each month from 65 through 69 that no benefit is paid due to your work. This amounts to 3 percent a year. Your benefit will be permanently increased by that percentage when it is finally paid.

The current maximum credit is 15 percent for someone who gets no benefits at all until 70. Credits cannot be earned after 70 because benefits can be paid from that point on regardless of earnings. However, credits earned before 70 continue to supplement the benefit.

To see how credits can boost benefits, let us say you are now 65 and could get a \$500 Social Security check. Instead, you decide to work full time to 68 when you retire. Your benefit would increase by 9 percent, or \$45 a month. The increase due to the credits would be \$540 for the year.

In addition, your benefit could be even higher for two reasons. First your benefit rate will be increased to keep pace with the cost of living. Second, your additional earnings from 65 through 69 may result in a higher benefit.

If you reach 65 in 1990 or later, you will do even better. The annual credit increases to 3 and 1/2 percent for 1990, and it will continue to increase gradually until it is 8 percent by 2009. (By 2008, though, the age for full retirement benefits will be 66, so credits will be applied only from 66 on.)

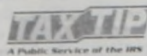
You may wish to request a free statement of earnings reported on your Social Security record if you are approaching retirement age. Any Social Security office has a form for doing this. Your statement will include an estimate of what your full retirement benefit may be. If you plan to work past 65 and not get benefits right away, you can then add an amount for delayed retirement credits to determine your total benefit.

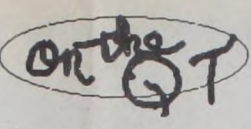
