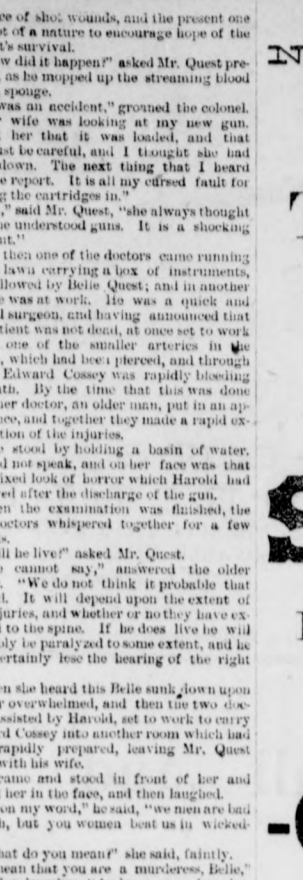
HE HELD THE BIBLE FOR WASHINGTON.
