DR. WINFIELD S. SIMS.

Elsewhere in this paper is an account of the troubles of Dr. W. S. Sims, the negro who recently made a hasty and abrupt departure from Colorado. The Pecos Times gives the following account of the Doctor's troubles in that city:

"Doctah" Winfield Scott Sims, the coon film flamer that has been "practicing" in Warn and Reeves, concluded that there was too much alkali in the ozone, and flew out west Wednesday. Before going the "Doctor" concluded that "fessionally" he needed some jewelry and promptly proceeded to work Mr. Ritchie for a watch and chain and a few rings.

Russell, County Judge of said Callahan County, constituting the entire Commissioners' Court of said County, and each one of us, do hereby certify that on this, the 14th day of Aug. D. 1901, at a regular quarterly term of our said Court, we have compared and examined the quarterly report of T. B. Holland, Treasurer of Callahan County, Texas, for the quarter beginning on the 15th day of May, A. D. 1901, and ending on the 10th day of Aug. A. D. 1901, and finding the same correct have caused an order to be entered upon the minutes of the Commissioners' Court of Callahan County, stating the approval of said Treasurer's Report by our said Court, which order recites separately the amount received and paid out of each fund by said County Treasurer since his last report to this Court, and for and during the time covered by his present report, and the balance of each fund remaining in said Treasurer's hands on the said 10th day of Aug. A. D. 1901, and have ordered the proper credits to be made in the accounts of the said County Treasurer, in accordance with said order as required by Article 867, Chapter I, XXV, of the Revised Statutes of Texas, as amended by an Act of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of Texas, at its regular session, approved March 20, 1897.

And we, and each of us, further certify that we have actually and fully inspected and counted all the actual cash and assets in hand of said Treasurer belonging to Callahan County at the close of the examination of said Treasurer's Report, on this the 14th day of Aug. A. D. 1901, and find the same to be as follows, to-wit:

BRAKEMAN MURDERED.

Jas. H. Tiddings, a brakeman on Conductor B. Bennett's train, bound west, was shot and killed on train about the town wells by some person on the train yesterday morning about 2 o'clock. The body was not discovered by the train crew until the train reached Clyde when a light was seen on top of the train, and an investigation revealed the fact that Brakeman Tiddings had been murdered. He was shot four times once in the back of the head and three times in the back. His clothing was burning, no doubt set on fire by shots fired at close range, which led to the discovery of the crime. The crew cut out the car on which the body was found and returned to town.

Constable Jas. Johnson and others went up and just beyond the wells where it is supposed the killing occurred, tracks were seen where some one apparently jumped from the train and a hat was found.

Constable Johnson telegraphed to Eastland for blood hounds which arrived in charge of Sheriff Noble about 12 M.

A white man, supposed to be the murderer, was arrested west of Abilene yesterday, also a negro at Putnam. Constable Johnson wired all up and down the road to officers to arrest all suspicious parties on trains and he is confident he will get the party.

Sheriff Irvin is absent some where in the country. Squire Oliver was holding an inquest when we went to press yesterday evening.

Jas. Tiddings was well known to the railroad men. He was about 45 years of age and had no family so far as known. His relatives live somewhere in Indiana. The body is being held to await news from relatives.

All the railroad men speak well of the deceased. They say he was a quiet, peaceable man and the last man they expected to meet his death in such a manner. That he was foully murdered, there is no doubt. It is sincerely hoped that the murderer or murderers will be apprehended and convicted.
