The depth of penetration was not immediately learned and it was not known whether or not the sight would be permanently impair-

JURY DUTY

One of these days - perhaps soon - you may get a notice telling you to report for jury duty -- and to "fail not." In serving, be gladly corrected upon being you share one of the most solemn duties known to our demo-

> Some people try to get out of Jury service. It may be inconvenient or unpleasant. Yet, when you are put on a judy you should think of this as a chance to help make good one of the promises of our Constitution -- trial by jury. Say the following to your-

> "My forefathers wrested my right to serve as a juror from

"Under our law no one's life. liberty, or property can be taken

without due process of law. "Trial by jury is our basic right. A'll who seek their day in court should have a fair hear-

ing. They will get it from me. "I will not ask to be excused from jury service except in an emergency.

'On my oath I will well and truly try each case before me, and a true verdict render under the law given me by the judge and the evidence at the trial without fear, favor, or hope of reward

"I will listen closely, with open mind to all of the testimony, instructions, and arguments. I will not make up my mind until all the facts are in and the judge has instructed the jury on the

law "I will search for the truth regardless of wealth or poverty, friendship or enmity, of any party or witnesses.

"To someone my decision may mean the difference between freedom or imprisonment, pov-

erty or wealth. "Justice, once but a dream, is a reality when I, as a juror, do ************ my full duty. No act of mine shall bring shame to our system of liberty under law."





SOIL CONSERVATIONS DISTRICT NEWS



By D. C. Cox

"Brush control work involves intensive management if success is to be had," B. B. Hickman, farmer-rancher and supervisor covery. of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District states.

Dozing brush is just the beginning of a brush control program, according to Hickman. He finds goating sprouts and reseeding to native or introduced grasses coupled with timely deferments is vital for production of livestock feed in sufficient volume to pay for cost of control work. Root plowing of shinnery and oak is not considered advisable by Hickman. However he states this method of brush control to be applicable on mesquite, blue brush and other type of woody vegetation not readily controlled by goats.

Hickman has experienced some of the hazards of brush control work on a 320 acre brush pasture. He first started this program in 1947, along with his conservation program on the remaining portion of his approximate 4000 acre farm and ranch.

by Hickman in brush control work is to develop a plan for the ham. complete job. Such a plan includes method of dozing or suppressing brush, applying grass seed where native grasses are not present, flush grazing with goats and timely rotation or deferred grazing to favor grass growth. He finds two or three flush grazings for periods of 10 to 30 days with enough goats to clean leaves from sprouts helps eliminate competition to grasses and keep brush under control. gram Hickman has been most kind will be a great consolation. successful with spring dozed oak. Spring control is easier because young buds are more palatable and are eaten more readily by summer of fall growth. Hickman further points out the importance of spring goating in favoring grass use. He has observed goating brush in the summer and fall when sprouts are less palatable gives rise to greater use of grass in the overall management program.

Grass affords the most pracbrush. Hickman thinks. After plowed or cut and temporarily set back by flush goating, grass in the management program. nutritious livestock feed is es-Late spring and summer deferment has been most profitable for grass recovery on the Hickman ranch.

Brush affords little grazing as compared to grass, Hickman reminds. Even though many farmers and ranchers may not want to eradicate all brush, Hickman opinions the merits of grass cover in keeping the invasion of brush under control can be made a basis for profitable use on many acres of low producing now occupied by dense brush or timber. He has found that careful management with goats can be a profitable operation while the same time suppressing brush. Of course, Hickman states the use of mechanical measures on other than oak brush has considerably more merit and is providing profitable in many instances where management is made a part of the brush control program.



School Apportionment Raised The State Board of Education raised the per capita school apportionment \$3. to \$76 per student for 1955-56.

The board approved an estimate of \$278,240,000 as the cost for the minimum foundation school program. By law, the local districts must contribute 20 per cent of this, or \$55,430,000.

Each county and each district's obligation to the foundation program will be apportioned on the economic index.
