Valley Patriots Tame The Mustangs 67-18

The Valley Patriot traveled to New Home Friday to take on the Midland Christian Mustangs Friday and came away with a 67-18 win. The win moves the Patriots to a 3-3 record.

The Patriots started off slow as the Mustangs were able to get the ball on the opening kickoff. This forced the Patriots to start on defense and the Mustangs came through with a 34 yard touchdown run.

Valley bounced back on the first offensive play when Clay Edwards hit Kirk Garner on a 55 yard TD pass. Warren Merrell hit Jason Little for the extra point.

Valley never looked back. Bubba Clardy scored on a 49 yard run on the next possession. The Mustangs scored again on a 32 yard run. Kirk Garner scored on a 61 yard run; Clardy on a 45 yard run to make the score 30-12. Each team scored once more before half with a 7 yard pass for Midland and a 44 yard run by Clay Edwards.

Valley came out the second half with 4 TD's-three by

Clardy and one by Edwards to close out the scoring, 67-18.

This was a great effort by the boys. The line did a great job blocking to help the backs rush for over 427 yards (Jason Little, Chad Isbell, Jon Pigg, Warren Merrell and Keenan Kindrick). Chad Isbell came through on the extra points and kickoffs. He was 6 of 7 in extra points and kicked 9 kick-offs into the end zone. Bengie Hughes did a great job taking care of the offense. The defensive play of Little, Merrell, Hughes, Garner, Pigg, Pointer, Edward, Isbell and Clardy was the best all year. When Little went out with a knee injury, Kindrick came in and did a great job at center.

This was a great win for us and the boys seem ready for this week. It's our last home game when El Paso Jesus Chapel comes to Valley at 7:30 p.m. Friday. This will be the second of four private schools the Patriots will face. The only bad news of the game: Kirk Garner will be out for the rest of the season with a hand injury. Jason Little will be out for two weeks with a knee

injury. They both will be missed greatly.

Briscoe Co. Treasurer Attends Conference

Janice Hill, County Treasurer, Briscoe County, along with some 200 other county treasurers attended the 41st Annual Texas County Treasurers' Conference in Lubbock, September 18-21, 1989.

President Charles Jones, Bell County county treasurer, called the conference to order. Among the speakers were Ann Richards, Texas State Treasurer; Jim Mattox, Texas Attorney General; Sam Seal, Executive Director Texas Association of Counties; J. Robert Brown, Executive Director of the Texas County and District Retirement System of Texas; Judge J. Q. Warnick, U.S. Magistrate Northern District of Texas; and Fred Anderson, President of the National Association of County Treasurers and Finance Officers.

During the conference, treasurers received an update on the 71st Legislative Session, information on investing county monies and cash management. Representatives from other county official associations participated in a session on cooperation.

On Thursday, new officers were installed at the annual CTAT Banquet and Vesta Leonard, County Treasurer of Coryell County was named the outstanding County Treasurer of Texas for 1989.

Texas Beef Cook-off Prizes Total \$6000

The 1990 Texas Beef Cook-off, featuring \$6,000 in prizes and an all-expenses paid trip to the national cook-off for winners, will be hosted this year by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the world's largest livestock event of its kind.

On February 16 and 17, the state's top cattle producers and the state's top amateur beef chefs--the beginning and the end of the beef chain--will gather in Houston to show off their talents.

The Texas Beef Cook-off is sponsored each year by Texas CattleWomen, a service organization dedicated to supporting the beef industry. The contest is open to anyone 18 years of age or older who is a resident of Texas and is not a food professional. Recipes must fall into one of three categories--conventional indoor, outdoor barbecue and microwave.

Social Security News

The Social Security act contains a number of incentives designed to encourage disabled people to return to work. For example a disabled person may continue to receive some benefits for a time while working. In addition, if benefits are stopped because of work, the reapplication process is simplified.

A trial work period permits a disabled person to continue to receive disability checks for up to nine months, regardless of his or her earnings. These nine months do not have to be consecutive; in fact, they can be separated by months or even years during which the benefits is not employed.

Any month during which a person earns more than \$75 in gross wages is counted as trial work months. For self-employed individuals, trial work months include those in which net

earnings exceed \$75, or the person spends more than 15 hours with the business.

After a trial work period, a decision is made about the beneficiary's ability to perform substantial gainful work. This means significant physical or mental work that is productive and is usually done for pay or profit.

If the person is not able to do substantial gainful work, benefits continue; if the person is able to do substantial gainful work, benefits generally are paid for an additional three months before they are stopped.

Immediately following this period is a 36-month reentitlement period during which benefits can be reinstated for any amount of non-substantial gainful work. During this reinstatement period, if a person has medicare coverage, it will continue.

Other provisions in the law are designed to encourage beneficiaries to return to work.

Counties Get Road Money

State Treasurer Ann Richards is sending checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for lateral road construction and maintenance.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

"The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage," Richards stated.

Briscoe County's share of the fund is \$13,709.91 for 365 lateral road miles, while Hall County will receive \$16,489.09 for its 527 lateral road mileage.

Adopt-a-Highway Goes Nationwide

The latest craze to sweep the nation is doing just that--sweeping America clean. The Adopt-a-Highway program, which originated in the Texas highway department, is being adopted nationwide.

"It's a plan we're proud to see the rest of the nation copy," said J. Don Clark, director of the department's Travel and Information Division.

A recent survey by the department discovered that 40 of the 50 states--80 percent--have or want to have Adopt-a-Highway programs.

Under Adopt-a-Highway programs, organizations volunteer to keep a segment of highway clean for a set time period.

Most plans stipulate two miles of highway for two years with at least four scheduled pickups each year. Other states use the more flexible "clean as necessary" policy. In exchange, highway departments supply safety vests and trash bags and collect the filled bags.

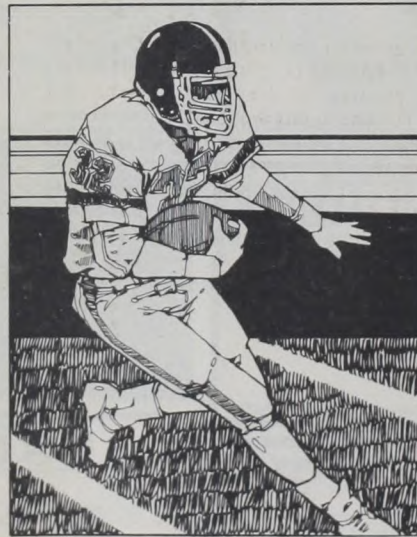

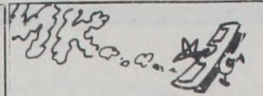
