City, School Election To Be May 2, 1992

Saturday, May 2, 1992 will be election day for mayor and city council members in Quitaque and Turkey.

Elgin Conner will be running unopposed for re-election of Mayor of Quitaque.

City Council members Janice Henson and Arnold Castillo will also be seeking re-election and running unopposed on the ballot.

Steve Farley, incumbent Mayor will seek re-election against Scott Johnson. Brian Wheeler and Rita Guest seek re-election to the City Council, each running unopposed.

Voters will also be choosing two members to the Turkey-Quitaque I.S.D. Board of Trustees. This will be for two full terms. Ronald Lynn Mullin, Clinton Pigg and Brian Wheeler are seeking these positions.

Voting boxes will be at Bob Wills Community Center for Turkey voters and at Quitaque Community Center for Quitaque voters.

Valley FFA Judging Teams Participate at State

Fifteen Valley FFA members participating on four judging teams competed in the Dairy Cattle, Meats, Dairy Products and Poultry contests at the Texas Tech University Area I and State qualifying contest on April 4th. Three of these teams will participate in the State Judging Contest this weekend at Texas A&M University.

The Dairy Products team with members Audra House, Julie Clay, Mandy Adams, and Joni Hancock placed 2nd in the Tech contest, 1st in Area I, and 1st in the Greenbelt District. Julie Clay was 9th high individual of the contest and Audra was 10th individual. There were 32 Dairy Products teams and 125 individuals in the contests. This team along with the poultry and meats team qualified for the state contest this weekend.

The Poultry Judging team with members Kacey Fuston, Katy Browning, Traca Lemons, and Krissi Pigg placed 7th in the Tech Contest, 2nd in Area I and 1st in the Greenbelt District. There were 30 Poultry teams and 122 individuals participating in the contest.

The Meats judging team members Chad Calvert, Bradley Price and Danny House placed 8th in the Tech Contest, 4th in Area I and 2nd in the Greenbelt District. There were 37 meats teams in the contest.

The Dairy Cattle judging team members Rickey Hughes, Josh Scog-

gins, Donnie Calvert, and Will Sperry placed 2nd in the Greenbelt District. Over 1050 individuals took part in the contest.

Valley FFA Entomology and Cotton Teams Participate in the State Contest

The Valley FFA Entomology team with members Bubba Powell, Danny Ulrey and Ralph Galvan placed 3rd in a field of 24 teams at the State Contest held at Texas Tech University on April 11th. Danny Ulrey was 3rd high individual of the contest with a score of 195.5 out of a possible 200. Bubba Powell was seventh individual with a 190.5 and Ralph Galvan was 8th individual with a 189. There were 90 individuals in the contest.

This contest consists of identification, order classification, metamorphosis and mouthpart determination and economic significance of 25 individual insect specimens. This team was 2nd in the Area I Contest and 1st in Greenbelt District.

The Cotton Classification team with members DeeDee Harmon, Bradley Price and Chastity Price placed 17th in the State Contest. Bradley Price was 3rd High Individual of the contest with a score of 860 out of a possible 1000 points. There were 30 teams and 116 individuals participating in the contest.
