Lubbock Woman Injured In Fall

Missy McNutt, 23, of Lubbock was injured when she fell from a cliff in Caprock Canyons State Park. According to officials, she apparently fell 30 to 50 feet to a rugged area off of the park's marked trails after 5:30 p.m. Sunday, September 19, 1993, while attempting to scale the canyon wall with a group. The group apparently were almost to the top of the cliff when McNutt fell.

About 20 park personnel and EMTs from Quitaque and Silvertown spent two hours rappelling down the cliff to rescue the woman.

She was taken by an Amarillo Medi-Vac helicopter to Lubbock University Medical Center. Her condition has been reported as satisfactory.

Unlimited Care of Tulia Opens For Nursing Home Residents

Open House at the Unlimited Care of Tulia facility at #9 Travis Road gave Swisher and Briscoe County citizens an opportunity to tour the home which affords care for disabled persons.

Guests were offered free blood pressure checks and refreshments were served with approximately 162 persons registering for door prizes provided by Health Star Medical Equipment. John Brown and Mrs. Delia Love were winners of blood pressure kits. Mrs. Helen Young was the recipient of a stethoscope. Medical assisted living equipment was displayed to show guests a segment of the total care available for residents.

Barbara Scroggins, a former Justice of the Peace and longtime Briscoe County resident is owner of the residence. The local Unlimited Care is affiliated with Unlimited Care, Inc., which describes itself as "a nursing home alternative." Kay Pace, president, explains that Unlimited Care, Inc., is "not a chain". We do licensed agreements with individual owners across the state". She said the arrangement is somewhat similar to a franchise situation, "but it involves totally local ownership. We are the only organization in the state, to our knowledge, that operates special care homes".

She stated that the Tulia residence and others within the Unlimited Care, Inc. umbrella are "special care" homes and not "personal care". She explained that "personal care homes are limited in the care that can be delivered in the home. With

special care, we can provide all levels of care in the home setting. Once they come to one of our homes, individuals never have to leave because all levels of care can be delivered within the home".

Ms. Pace added, "That's exactly why I started this business in 1986," relating to a personal family situation. "The main thing we owe our elders is the right to their dignity. I feel very strongly about it".

Residents in the Tulia Unlimited Care residence "will have a caregiver in that home who will take care of and love them if their family is not near or cannot visit often".

Explaining her decision to purchase a residence in Tulia for an Unlimited Care home, Ms Scroggins explained, "I chose Tulia so elderly disabled Swisher and Briscoe County citizens can have an alternative place to live other than traditional nursing homes. When individuals are unable to live in their own home or with family members, I firmly believe we can help them live with dignity in a residential setting that will provide quality care and individual attention. Family members will be encouraged to visit often and can have privacy with their loved ones. Residents can even bring their own bedroom furnishings to feel more "at home".

I am excited about bringing this health care alternative to a rural area. Although my residence is the first available in Tulia, special care homes have

been received overwhelmingly by senior citizens as a positive alternative to nursing homes in larger Texas cities. The reason I choose a nice neighborhood is because that is a place I would be proud for my own parents or other loved ones to reside".

A nurse director will provide regular visits and on-call service. Concerning a caregiver who will share the dwelling with residents while on duty and work with Ms. Scroggins, Ms Pace said "We're required by the state to do a certain amount of checking before someone is employed. We go beyond that. When you hire an individual to be with someone's mom or dad around the clock, you want to be sure to have the right person".

Ms. Scroggins said her Unlimited Care Home in Tulia "will probably have three residents with private bedrooms, but there could be more if a married couple or relatives choose to share a bedroom. The bedrooms are very, very large and could easily accommodate two persons. We will never put more than four residents in the home unless relatives/spouses choose to share one of the spacious bedrooms".

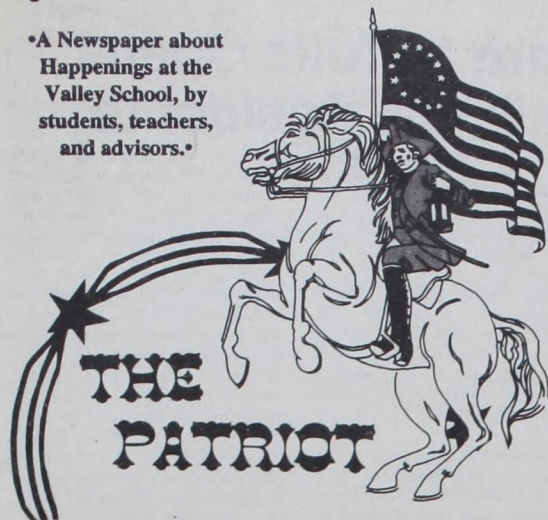

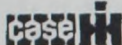

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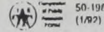
