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Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and ex-tremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Memphis, FmHA county supervisor Dale R. Burris crid today

county supervisor Dale K. Burris said today. Hall County is one of three in Texas recently named by Secre-tary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses result-ing from the drought

of actual production losses result-ing from the drought. Burris said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, of \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5%; interest rate is 8% on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is

13.75%. As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Burris said. Farmers parti-cipating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss. their lo

Applications for loans under Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 7, 1986, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in
