Over 500 Lions Club members gathered in Dumas last Friday and Saturday, and Jimmy Ross of Quitaque was elected the new District Governor to reign during the coming year.

His election to this office is a high honor in Lions Club work, not only for himself, but for Quitaque and the local Lions Club which he represents.

As District Governor, Ross will preside over a territory which includes Lions Clubs from Childress to Friona and from Briscoe County to the top of the Panhandle. There are presently 72 Lions Clubs in District 2T1

ranging in size from six members to over 250 members. Ross has had an active role as a Lions Club member for the past 14 years. He has been a member of two other clubs besides Quitaque, where he has served as president and also two terms as District Zone Chairman. Besides his duties as incoming District Governor, Ross also will serve on the Council of Governors, which covers the entire state of Texas.

This is a high honor for Ross and the entire area, and congratulations are extended to him for his achievement.

Voting Was Light Saturday

The voting in Quitaque was light Saturday. It is a noted fact that when there is no national election involved, the people don't turn out to vote, then most of the time they criticize those who are put into office. There are only 138 votes cast out of approximately 500 qualified voters, according to City Secretary James Brunson.

The incumbent mayor, Jake Merrell, received 98 votes. He was unopposed.

There were only two councilmen on the ballot, the incumbent A. B. Ramsey, who received 96 votes and will retain his position. Randy Powell was the other candidate whose name was on the ballot. He received 92 votes, and will fill the position vacated by Joe Bedwell, who chose not to enter the race again.

In the Valley School trustee

election, according to Supt. Wilburn Leeper, Mike House received 138 votes, Betty Farley 31, Gordon Rothwell 37, Rusty Henson 92, David Setliff 130, Freda Fuston 44, Gary Chandler 77 and Eldon Martin 21. There were 288 votes cast. Mike House and David Setliff will fill the two vacated positions on the school board for the ensuing year. Arnold Castillo was presiding judge for the election.

In the Turkey City General Election, there were 129 votes cast. Hubert Price ran unopposed and received 116 votes. There were a few write-ins with Homer Hawkins receiving two votes and LaVon Gafford, J. R. Adamson and Tom Eudy each receiving one vote for the office of mayor.

Brian Wheeler received 80 votes for Alderman Place 1 and Billie Jean Robison received 50 votes for Alderman Place 4. Rex Fuston ran unopposed and received 119 votes. Keith Green received a write-in vote for Place 1.

Mary Beth Adamson was the presiding judge for the election.

Anti-Litter Resolution Adopted By Quitaque

At the regular meeting of the City Council Monday night, a resolution was adopted for the City of Quitaque to enter into an anti-littering agreement with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

This agreement would enable the City to defray some of the cost of enforcement of the new state anti-littering law. It would be the first step in joining hands with hundreds of other communities across Texas to enable enforcement officers to take the necessary steps to crack down on those who carelessly litter city streets and public property.

More information will be provided after formal approval is received from the state.

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen:

As a candidate for District Judge it would seem proper that I should publish some form of communication to you in order that you may know what my position is concerning some of the matters that a District Judge must deal with, the manner in which I think they should be handled, some of the policies I will adopt, and the procedures that I will use in the event that you elect me to the office of District Judge.

I have found in visiting with people during the course of this campaign that many people are concerned about crime and are displeased with the manner in which criminal activity is being dealt with in the district. I hear numerous complaints that many cases of alleged criminal activity do not get to the point of being considered by the grand juries of the respective counties. If elected to the office of District Judge, I will be sure that the grand jurors understand that they have the right to consider alleged criminal violations regardless of whether or not the District Attorney agrees or disagrees that such matters should be considered, that the grand jury understands that it has subpoena powers and may on its own motion cause witnesses to appear before it for questioning on the matters before it. The grand jury foreman may notify members to appear and consider matters that come to his attention and to the attention of other grand jury members. The District Attorney has no right to dictate to the grand jury as to the witnesses it questions, the matters it may consider, the time when it meets or the time it spends considering alleged criminal activities, and the particular charge in the indictments. The grand jury has a right to consider matters with or without the District Attorney being present. It has a right to notify the District Attorney and the District Attorney has an obligation to assist the grand jury if called upon to do so.

I have already told the District Attorney of this district that he may not expect me to go along with every plea bargain arrangement that he might suggest and I intend to consider the circumstances of each individual case before approving or rejecting a plea bargain proposal. Plea bargaining has its place in the system, but is not appropriate in many cases. Those persons who sell illegal drugs should be dealt with harshly for the reason that such sales totally ruin the lives of many of those persons using the illegal drugs and causes many crimes on their part to be committed in order to obtain the money with which to pay for the illegal drugs.

Rule 3 B(4) of the Code of Judicial Conduct provides that, A judge should not make unnecessary appointments. In keeping with this rule and in application of it, unnecessary appointments will not be made. Floyd County is the only county in the judicial district which has an auditor appointed by the District Judge. Under the provisions of our laws (Article 1645 V.A.C.S.) an auditor is not mandatory for Floyd County. Therefore, unless requested to appoint an auditor by a duly passed resolution of the Commissioner's Court of the county requesting such an auditor by unanimous vote of the Commissioner's Court an auditor will not be forced on the taxpayers of the county. As these are troubled economic times the taxpayers should not be burdened with unnecessary expenses. Under the provisions of the law all of the counties have an outside audit each year by an independent auditing firm and such independent audit would seem to suffice unless other requests are made by the Commissioner's Court, whereupon the request would be considered. In visiting with one of the commissioners, some of the other elected officials, and many members of the public, it appears that there exists a duplication of effort as a result of having an auditor and an independent auditing firm and also a county treasurer. The treasurer keeps an excellent set of books and with an assistant employed by the treasurer it would seem that the same purpose could be accomplished, and at the same time save the taxpayers many thousands of dollars. The cost of maintaining the auditor's office has almost doubled in the term of the incumbent District Judge.

The District Judge has been authorized by law to order the Commissioner's Court to pay certain expenses including the payment of lawyer's fees for indigent defendants. This is a broad power of discretion in that it empowers a District Judge to spend taxpayers funds even when some such expenses are not necessary in the opinion of the County Commissioners. I intend to consult with the Commissioner's Court of the counties before arbitrarily ordering them to spend county funds. This is a departure from the policy of the incumbent judge who has ordered the commissioners to pay certain expenses without consulting the commissioners.

It is the duty of a District Judge to see that the rules of civil procedure are followed in the trial of cases, to see that rules of law are properly applied, and in case of jury trials to properly instruct the jury. I will perform these duties by studying the rules of law and the interpretations of these laws which are contained in court decisions in order that errors on the part of the court will be avoided.

The people of this district are entitled to a District Judge who devotes full time to the duties of the office and does not engage in extra judicial activities in violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct.


The Rules of Judicial Conduct of this state are contained in some six pages in the statutes. They are not long and involved, but instead are clear, concise and plain. They are designed to keep and maintain a judicial branch of government in which the people may maintain faith that fairness and justice can be expected from the court so that anyone coming before the court will be confident in getting a fair trial. It will be fundamental to my serving as District Judge that the rules of judicial conduct will be scrupulously obeyed and followed and all of the people working under the District Judge and court personnel will be expected to keep and obey all of the provisions of judicial conduct.

In regard to crime and punishment, it is my opinion that appropriate punishment is a deterrent to crime and I believe also that the rights of law-abiding citizens should be protected by the imprisonment of those perpetrators of serious crimes who constitute a threat to society.

Probation has a proper place in our system of punishment, but I believe it should be used sparingly and only in cases where it appears that person deserves a second chance to show that he will straighten out his life and be obedient to laws of this state. In cases where a person on probation violates the conditions and rules of his or her probation then the probation should be revoked and the violator should serve his sentence.

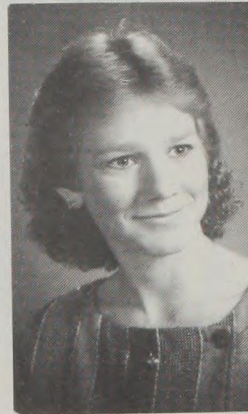
If elected to the office of District Judge, in cases where a person is found guilty by a jury or one who pleads guilty and elects to be sentenced by me as District Judge, I will impose a sentence that will be at least as harsh as what I believe that of a jury would have assessed in the same case. I do not intend to have the reputation of imposing light sentences for serious crimes. I hope such a policy will make criminals more inclined to elect to be sentenced by a jury so that some of the people of this district will have the opportunity to decide what punishment should be inflicted on people who commit crimes against the state.

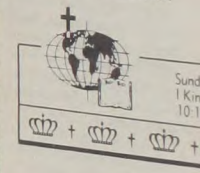



When asked if they were having fun, one man said, "It is

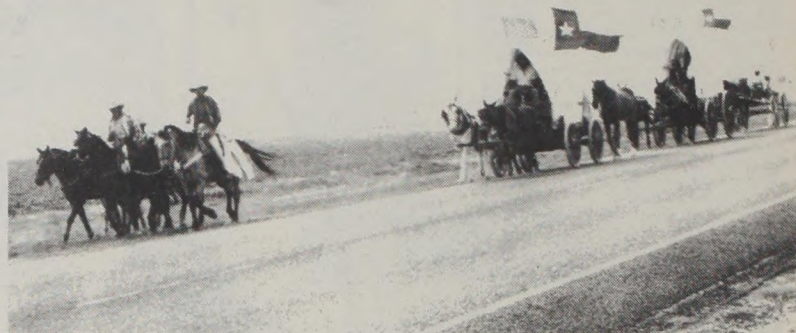
very tiresome," and another said, "Yes, it's great fun."



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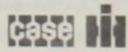

The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change is available at the general office of the Utility located at 401 S.W. 2nd Street, Tulia, Texas.

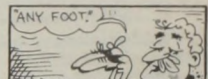
