January 10 New Filing Date For All Offices

The deadline for filing for office in the state of Texas has been extended to January 2, 1992. In Hall County Sherri Smith has elected to not run for Tax Collector. Troy Phillips who is now Commissioner of Precinct 3 in Hall County has filed for re-election. Buddy Logsdon has filed as his opponent. Sheriff Kenny Schull has filed for re-election in Hall County while Tim Wiginton has filed to run for the office of sheriff also. In Briscoe County, Sheriff Dick Roehr has tossed his hat back into the ring. Steve Miller will also have his name on the ballot for Sheriff of Briscoe County. Dale Ramsey, Quitaque Justice of the Peace, has filed for the unexpired term of David Brunson. Ramsey was appointed by Briscoe County Commissioners in September as Justice of Peace for Quitaque to replace David Brunson. Vonaceil Chandler has also filed to run for this unexpired term of Justice of the Peace in Briscoe County.
