Baseball Games Set For Saturday In Quitaque

Valley Braves will go up against the Memphis Mets at 3 p.m. and the Valley Orioles will attempt to shut out the traveling Cardinals.

cycling. All proceeds from the sale of cans will go back into the league for supplies, equipment, etc.

Conner and Maupin To Perform At State Meet

The Texas State Solo-Ensemble Contest of the University Interscholastic League in Austin will attract over 13,000 of the best high school musicians in Texas from June 1-3. There will be 70 judges with 700 schools represented. These will include all the UIL's conferences in band, voice and piano.

Property Owners Urged To Check Tax Notices

Property owners need to review the notices carefully. If there are questions or problems with the values, the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) requests that the taxpayer contact the appraisal district staff for an explanation.

If the values cannot be agreed upon, the property owner will have an opportunity in early July to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The deadline for filing a written notice of protest is Wednesday, June 20, 1990. The ARB will begin hearing taxpayers protests on July 6.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. The pamphlet is available at the Briscoe County Appraisal District office. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at the County courthouse in Silvertown.

Since this is the year for mass appraisals (an event which occurs every 4 years) all property owners in the Briscoe County Appraisal District should be receiving an appraisal notice on every piece of property they own, according to chief appraisal for the district, Carlye Fleming.

 Thousands from far and near are scheduled to be in Childress at 3 p.m. Thursday, July 19th, for prison groundbreaking, followed by a 4 p.m. reception, a 5 p.m. Old Settlers Parade and much more.

Announcement was made Tuesday by Diane Mashburn, groundbreaking committee chairperson. Every member of the Texas House of Representatives and Senate will receive a hand-carried invitation as will Governor Bill Cle-

ments, members of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice and other state and federal dignitaries. The list could go on and on.

Events will be coordinated with Childress County Old Settlers Celebration. The Old Settlers parade will roll down Commerce and Main streets at 5 p.m. with dignitaries invited to participate.

The barbeque follows the parade - everyone has an invitation.

Members of the Century Prison Committee met Monday noon to discuss preliminary groundbreaking plans for the \$18 million prison soon to be under construction.

James Driver, chairman, emphasized that time is important. Bids hit the streets May 7 with awards to be made in mid-July.

Members of the groundbreaking committee stressed that the event belongs to this community - Childress and the surrounding counties.

Transportation will be provided from Childress to the prison site on the day of groundbreaking.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials were in Childress Tuesday and Wednesday to interview 25 candidates for the four construction jobs advertised April 15 in the "help wanted" columns of The Childress Index.

They include a construction program coordinator; Inspector II Mechanical; Inspector I General and construction secretary. The coordinator is scheduled to assume duties here June 1; the others by June 15.

Cool Lunch with a Spicy Flair

If Chicken Stuffed Tomatoes sound like a nice idea, but a little on the "hot" side, surprise yourself with these tangy and tantalizing tempters. A combination of mayonnaise, sour cream, chili sauce, horseradish and Tabasco, added to the remaining ingredients of this recipe, puts a jolly jolt into very satisfying luncheon fare. Serve the tomatoes with fresh rolls or croissants and you will find that you need very little else to appease hearty appetites.

To enhance rather than dull the spicy effect, choose large glasses of sparkling iced tea for your beverage. The clean, fresh taste goes so well with any food, whether plain or fancy. Always use a good quality brand, and follow tried and true directions for the most satisfying results.

Traditional Method for Good Iced Tea

1. Bring 1 quart of freshly drawn cold-water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan.
2. Remove from the heat and immediately add 15 teabags or 1/3 measuring cup loose tea. Stir, cover and let stand 5 minutes.
3. Stir again and strain into a pitcher holding another quart of cold water. Serve over ice. Makes 2 quarts.

Chicken Stuffed Tomatoes

(Makes 6 servings)

| 6 large ripe tomatoes | 1/3 cup finely chopped green pepper |
| 1/2 cup mayonnaise | 1/2 cup stuffed green olives, halved |
| 1/3 cup dairy sour cream | 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion |
| 2 tablespoons chili sauce | 3 cups diced cooked chicken |
| 1 teaspoon drained horseradish | |
| 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco sauce | |
| 3/4 cup diced celery | |

Core tomatoes and remove seeds with a spoon. Cut into eighths almost to the bottom. Sprinkle the insides with salt and pepper. Invert on paper towel and let drain.

Meanwhile, combine mayonnaise, sour cream, chili sauce, horseradish and Tabasco in large bowl. Mix well. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover and refrigerate until ready to stuff tomatoes.

To serve, gently pull tomatoes apart. Spoon in chicken mixture, dividing evenly. Arrange on a serving platter garnished with salad greens or parsley if desired.



- 1 C. pancake mix
- 2 T. butter or margarine
- 1/4 C. firmly-packed brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 C. milk

Combine peaches, water, sugar and lemon juice in a 3-quart saucepan. Bring to a boil. In separate bowl, combine pancake mix, butter, brown sugar and nutmeg. Add milk, stirring lightly. Drop batter by tablespoon into boiling peach mixture. Reduce heat, cover and cook 15 minutes without lifting cover. Serve warm with ice cream or whipped cream. Makes 4-6 servings.

Here are three good news stories that may give you a lift.



A 250-pound antelope called Doolin the "Duelin Addax" broke one of his three-foot horns during a fight with his father in Boston's Franklin Park Zoo. This left a six-inch stump and a long spear-like horn. Dangerous to himself and to others, he faced a life of isolation. Zoo officials remedied this by reattaching the horn using a combination of plastic adhesives. Doolin is now back with the pack.

A Miami couple survived an ordeal at sea because they were able to pump fresh water daily using a new plastic water purifier. The seven-pound plastic device kept the couple alive as they drifted for 66 days before being rescued this summer off the Pacific coast of Costa Rica.

Forty years ago, if someone lost a leg, he or she would probably have been fitted with a bulky artificial limb made from wood, metal and leather. Today, plastics technology and new prosthetic techniques have changed all that. Light weight artificial limbs let amputees not only go back to work but also enjoy recreational activities. Although disabled, many of the nation's two million amputees lead physically active lives.
