Quitaque Ambulance Service Updated With New Ambulance

Recently the Quitaque Ambulance Service was updated by taking delivery of a 1990 Ford Modular Type III Ambulance. This unit was purchased from San Antonio Ambulance Sales, Inc. and was built by First Ambulance Center of Tennessee, Inc.

The addition of this ambulance provides the citizens of Quitaque and the surrounding

area with the most modern design in an emergency medical vehicle. The additional room and storage of this unit makes possible the best treatment for a patient.

Funds for this ambulance were made available through the Martha Cogdell Memorial Trust Foundation. This foundation makes medical services possible for many rural communities in

the area through its support of clinics, hospitals, and ambulance services. This ambulance is the second new unit that has been purchased with funds from this foundation by the Quitaque Ambulance Service. In the past, funds from this foundation have also been used to secure an advanced pager system for EMS personnel.

Immunization Clinics Set In September Patriots Geared For Successful Season

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for September. Protection against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, and mumps are offered.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the Clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

On September 11, 1990 from 9-12 and 1-4 p.m. the Clinic will be open at Memphis at the Texas Department of Health Office at the Hall County Court House.

At Valley Consolidated School children may be immunized on September 19, 1990 from 10 to 11 a.m.

Silverton Immunization will take place at the Silverton Elementary School on September 19, 1990 from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

Bob Wills Inducted Into The West Texas Walk Of Fame

On Friday, September 7, 1990 - Bob Wills, one of the most important figures in country music and known as the "King of Western Swing," was inducted posthumously, into the "West Texas Walk of Fame." The induction ceremony took place at 6:30 p.m. in front of the Buddy Holly statue located just west of the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Special guests included Dr. Charles Townsend, author of San Antonio Rose: The Life and Music of Bob Wills; Johnny Gimble, a 1949 member of the Bob Wills and his Texas Play-

boys band; Sonny Curtis, long time songwriter and past inductee; and the Crickets' J. I. Allison and Joe B. Mauldin, Buddy Holly's original band members, and also past inductees.

A concert, "West Texas Walk of Fame" took place at 8 p.m. in the Civic Center.

The Walk of Fame was dedicated in 1980. The purpose of establishing the Walk of Fame was to honor those individuals in the field of music and entertainment who have an affiliation to Lubbock and the West Texas area and who have made a significant contribution or gained national recognition in their field.

This gives a good description of what our EMT's contend with just to be of service to their community. So you see we can never repay them for the effort put forth on our behalf.

Amarillo State Fair Scheduled For September 17-22

The 1990 Amarillo Tri State Fair, scheduled for September 17-22, not only offers livestock, display exhibits, good food and a friendly atmosphere, but will also feature many other entertainment acts that are free with fair gate admission.

Appearing on the outdoor children's stage three times daily will be the David Sturges' Marionette Show. The Sturges' Marionette Revue entertains audiences for 25 to 30 minutes featuring 6 to 10 routines. Also for the youngsters, Hedrick's Educational Petting Zoo will be open daily and features some 15 to 20 different animals that can be fed and petted. Everyone may see the mama goats and babies, the camel, the ostrich, the Vietnamese pig, the zebra and other exotic animals.

Other special entertainment will feature the racing pigs. The little porkers will race four times daily at 11 a.m., 3:30 p.m., 5:30 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. Also for the fourth year, the popular West Texas Sheep Dog Trials will be conducted in the Bill Cody Arena, beginning at 4:00 p.m. on September 18th and 19th. SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

 Women who have changed their names through marriage or divorce during their working careers should be sure to check their Social Security records to verify that all their earnings are credited correctly.

Married women who are self-employed need to check their records carefully too. According to the Internal Revenue Service, some married women who filed a joint tax return and were self-employed under their maiden names may not have their earnings recorded correctly.

Name changes should be reported to a person's employer and to the Social Security Administration so that a new Social Security card can be issued. The new card will have the same number as the old one.

Although these steps should ensure that a woman's earnings get recorded correctly, it is still a good idea to send for and review one's earnings statement every 3 years. Errors can usually be corrected if they are identified early.

To get an earnings statement, call Social Security and ask for a Form SSA 7004. Complete the form

and mail it in. The statement will be sent in a few weeks. and the service is free. Social Security's phone number is 1-800-234-SSA (1-800-234-5772) and teleservice representatives are standing by from 7 a.m. to 7 a.m. each business day. The Plainview office is located at 1401B W. 5th.

Briscoe County Has No Accidents Reported For July

Capt. Rusty Davis, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of July, our troopers investigated 7 fatal accidents, 62 personal injury accidents, and 97 property damage accidents. There were 7 persons killed and 104 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Robert Gribble of Clarendon stated, "In Briscoe county, our troopers investigated no fatal accidents, no personal injury accidents and no property damage accidents in the month of July. No one was killed and no one was injured in any accident."

"Don't Bag It" New Lawn Care

Dallas-"Don't Bag It," a lawn care program that reduces yard waste going into landfills by recycling grass clippings instead of bagging them, has earned the Environmental Protection Agency's award of excellence for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Dallas.

Dr. Bill Knoop, turf grass specialist with the Extension Service in Dallas, devised the program which was piloted by the Tarrant County Extension Office and the city of Fort Worth with volunteer demonstrators.

"We had no trouble convincing people not to bag their grass clippings," said County Extension Agent Bob Whitney, who directed the Fort Worth program. Fort Worth city officials estimate that "Don't Bag It" prevented approximately 25,000 bags of grass clippings from going into the landfill last year.

"We have been very gratified to see 'Don't Bag It' expand to so many cities in Texas, and in other states, and be adopted by professional lawn care associations and other state extension services," Knoop said.

"Don't Bag It" includes specific instructions for mowing, fertilizing and watering. While the program calls for more frequent mowing, Whitney's follow-up studies showed that participants spent 35 percent less time mowing, and the appearance of their lawns improved significantly.

Briscoe County Extension News

Due to the extremely hot and dry weather this summer, spider mites have flourished on our lawns, trees and shrubs. Spider mites are microscopic in size and therefore are very hard to locate. These mites produce a distinctive web or sometimes referred to as "webbing" as does other spiders.

The symptoms are often mistaken as heat and drought stress. The leaves will turn yellow and eventually die and fall off. Spider mites, if severe enough, can kill all of the leaves on a tree.

Spider mites are wide-spread this year as I drive around the county and see many trees and shrubs infested. They are one of the hardest insects we have to control. Partial control is the best one can hope for. One of the best methods is to keep the trees, shrubs and lawns as healthy as possible.

Healthy means as little stress as possible. Water and fertilize to maintain a green, healthy appearance to the plant. The more stress a plant has the better spider mites flourish.

For homeowners, use malathion or a mixture of malathion and methoxychlor. These are the best chemicals we have to use. Be sure to read and follow label directions before using any chemicals.

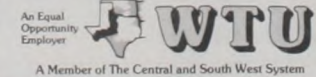

Sunbeam Announces Recall of Some Mixmaster® Stand Mixers Because of Electric Shock Hazard

Washington, D.C. — Approximately 1,400 Sunbeam® Mixmaster® stand mixers produced in the first quarter of 1990 are being voluntarily recalled by the manufacturer, Sunbeam Appliance Company, of Milwaukee, WI, because they may present a risk of severe electric shock. The recall, which is being conducted in cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), involves two newly-introduced models of stand mixers, the 01930 and the 01940. Both of these mixers have chrome-plated housings. These mixers were distributed nationwide from February through April of this year. No other models are included in this recall. Consumers who purchased a Sunbeam stand mixer this year can determine if they have an affected model by looking for the model number and the date code on the nameplate located between the beater openings of the underside of the mixer housing. The model numbers affected are 01940 (Service No. 1-94BZ) and 01930 (Service No. 1-93BY). The only mixers affected are those with date codes of JPD, JPE, FPB, FPC, MPA, MPB, and MPC. The words, "Sunbeam Appliance Company," also appear on the nameplate.

Quest For Grandparents Day Began In 1973

Marian McQuade, the Oak Hill, West Virginia woman who almost singlehandedly inspired the creation of National Grandparents Day, remembered her own grandmother this way:

"She looked just like Granny Clampett-the same size, dressed the same way, everything the same. She worked all day on her farm, milking cows, feeding chickens, fixing breakfast, doing the washing by hand."

"Then she'd put on a clean apron, or turn her apron around, and we'd take a glass of jelly and go see somebody who was sick a couple of miles down the road. She always had time to do that. That's the main thing I remember about her."

It was just such memories that drove McQuade, a mother of 15, to work with the elderly in nursing homes and to be a delegate to the White House Conference on Aging,

as well as serving on a variety of state foundations and commissions for the elderly.

Through her work with the elderly, McQuade conceived the idea of setting aside a special day for honoring people like her grandmother.

"I worked in nursing homes for so long, and it seemed there was so much loneliness," McQuade said. "Grandparents Day provides the opportunity for such a wonderful reunion to keep families together and give youngsters a sense of curiosity about their roots."

McQuade's crusade to have a special day declared nationally began in 1973, when she started writing letters to the governors of all 50 states, as well as many other national elected officials. At the time, she had five children still at home, and they did all envelope-stuffing. Her husband, Joe, financed the project. Finally, in 1978, a bill was signed by President Jimmy Carter, declaring the first Sunday after Labor Day as National Grandparents Day.

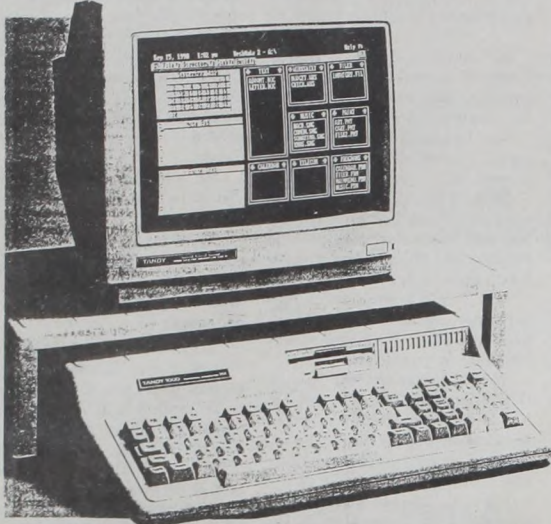

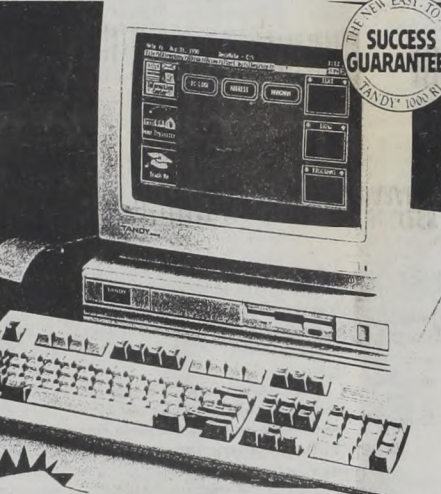
