The City of Quitquue volunteer services would like to ask all area law enforcement, volunteer fire departments and EMS participants to attend a two part class dealing with how to effectively handle emergency incidents. The Texas forest Service Incident Command System (ICS) is a nine hour course that describes the main features which constitute the

Collectively, these features identify the unique quality of the ICS as an incident or event management system. It provides an introduction to terminology, organizational structure, and the main facilities used in conjunction with ICS. It describes the planning process at an incident and decribes the stages of resource management.

The class is broken up into lecture, video tape, and table top simulation exercises. The final test is a simulation exercise in which the students put the ICS into practice on a simulated in-

## **Fireworks And The Continued Dry Conditions Spark Wildfire Concerns**

Scattered rain showers across the state have done little to dampen concerns about the use of fireworks this July Fourth

"We're optimistic," Bobby Young, associate director of Forest Resource Protection with the Texas Forest Service, says of the recent rains. "But we also realize that we're not out of the woods by any means. By the Fourth of July it (rainfall) may all be gone, so we're concerned.

Much of the state remains gripped by drought, and wildfire conditions remain high across most of West and Central Texas.

The "fire siege of 1996" has claimed more than 500,000 acres so far this year. In East Texas alone, more than 65,000 acres have been charred through Mayabout 3.5 times more than was lost in all of 1995.

And drought has dried up thousands more.

It would be "tragic" to lose any more Texas land, especailly to something like fireworks, Young says.

In an attempt to prevent fireworks-related wildfires, sev eral counties in the Panhandle recently banned the sale, use and possession of fireworkks. Other counties and cities across the state also are considering Young hopes similar action. those local officials will first gather input from their local fire departments about the situation and how they feel about the fire danger

Gray County turned to the governor's office for help earlier this month. County officials asked for and were granted an executive order from Gov. George W. Bush banning the use and sale of fireworks because of the drought and extreme fire haz-

But, the governor's office is urging other counties planning similar action to use the provisions of a new state law, HB 828, which allows counties to limit the use and sale of certain aerial fireworks during times of drought, provided the county

designates a safe area where such fireworks can be used.

The Texas Pyrotechnic association, which represents most of the fireworks industry in the state, has voluntairly banned the sale of aerial fireworks such as bottle rockets.

Professional displays aren't affected.

So, Young encourages Texans to enjoy such organized shows put on for July Fourth.

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

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## Yesteryear

June, 1958

Cecil Price turned in Quitaque's first wheat this year last Tuesday afternoon from a 14-acre patch just north of town. The wheat had been damaged by hail and there was a noticible amount on the ground and hanging from broken stalks. Price estimate of 20 bushels was raised by 6- 1/2 bushels giving him a 26 -1/2 bushel average for the 14 acres. Considering the hail damage, the wheat turned exceptionally good.

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## NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On May 31, 1996, Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates with each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing. Each city may suspend the proposed effective date for an additional 90 days.

The company proposes to increase rates to General Service (residential and commercial), Small Industrial Service, Large Gas Air Conditioning and/ or Electric Generating Gas Service, and the Air Conditioning Rate Rider. Additionally, the company is proposing to offer a new service, General Service-State Institutions, to state agencies. The company may implement a different rate design than proposed provided the increased revenue does not exceed that specified herein.
