

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

will begin school next year and never notice much change at all.

As students advance in grades more noticeable change occur in the curriculum. The enth and eighth graders will be affected to a greater degree be affected to a greater degree than the lower grades but even still, there will not be much difference in the subjects now being taken. Each student in those grades will be required to take English, math, science, social studies, and physical education. Each eighth grader be enrolled in computer literacy and every student in both grades must take enough electives to must take enough electives to complete a minimum of 12 units (credits) during the two-year period. The 12-unit requirement equals the current practice at Valley.

One noticeable change in Junior High which may affect a number of students has to do with students who have difficulty in reading. According to the plan.

in reading. According to the plan, any student in grades seven or eight who score one year or more below grade average on a standardized achievement test will be assigned to a reading improvement course. The student must take the course for the full year in place of an elective and all the other students will be

enrolled in an elective course.

The word "elective" is a bit of a misnomer because it does not mean that a student has an option of several choices of courses to study. It does mean that a school has an option of offering several courses and that the student must take those courses in order to receive the required 12 credits. The electives which the school will offer will depend upon the available teaching personnel and working out a daily course schedule. Those daily course schedule. Those courses which are approved for schools to offer in Junior High are speech, other languages, health, fine arts, typewriting, and vocational education



Area's Icy Past Is Topic of Study For Three-Day Field Trip

A three-day field trip of some A three-day field trip of some of the area between Estelline and Tulia with many stops in this area was conducted Friday, Saturday and Sunday. This year's trip was sponsored by the Bureau of Economic Geology in Austin and was led by Dr. Gerald E. Schultz, a geology professor at West Texas State University in

The trip began at Estelline and headed west with 18 stops being made in and around Turkey,

made in and around Turkey, Quitaque, Silverton and Tulia. Billy R. Harrison, curator of anthropology at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, led Plains Historical Museum, led the group on Saturday at the Lake Theo site at Caprock Canyons State Park. Harrison said the site was inhabited about 10,000 to 12,000 years ago. "The people were hunting the big Ice Age bison," Harrison said. "The site has a bone bed of the Ice Age bison associated with Folsom points. These points (flint

Folsom points. These points (flint points) are the second oldest

On the third day the group stopped to examine the area around a small butte located on the Mayfield Ranch near Silver

Roberta Speer of West Texas State guided the tour at Lake Mackenzie. She directed the archaeological research at the site in 1973-74 before the dam was completed. After the dam was finished, the area flooded and all sites were lost. She said the nine sites were totally or partially excavated and three were very important.


1983-GREAT MEAT YEAR

The year of 1983 was the "great meat year," and the near-record levels of meat on the market shocked many econo-

While 1983 red meat production did not quite match records set in the mid-seventies, it was up substantially from the pre-vious year and came close to the record high—only two percent

At the same time per capita consumption of meat and poultry set a new record of 209 pounds in 1983—up six pounds from 1982, points out an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

With even larger supplies of beef, slightly larger supplies of poultry, and fairly level pork supplies forecast for 1984, consumption could set another
