Football Changes, New Faces Brighten Valley School Scene

Many new faces and changes in the faculty of Valley School were evident at the beginning of the 1994-95 school year. Eight new members of the teaching faculty and staff have been added, replacing those members of the faculty who retired or moved to other jobs.

With 275 students enrolled—91 of these in high school—Valley School moved up into eleven man football this year for the first time in many years. Included in the schedule of play this year will be Bovina and Nazareth for scrimmages; Groom, Claude, Smyer, Vega, and Aspermont, and district games with Motley County, Kress, Spur, Petersburg, and Lorenzo.

New head football coach and Texas History teacher is Brent Satterwhite. The Higgins native graduated from high school in Colby, Kansas in 1984. He attended WTSU and received his BS degree there in 1989. He taught and coached at Dalhart five years. He and wife Leah have two children, Kenton and Keslie.

Delane Brown is the new 6th grade math, Reading and Elementary Phonics teacher. She is a 1982 graduate of Valley High, and received her BA degree from Texas Tech in 1986, with teacher certification from West Texas A&M. She and husband Brent have two children, Cole and Caitlyn.

Elizabeth Hall joins Valley faculty as Biology, 6th grade Science, and Elementary Physical Education teacher. She graduated from Beeville in 1986, received Bachelor degree from HSU, Abilene, 1990; Master of Science in Biology from TWU in 1993. She taught four years in Grand Prairie and Garland, and she and husband John live in Quitaque.

Audrey Hill is the new 4th-7th grade Chapter I Reading and Math teacher. She is a native of Spur, graduating in 1987. She received a BS from Texas Tech, and has taught for one year at Cotton Center. She and husband Dusty reside in Quitaque.

Returning to Valley as 5th grade teacher, Laura Davidson graduated from Valley in 1979. She received her BA from Texas

Tech in 1983, and has taught six years in Hereford, Dimmitt, and Valley School Districts. Laura and husband Jon have three daughters, Macy, Molly, and Mary Kate.

Stuart Smith is the new elementary Special Education teacher. The native of

Shallowater graduated high school in 1983. He received his BA degree from LCU, and teacher certification from WTA&M. He taught at Memphis middle school for a year, and he and wife Vivian have

three children—Savannah, Isaac, and Chambray.

Dana Chambliss is the new business manager at Valley. She is a native of Winters, and was employed by Clarendon College for three years, assisting in directing the Carl Perkins Federal Vocational Program. She has had extensive experience in business and personnel management. She and husband Jerry have two children and reside in Quitaque.

Joining the cafeteria staff is Judy Wallace, who has had experience in various restaurants, and will be an asset to the cafeteria group.

Patriots Rout Mustangs in Scrimmage

Offensively, the Patriots struggled early, but began to get it together as the scrimmage progressed. Scoring for Valley was senior running back Alfie Clardy and junior running back Reggie Hendrix. Hendrix scored first up the middle from 42 yards out, and Clardy took a pitch from sophomore quarterback Matt Abram, then scampered 65 yards for the second score.

"I was pleased with the running of both backs and the blocking our line gave them. Matt was also able to stand in the pocket and throw the football, a credit to our offensive line. They have made tremendous strides in a short time," Satterwhite said.

The Patriots will scrimmage the Nazareth Swifts Friday, August 26, at Valley. It will start at 6:00 p.m. with the JV game.

The varsity also outscored the Mustangs 2-1. Most impressive in the scrimmage was the stingy Valley defense, allowing only one score in their first eleven-man outing. "We hustled to the football even when we blew an assignment, so Bovina had a difficult time capitalizing on our mistakes" said Coach Satterwhite. For example, when noseguard Steve Lopez intercepted a pass in the Valley secondary. "We never put our noseguard in coverage, but for some reason Steve saw it coming and made a play. You can't fault his effort or the result," the coach said.

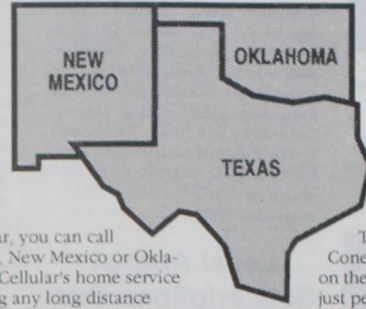
