The 1997 Briscoe County Livestock Show will be held at the Vance Price Memorial Barn at the Valley school, January 23-25, 1997. Activities will begin on January 23 with weigh in of steers and sheep from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Beef and Dairy Heifers will also check in during this time period.

The Cattle and Sheep Show will begin at 7:00 p.m. Sam Jackson, Ph.D., professor at Texas Tech University will do the judging in these shows. Schedule for the night will be Beef Heifers, Dairy heifers, Sheep, and Steers.

No shows will be held on Friday, Jan. 24 due to basketball games. However, swine weigh-in will be from 12:00-6:00 p.m.

Saturday, January 25 will kick off bright and early with the swine show at 8:30 a.m. Danny Preston, swine producer from Tahoka will be the swine judge. Jeff McGinnis, Agricultural Sciences Teacher from Hart will judge swine showmanship. This will be followed by the Pee Wee Showmanship division. At 5:00 p.m. there will be a Buyers' Brisket Supper which will be followed by te Premium auction and the Awards Program.

All 4-H members who are going to show in the County Livestock Show need to turn their entries in to the County Extension Office by Jan. 17, 1997. FFA members need to contact their school's Agricultural Science Teacher's to determine when their entries are due. Entry fees are \$10.00 for swine and sheep, and \$12.50 for cattle.

All county citizens are encouraged to get out and attend the Livestock show. Our county youth need your encouragement and support.

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Texas Tomorrow Fund Program Helps Students

John Sharp, Comptroller of Public Accounts, is urging parents and grandparents to take a look at the Texas Tomorrow Fund, the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Program. The program is designed to help Texas families with the cost of providing their children with a college education. During the first enrollment period, more than 40,000 Texans took advantage of this unique program.

Many Texans are still not aware of the Fund, or how the program works. It is administered by a board within the State comptroller's office, and members are appointed by Gov. Bush, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and Speaker Pete Laney.

The program offers parents, grandparents, and others a smart, low-risk way to purchase college credit hours today for their children to use at Texas colleges and universities in the future. With the program participants lock in the price today to pay for tomorrow's tuition and required fees. Individuals can prepay all or a portion of a child's tuition and required fees before inflation drives these costs out of reach.

Winter Weather Driving Safety

1. Keep extra anti-freeze, a bag of kitty litter, and battery jumper cables in the trunk of your car. Jumper cables will help you get started if you should get stranded and your battery runs down; and the kitty litter can be used to provide traction, in case you slip off the road.
2. Keep in your car, where you can get at it if needed, a blanket or two, a bottle of water, and a jar of peanut butter - just in case you happen to get stranded in the snow somewhere, and it takes a while for help to get to you.
3. Drive slowly, using every precaution; don't follow too closely to the driver in front of you; don't hit the brake if you start to skid - take your foot off the accelerator, and steer in the direction you want to go.

City Of Quitauque To Host Meeting

The City of Quitauque will be hosting a public information program on yard waste reduction alternatives on January 23, 1997, starting at 7 p.m. in the bank room of the First National Bank of Quitauque.

The purpose of this program is to inform area residents of the various options available to them for cutting down on the volumes of grass trimmings and wood/brush waste that are currently being hauled to the landfill in Tulia for disposal.

The city hopes to coopt resident support for these programs because of the potential savings they can generate in reduced hauling and disposal costs and because the programs offer residents an opportunity to beneficially reuse a valuable resource that would otherwise be buried in the landfill.

The City of Quitauque is extending an invitation to the residents of Quitauque, Silvertown and Turkey to come and be a part of this learning experience.

The workshop is being conducted as part of the City's wood/brush waste reduction project which was funded through the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

(Due to a death in the family, Then and Now was written this week by Tribune and Paducah Post publisher, Jimmie Taylor, for her Just Ramblin' column.)

Just Ramblin'

Dr. Joe Powell of Austin, one of my favorite people, and a former Paducahan who still, thank goodness, claims kin to us up here, sent me the following clipping from Ann Landers, which I thought might give you a laugh, too.

These are actual lines from student papers, collected by teachers around the country, and put together in an essay by Richard Lederer.

THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD

Adam and Eve were created from an apple tree. Jacob, son of Isaac, stole his brother's birthmark. Jacob's son Joseph gave refuse to the Israelites.

The inhabitants of Egypt were called mummies. They traveled by Camelot. Moses led the Hebrew slaves to the Red Sea, where they made unleavened bread, which is bread made without any ingredients. David was a Hebrew king who fought the Philatelists. Solomon, one of David's sons, had 500 wives, and 500 porcupines.

The Greeks invented three kinds of columns -- Corinthian, Doric, and Ionic. The mother of Achilles dipped him in the River Styx until he became intolerable. In the Olympic Games, Greeks ran races, jumped, hurled the biscuits, and threw the java. The reward to the victor was a coral wreath. One of the causes of the Revolutionary War was that the English put tacks in their tea. Benjamin Franklin invented electricity by rubbing cats backward. He died in 1790 and is still dead.



From Plains Cotton Growers

Producers and landowners across the High Plains are gravely concerned about the rapid spread of the boll weevil into area cotton fields. Despite efforts to reverse this trend before the boll weevil establishes itself permanently, a campaign of misinformation has been mounted by a group to eliminate the only program available with the ability to address the problem.

Unfortunately, many producers in threatened areas have been led to believe that the High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program they voted on, and overwhelmingly approved, has somehow mutated into a mindless machine that will do them more harm than good.

This is simply not the case. Instead of believing propaganda saying the program is broken beyond the point of salvation, High Plains Cotton producers have an opportunity to make their own decision and to protect themselves.

Say NO to the recall petition effort. Many times information sent out has purposefully misled producers with the promise of fixing problems to achieve its true objective - elimination of the High Plains' best defense against the boll weevil.

The winter of 1997 is shaping up to be one of the coldest experienced in this area in several years. Even though it will not be enough to totally eliminate the boll weevil from the best overwintering sites, it does promise to provide producers working together a chance to retake their fields and their futures in 1997.

Building on the successful programs of 1995 and 1996 the High Plains can win the war against the boll weevil. The 1996 program, coupled with the cold winter temperatures felt so far, should position this area to deliver a devastating blow to boll weevil populations and further the process of pushing the boll weevil from the High Plains.

Assuming the Texas Supreme Court rules in favor of the existing program, outstanding 1996 assessments will be due and significantly increase the ability of the 1997 Program to take advantage of the cold winter temperatures currently being experienced.

Many producers and landlords who originally signed the recall petition have had second thoughts about their decision and requested that their names be removed from the High Plains Recall Organization's petition.

Anyone who feels the same can use the "Petition to Have Name Removed" form to request their name be removed from the High Plains recall petition. These forms are available from the PCG office and can be requested by calling 806-792-4904.

It is very important that all name removal request be mailed to the Plains Cotton Growers office (4510 Englewood, Lubbock, Tx. 79414) before January 20 so that they can be turned into the Texas Dept. of Agriculture by Jan. 24.


Car Corner

(NAPS)—Radar detectors, used by 10 million to 20 million drivers to alert them to the presence of police speed monitoring devices, will now help make motorists safer and better informed of road conditions. According to the Consumer Electronics Manufacturers Association (CEMA), new "smart" radar detectors can be used for alerting the drivers to high-speed emergency vehicles, stationary road hazards and trains approaching railroad crossings.

In essence, since drivers check their speed and pay closer attention to what is going on around them when their detector goes off, a radar detector has always been a safety tool. Some municipalities and states use unmanned transmitters, or "drones", that set off radar detectors when approaching an accident-prone spot. Studies have shown that drivers do slow down in work zones where drones are present, however, older detectors cannot differentiate between a drone warning of a road hazard and police speed monitoring devices.

New microwave technology takes the drone concept a step further by providing drivers with specific information about high-speed emergency vehicles, stationary road hazards or trains that are equipped with safety radar transmitters. The transmitters work with older radar detectors, causing them to emit the same signal as when a speed monitoring device is detected. However, new generation "smart" radar detectors give drivers both a special audible and visual warning describing the approaching hazard.

Radar detectors are legal in all states except Virginia and Washington, D.C. However, for big commercial trucks weighing more than 10,000 pounds and buses carrying more than 15 passengers, detectors are banned nationwide by the Federal Highway Administration. Several bills are currently before the Virginia State Legislature to overturn the state radar ban.

Pruning Neglected Fruit Trees

Those neglected fruit trees that resemble a forest in the center can be pruned at any time now. The trees are sufficiently dormant following the low temperatures in the past 6 weeks. If the trees are about 8 to 10 years old or more and have not been pruned, they very likely are producing fruit only in the tree top and outside branches where they get good sunlight. If this is the case, they probably need to have a considerable amount of wood removed from the center of the tree. This can be done in a four-step process. Step 1 is to remove suckers that are growing from the trunk and roots of the tree and branches hanging below about 3 feet. Step 2 is to stand back 20 to 25 feet so you can get a good look at the entire tree. Look for limbs growing vertical and parallel that will shade other limbs. Remove 1 or 2 of these so there will be a high level of sunlight reaching the interior of the tree. For large limbs it may be useful to use a chainsaw to remove a large limb in 2 or 3 sections. The next step (3) is to lower the tree too so it is easier to prune, pick fruit and control pests in the top area. Finally, step 4, study the tree again and identify the branches that are growing at wide angle and away from the tree center. These can be left for fruit bearing branches. Remove branches that are growing closely above and will shade them. Many small branches will need to be removed to permit sunlight penetration.

When a cut is made, cut within about one-fourth of the supporting branch to which it is attached. Do not leave a stub. You may prune a tree somewhat differently than another pruner, but if you both prune to allow good sunlight into the tree canopy, you are accomplishing the objective of getting sunlight into the inner branches of the tree so fruit develops over all of the tree.

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
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
