Scientist Warns of Sugar Intake

Americans who consume
 some 100 pounds of sugar per
 year each despite hazards of
 overweight, coronary arterio-
 sclerosis and dental cavities
 are getting a new warning. A
 British scientist is now
 directly linking sugar with
 heart disease.

While the American Heart
 Association has discouraged
 "excessive use of sugar
 including candy, soft drinks
 and other sweets," the
 Briton, Professor John
 Yudkin, M.D., Ph. D.,
 M.R.C.P., goes further,

"Coronary heart disease,"
 he says, "seems to be more
 closely related with the level
 of sugar consumption than
 with the level of any other
 dietary component."

The common belief that
 the level of animal fat in the
 diet shows the highest cor-
 relation with heart disease is
 simply not valid."

Researchers have
 commonly settled on a diet
 high in saturated fat and cho-
 lesterol as the principal cause
 of atherosclerotic coronary
 artery disease.

The Committee on Nutri-
 tion of the American Heart
 Association has warned
 against these dietary elements
 as well as excessive weight. Its
 published policy on dietetic
 dangers also recommends use
 of vegetables, cereals and
 fruits as preferable to exces-
 sive use of sugar.

Dr. Yudkin, professor of
 nutrition and dietetics, Queen
 Elizabeth College, University
 of London, zeroes in on sugar
 as the number one culprit.
 Experiments with young men
 on a sugar-rich diet and
 patients who had suffered
 attacks of coronary throm-
 bosis led to his conclusions.

The experiments with the
 young men convinced him
 that sugar is the biggest
 dietary contributor to
 coronary heart disease, the
 doctor said.

The subjects on a sugar-
 rich diet showed a size-
 of fatty acids in the blood

plus an abnormally high level
 of insulin. He said the latter is
 a probable early stage in the
 development of coronary
 heart disease.

Those patients who had
 recently suffered attacks of
 coronary thrombosis, he
 found in his studies, had been
 using an average of twice as
 much sugar as control sub-
 jects. This was also found to
 be true of men suffering from
 peripheral vascular disease.

Dr. Yudkin noted that
 coronary heart disease is most
 common in wealthy
 countries, in which the level
 of sugar consumption tends
 to rise.

Sucrose, or table sugar in
 laymen's language, has been
 linked by scientists for years
 with diabetes and dental
 caries.

Dr. Yudkin visited the
 United States to lecture on
 his findings. He addressed a
 diet-heart disease seminar in
 Chicago and visited research
 operations elsewhere.

Widening knowledge of the
 effect of sugar on weight as
 well as its other health
 hazards has stimulated fast
 growth of substitute prod-
 ucts. Diet soft drinks and
 beverage sweeteners led the
 trend, but now sugar replace-
 ment products which fill all
 uses for sugar, in beverages,
 cooking and sprinkling on
 fruits, etc., are being nation-
 ally marketed.

Like other fruits, apples contain some vitamins and minerals. Bottled or canned apple juice may be fortified with vitamin C.

There are many good all-purpose apples, plus others especially suited for preparing in certain ways.

Apples that "go to pieces" when cooked are usually best for applesauce; those that keep their shape are best for baking whole. Tart apples are good for cooking; sweeter apples, for eating raw. Some varieties especially good for eating raw are Red Delicious, Jonathan and Winesap. Good cooking apples are the Rome Beauty and the Winesap.

Be sure to buy good quality apples. Those that are mature when picked have the best flavor and texture. They should be firm and crisp, have a good color and be free of defects.

For a hearty salad, try:
2 cups cooked, chopped chicken (or turkey, pork, ham, veal or

a 13-oz. can tuna)
2 cups chopped celery
1/2 to 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1 tablespoon lemon juice
Combine ingredients and mix well. Serve on well-chilled lettuce. The youngsters will enjoy making CAMEL APPLES.

Combine a one-pound package of dairy caramels and three tablespoons hot water in top of double boiler. Cook over boiling water, stirring frequently until caramels melt into a smooth sauce.

Wash six red apples, remove stems and insert a wooden skewer into each apple part way into the stem end. Remove sauce from heat and tilt pan. Holding each apple by the skewer, quickly twirl it in sauce, remove from sauce and continue twirling to allow sauce to spread smoothly. Then dip bottom and sides of apples in chopped nuts if desired.

Place apples, skewer side up, on lightly buttered cookie sheet and refrigerate until serving time.
