**Texas Lottery Tickets On Sale
 At Turkey, Quitaque Locations**

Texans began playing "Lone Star Millions" on Friday, May 29, 1992. Lottery tickets officially went on sale at 6:00 a.m. Anyone over 18 years of age can play. State comptroller employees and their families, and the employees and families of the Lottery's primary contractors are not eligible to play.

By opening day nearly 15,000 Texas retail locations were licensed and equipped to sell tickets. Eventually, as many as 17,000 retailers may hold licenses. Quitaque and Turkey residents may purchase lottery tickets at both Allsup's stores.

To play the lottery, a person pays one dollar and receives a ticket. The player scratches the latex covering off of all six stars on the front of the ticket. Under each star is a prize amount ranging from \$2 to \$10,000 or the word "Entry." a ticket with three matching prize amounts wins that amount. The overall odds of winning an instant prize are one in 7.9. A player who finds "Entry" under three stars can enter a weekly drawing with a grand prize of one million dollars, in cash.

Prize amounts less than \$600.00 will be issued on the spot by the lottery retailer. Any prize amount of \$600.00 or more must be claimed at an official Lottery Claim Center. One of every 600 tickets in "Lone Star Millions" will be an "Entry" ticket, entitling the player to enter one of twelve weekly drawings for a million dollar cash prize. No other lottery has ever started up with nearly that many large cash prizes.

The Claim Centers will make sure that the winners owe no back state taxes and are not delinquent in child support payments or state guaranteed student loans before issuing the winning checks.

**Local People To
 Work In Prison
 At Tulia Facility**

The new 500 bed prison in Tulia, known as the Swisher County Detention Facility is expected to generate a boost to the city and its surrounding area.

The facility is set to open June 15, 1992 and will employ 160-170 people, including several from Quitaque and Silverton.

Some local residents have recently been enrolled in school for prison guard training. These ladies and men are set to complete the training on June 13. Several have been offered jobs at the Swisher County Detention Facility.

The facility will also employ local people in the mailroom and in the clerical department.

These new jobs not only benefit the city of Tulia, but have been a major boost for the entire area economy.

Other local people who were not hired at the Swisher County facility still hope to be employed in either Amarillo or Childress.

There will be twenty-four Lottery Claim Centers in the State of Texas. Amarillo and Lubbock will both have Claim Centers.

Each dollar that a player spends to play the Lottery is divided as follows: 45% prizes to winners; 40% profit to state; 10% administrative cost; and 5% commissions to merchants.

The Texas Lottery will be operated with just 186 state employees--compared to 1,000 in California and 775 in Florida. Thus far, the Texas Lottery

events have run smoothly and efficiently. Officials hope to start phase two of the lottery within the next six months. These are the so-called on-line games such as Lotto, where players pick their own winning numbers.

In the meantime, Texans can begin buying game tickets and trying their luck at winning with "Lone Star Millions."

The first day the lottery tickets were available 1,000 were sold in Quitaque and 987 were purchased in Turkey.

**Help For Addicted Gamblers
 Available Through Hotline**

While May 29 marked the inauguration of the Texas Lottery and the fun and excitement that surrounded this event, it also marked the beginning of new services to assist Texans who may already be suffering from too much of a good thing.

The State of Texas, through the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse (TCADA), will provide services for problem and compulsive gamblers with the launching this Friday of a statewide 24 hour compulsive gambling help line, 1-800-742-0443. The funding for this and other planned compulsive gambling services is made possible by revenue gathered through the Texas Lottery and off-track horse race betting.

The Legislation that created the Texas Lottery appropriates \$2 million per year from state General Revenue to the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for compulsive gambling prevention, intervention, treatment and research programs. Changes to the Texas Racing Act will divert one-fourth of one percent (.25 percent) of simulcast revenues to TCADA for compulsive gambling prevention services. The statewide 24-hour help line is the first in a complement of services to address this addiction.

Bob Dickson, executive director of the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, says Texas has been given the opportunity to lead the nation in programming to help problem and compulsive gamblers. "In one motion, Texas has gone from no state program for this addiction to the largest amount of funding ever earmarked by any state for this purpose," he said. Dickson noted that Texas is one of only eight states to set aside funds for education on problem gambling and/or the treatment of compulsive gamblers.

Texas' help line for compulsive gamblers will be conducted through a TCADA-funded contract with the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling Inc., a statewide program located in Dallas. Those calling 1-800-742-0443, which will be listed on the reverse side of every lottery ticket, will receive crisis counseling and referral services.

Sue Cox, director of the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling and one of the state's foremost authorities on

problem gambling, says the compulsive gambler is already in Texas. "He or she is already betting on legal greyhound racing in the Valley and at Corpus, horses at Trinity Meadows, Manor, Fredericksburg or Bandera, playing bingo, betting on sports with a local bookie and flying off to Nevada or Atlantic City for quick hits at the casinos," Cox said.

"The May 29 beginning of the Texas Lottery created unique opportunity for Texas," said Texas Comptroller John Sharp. "Not only is the Lottery a chance for fun, the revenue it produces will help the State of Texas finance programs to help people who have needed it."

In addition to the toll-free gambling help line, the Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling will promote public awareness regarding the recognition and prevention of problem and compulsive gambling and will develop training for helping professionals. New TCADA regulations regarding licensure of chemical dependency counselors require that they receive compulsive gambling education, a change which should dramatically enhance the state's treatment resources for compulsive gamblers.

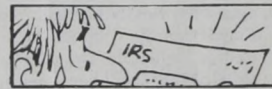

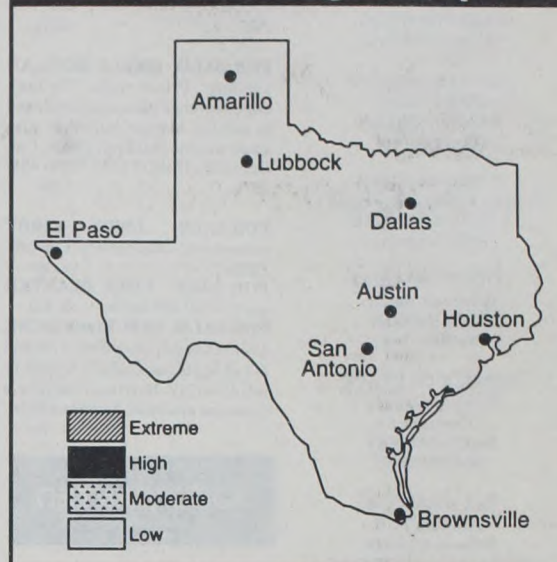

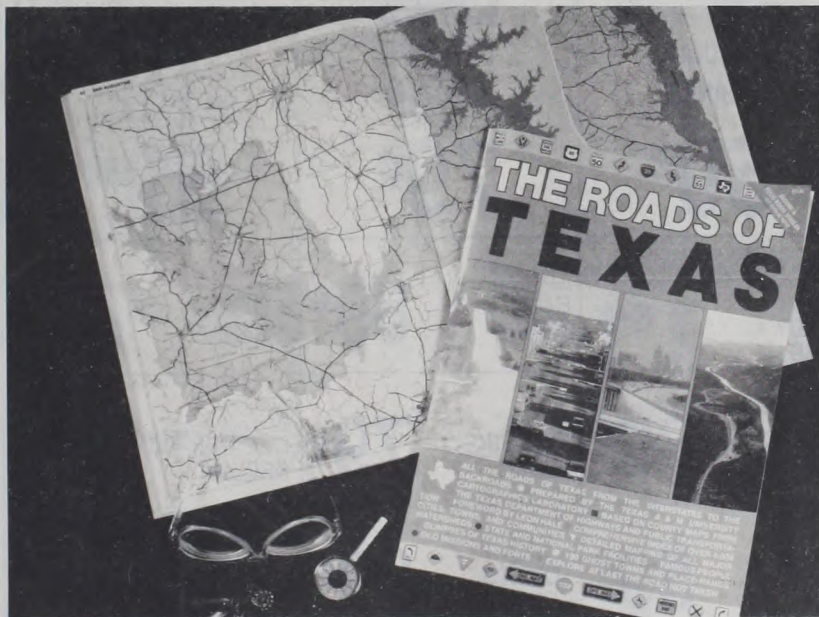
