Patriots Rout Mustangs in Scrimmage

On Friday, August 19, the Valley Patriots scrimmaged the Bovina Mustangs in Bovina. Coach Satterwhite said he was pleased with the results. "For our first opportunity in a game situation since going elevenman, I thought our young men performed well."

The Junior Varsity began the scrimmage, and outscored Bovina 2 - 1. Scoring touchdowns were Brian Moore on a 3 yard run, and J.R. Reyna on an interception. Both Moore and Reyna put in a solid performance at running back.

The varsity also oustcored the Mustangs 2-1. Most impressive in the scrimmage was the stingy Valley defense, allowing only one score in their first elevenman outing. "We hustled to the football even when we blew an assignment, so Bovina had a difficult time capitalizing on our mistakes" said Coach said Coach Satterwhite. For example, when noseguard Steve Lopez intercepted a pass in the Valley secondary. "We never put our noseguard in coverage, but for some reason Steve saw it coming and made a play. You can't fault his effort or the result," the coach said.

Offensively, the Patriots struggled early, but began to get it together as the scrimmage progressed. Scoring for Valley was senior runing back Alfie Clardy and junior running back Reggie Hendrix. Hendrix scored first up the middle from 42 yards out, and Clardy took a pitch from sophomore quarterback Matt Abram, then scampered 65 years for the second

"I was pleased with the running of both backs and the blocking our line gave them. Matt was also able to stand in the pocket and throw the football, a credit to our offensive line. They have made tremendous strides in a short time," Satterwhite




