### Shirttail Sermon

A short time ago, while lingering in a filling station, I watched a young man striving to remove a truck tire from a wheel. He was having a hard time and becoming more frustrated by the minute, when an older attendant walked by, stopped and said, "Why don't you try something different?" He took two irons and in a few minutes, apparently with little effort, had the tire off.

Most of us could sympathize with the young man because we have been in similar situations. As we look back, we sometimes wonder if it would not have been wise to have tried something different.

On one occasion when the disciples of Jesus Christ tried to make preparations for food and shelter, the villagers would not admit Him. The disciples then suggested that fire be summoned from heaven to destroy the village, but Jesus rebuked them saying, "Ye know not what manner of spirit ye are of. For the Son of Man is not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them." "Try something different," in other words.

Considering our situation today, we find that men have tried: to build a world of brotherhood by the machinery of war, establish fellowship by feeding racial prejudice, to use force and violence in "guaranteeing" national security, to dispose of criminals by a prison sentence, to put money first in life, to make a pretense of trusting God. They have not tried: to build a friendly world by faith and understanding, to lead the race toward a wiser, more just and merciful social order, to fortify the nation by the use of faith and love, to give guidance to the erring, to work for the good of all, to make an earnest trial of the God-like Way of Life.

The county committee has the primary responsibility of tailoring the farm programs to fit the needs of the county by setting policy and goals within national and state limits, reviewing work and fiscal plans, progress and accomplishments; insuring farmer and public understanding of ASCS programs through a public relations program; recommending desired program changes to the state committee; and cooperating with other USDA agencies to give the best possible service to farmers.

An indication of the importance of the office held by the three county committeemen is the amount of program funds administered by them. The administrative budget for 1969 which includes salaries, rent, supplies and utilities for the office is \$61,000. The Agricultural Conservation Program which assists farmers in performing necessary conservation work will spend approximately \$45,000 for the calendar year of 1969.
