Texas boasts more than 100,000 fish ponds or stock tanks and recreation. But a pond does not come without a plan. A good fishing pond requires planning, knowledge and hard work. And now is the time to decide how you will manage your pond this year, said Curtis Preston, county agent with the Agricultural Extension Service. By the time the water gets up to 60 degrees Fahrenheit, it's time to have your plan in effect.

A key step in pond management is proper stocking. Preston said. Most people believe that it is not too late to stock a pond with waterfowl. It's highly unlikely. First, the fish getting stuck to the foot are small, and for a fish egg to do so is impossible. For a duck, another pond with a fish attached to it and exposure to the air is unlikely.

Fish will swim into another pond or stream, you want a good fishing pond stocked.

For most ponds or tanks, an acre in size, only catfish should be stocked. Preston. For ponds larger than an acre, a combination of largemouth bass, bluegill and channel catfish are the best. Crappie or "white perch" in large reservoirs but become overcrowded and in small ponds and tanks.

More information on combinations and sources for stocking is available from the Briscoe County Extension Office.

# Briscoe County Extension News

Texas boasts more than 840,000 fish ponds or stock tanks which provide a wealth of enjoyment and recreation. But a good fishing pond does not come about by accident.

A good fishing pond requires planning, knowledge and a lot of hard work. And now is the time to decide how you will manage your pond this year, said Curtis Preston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

By the time the water temperature gets up to 60 degrees F., you need to have your plan in effect. A key step in pond management is proper stocking of fish, said Preston. Many people believe that it is not necessary to stock fish in a pond as fish will be stocked by waterfowl. This is highly unlikely.

First, the chances of a fish getting stuck to a duck's foot are small, and for a delicate fish egg to do so is almost impossible. For a duck to fly to another pond with a fish or egg attached to it and survive exposure to the air is even more unlikely.

Fish will swim into a pond during times of overflow from another pond or stream. But if you want a good fishing pond, you must stock it. For most ponds or tanks of less than one acre in size, only channel catfish should be stocked, said Preston.

For ponds larger than an acre, a combination of largemouth bass, bluegill and channel catfish have given the best results. Crappie or "white perch" do well in large reservoirs but often become overcrowded and stunted in small ponds and tanks.

More information on stocking combinations and sources of fish for stocking is available at the County Extension Office.

The Briscoe County Extension Industries Committee is sponsoring a meeting Thursday, April 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the Pioneer Room of First State Bank in Silverton. All Briscoe County farmers and ranchers are welcome to attend. The County Wildlife Handbook will be updated. Anyone not listed in the current handbook that would like to be are urged to attend. Women in agriculture across Texas will have a unique

opportunity on May 3-4, according to Curtis Preston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

A specially prepared 2-day marketing seminar for Texas women in agriculture is scheduled for the Holiday Inn, DFW Airport North, in Irving. The workshop is designed for women who want to learn the basis of commodity marketing. According to Preston, topics covered will be how to develop a marketing plan, understanding marketing alternatives, and how to utilize the government programs along with marketing tools. Marketing has been identified as a critical issue by Texas agricultural producers, emphasizes Preston.

Some questions that will be answered include: "What are futures? What is hedging? and What is a basis?" notes Preston. Seminar speakers will include women in agriculture that are helping make marketing decisions. Specialists from the Chicago Board of Trade and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service also will conduct parts of seminar, according to Preston.

## Radars Not Certified

Law-enforcement agencies in at least two dozen Texas counties are using traffic radar units sold with falsified Federal Communications Commission certification, according to a national motorists' rights organization.

The Radio Association Defending Airwave Rights, Inc., believes that drivers may have grounds for dismissal of their speeding citations if ticketed by officers using one of the improperly certified speed guns.

The radar unit in question is the MPH Bee, manufactured by MPH Industries of Owensboro, Kentucky, the association reports.

The certification issue was revealed in a Texas lawsuit alleging that MPH illegally used the "Bee" trademark of Broderick Enforcement Electronics. At least two state highway patrols - California and Texas - have pulled their MPH units out of service until the issue is resolved.

According to the FCC, the radar guns are using fraudulent "type acceptance" numbers. The numbers CIY8AEKF54 or CIY8AEKX54 appear on a label on the units. Two other MPH-manufactured units sold under the Bee and Justice labels also are using the same falsified FCC numbers, RADAR says.

Janice Lee, president of the Ohio-based association, notes that the FCC certifies only that a speed gun is operating on its assigned frequency, not whether it is accurate.

"Nevertheless, without commission certification there is definitely a question of whether the speed readings from these units is admissible evidence in court," Lee explains. "We recommend that anyone getting a ticket check the model and type acceptance number of the radar gun."

She also points out that there are no performance standards for radar units. Testing by the federal government and a police association revealed that few radar guns can meet their published specifications, and that radar errors are commonplace. Standards were proposed but never adopted under the Reagan administration.

"The radar industry said it would police itself instead," Lee adds. "But judging from this latest incident, it still appears that the industry can't be trusted."

According to RADAR sources, the following Texas counties use the MPH Bee: Anderson, Bell, Childress, Collin, Coryell, Denton, Eastland, Gray, Gregg, Kenedy, Lampasas, Lipscomb, McLennan, Navarro, Nolan, Potter, Randall, Scurry, Shackelford, Van Zandt, Webb, Wheeler, Willacy and Williamson.

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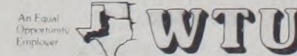
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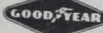
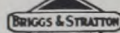


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## Valley Track Team Wins BIG At District

## Vacation Deliveries Suggested By Postmistress

"We will be glad to hold your mail at the Post Office for up to 30 days," says Postmaster Timmons. "Either stop by the office here, or ask your carrier for a hold mail card. Be sure to specify the dates which you would like your mail held, fill out the card, sign it and

hand it to a clerk or your carrier a day or two before you leave.

"The Postal Service does not accept requests to hold mail for one day or requests made by telephone," Timmons says.

"When you return, you can either pick up the accumulated mail at the office, or call and ask that it be delivered the next day. Since there may be more mail than will fit in the box, someone should be available to receive it.

"If you expect to be away for more than 30 days, you should consider a temporary address change," says Timmons. "Simply pick up a change of address order form from the Post Office or your carrier and fill it out completely, including the effective date and the date you wish to terminate the order.

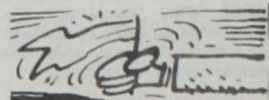
"This service is commonly used when families travel to vacation homes. It allows them to stay current with bills and correspondence. Again, it's a good idea to call when you return so that normal delivery will resume.

"We want to work with you to ensure uninterrupted mail service," says Postmaster Janice Timmons.

"If work or vacation should ever take you away from home, the Postal Service would like to remind you that there are several options available when determining what to do with your mail," says Turkey Postmaster Janice Timmons.

"If you'll be away just a few days and don't have time to notify the Post Office, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up any mail from your box," Timmons says. "Accumulated mail in a box is an advertisement that the house is vacant.

"Small receptacles such as apartment house boxes have a limited capacity. Your carrier will remove accumulated mail when the box becomes full, and leave a notice to pick up the mail at the

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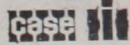

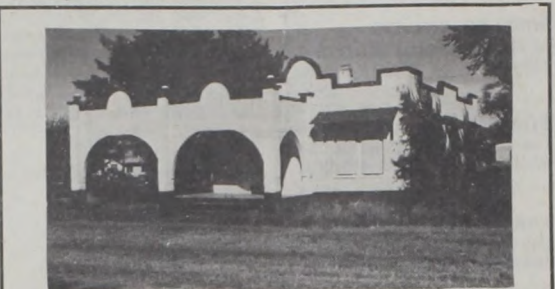

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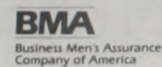
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
