## Lt. Gov. Predicts Defeat For Consolidation Bill

AUSTIN — Lt. Governor Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts in Texas.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them," Barnes said in a statement released this week.

"However, I feel that the Texas Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said.

Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf ears.

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory in Texas this year," Barnes said.

Compulsory consolidation and other recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education are included in Senate Bill No. 2 which was introduced last week by Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston and Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas. The bill has been referred to the Senate Education Committee.

## JO BETH MERRELL NAMED "MISS HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW"

Jo Beth Merrell has been named 1969 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Quitaque Schools on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls here December 3.

Jo Beth's achievement has made her eligible for state and national scholarships. She also has been awarded a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of the schools in the state. The state winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The runnerup will earn a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join in an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring.

The national winner — the 1969 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow — will be announced at an American Table Dinner in Williamsburg. The choice will be on the basis of her original test score plus observation and interviews during the tour, and her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

Second, third, and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

This is the 15th year of the Betty Crocker Search, initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than six million senior girls have participated in the search since its inception, and 1,460 winners will have earned scholarships totaling \$1,591,500 at the conclusion of the current program.

The 630,564 girls from 15,116 schools registering for the 1969 Betty Crocker Search established a new record for the program. Jo Beth has been an active member of FHA for four years. She served as treasurer during her sophomore year and first vice-president as a junior. She was selected as a delegate to the state FHA convention in Dallas as a sophomore. As a junior, she was the entrant in the Dallas "Make It With Wool" contest at Lubbock, and received favorable comment on her garment, a wool coat.

Jo Beth has been active in many activities in high school. She has been a member of the high school basketball team for four years and is co-captain this year. She was Senior Halloween Queen candidate, and is senior class treasurer. She holds an office in the Beta Club, and is business manager of the school yearbook. She was a member of the junior play cast, and as a junior was selected Most Dependable.

## Basketball Schedule Winds Up Friday

Quitaque High Schools basketball teams drive to Matador to play their last scheduled game of the year, after having the first half of the district title in their possession.

Both Pantherettes and Panthers are undefeated to date in the district race and both teams could lose Friday night and still remain on top.

The Quitaque teams went to Estelline last Friday night and QHS won both games, the Pantherettes having a little trouble with the Bearettes before winning 45-33.

The Panthers won 74-38 with all hands getting into the game.

The Bearettes gave the Pantherettes all they could handle for the first half of the game Friday night. Quitaque led 9-7 at the end of the first quarter, and 18-16 at halftime. Quitaque increased its lead to seven points, 31-24 at the end of three periods.

Jackie Cheatham lead all scorers with 21 points, as Sherry Stark notched 13 and Barbara Chandler hit for 11 points. Chalannes Hoover scored 17 points for Estelline to three wins.

Lyn Payne scored 14 points for scoring honors for the Panthers. Perry Brunson scored 12, Hamilton 11, David Brunson 10, Chandler 7, Pointer 6, Larry D. Price 5, King, 3, Farley and Stan Price 2 each.

The boys tournament will begin next Thursday night, February 13 and this year will be played at Silvertown. Quitaque will not play a game Thursday night because of being the round robin winner and thus drawing a bye into the second round of play.

Play gets underway at 7 o'clock next Thursday night in the gym at Silvertown in the Boys District Tournament.

Because of the final games to be played Friday night of this week an absolute "who plays who" cannot be given at this time.

The schedule is as follows: The team winding up in third place in the final round robin standings will meet the number five team in the first game Thursday night.

The number two team will play the number four team in the second game Thursday night.

The winner of the Thursday night's 3-5 teams game will play Quitaque Friday night.

Thursday night's losers will play Friday night to determine the team to play for third place.

The Thursday night winner of the game between the 2-4 teams will advance to the championship finals on Saturday night and will meet the winner of Friday night's game between Quitaque and its opponent. The loser of that game will play for third place. The third place game will begin at 7 o'clock Saturday night and the championship game will start at 8:15.

Mrs. J. W. Harlan and Mrs. Winfred House were in Childress Wednesday of last week where Mrs. Harlan had her eyes checked.

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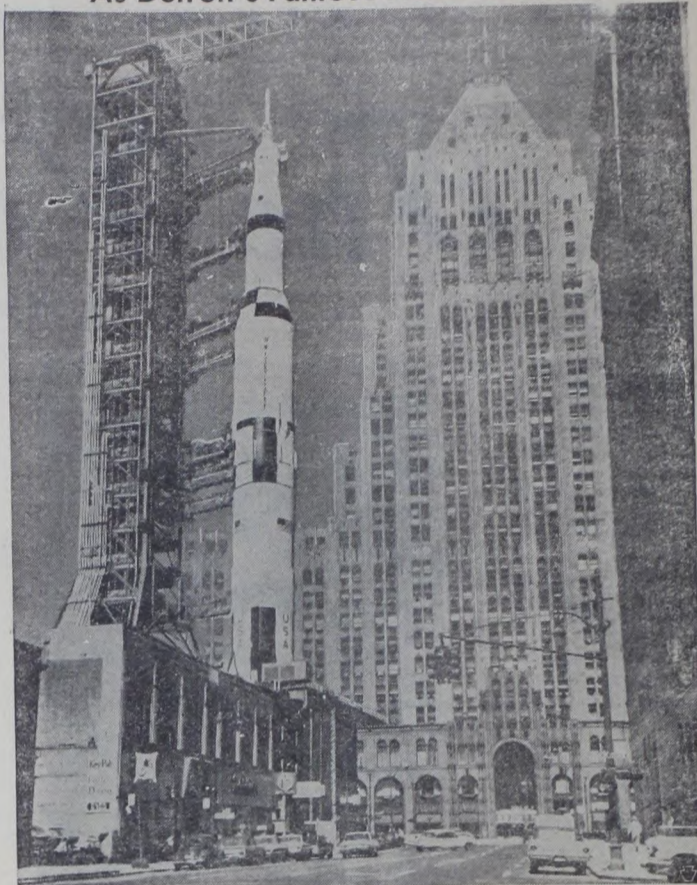

Here's how the Saturn 5 rocket, which launched astronauts Borman, Lovell and Anders on their trip around the moon, compares in height with Detroit's Fisher Building. This composite picture shows the rocket as though it is resting on West Grand Boulevard adjacent to the famous office building in Detroit's New Center area. The Saturn 5 is only 78 feet shorter than the Fisher Building, whose golden tower reaches 441 feet high. The rocket which blasted the Apollo 8 into space was loaded with 960,000 gallons of fuel for the historic moon-circling trip.

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**A NEW CHURCH FOR A NEW WORLD**

We have discussed the Charge Conference in the United Methodist Church and its purpose, membership, and responsibilities.

This week we turn our attention to the Administrative Board, its purposes, membership, and responsibilities.

In every local church, there shall be an administrative body known as the Administrative Board, to which the organizations and agencies of the local are accountable. It functions under and is accountable to the Charge Conference.

The purpose of the Administrative Board shall be to initiate planning, receive reports, set goals, authorize action, determine policy, evaluate the church's ministries, and review the state of the church. The Board shall meet at least every three months or as often as deemed necessary.

The membership of the Board shall consist of the following: the pastor, the lay leader, the lay

member of the Annual Conference, chairman of the trustees, the chairman of the Committee on Finance, the chairman of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the secretary of the committee on Nominations and Personnel, the church treasurer, the chairman of the Council on Ministries, the work area chairmen, the age-level and family coordinators, the superintendent of the study program of the church, the president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, the president of the Methodist Men, and a health and welfare representative.

Members of the Board shall be persons of genuine Christian character who love the Church, are morally disciplined, are loyal to the ethical standards of the United Methodist Church, and are competent to administer its affairs. All shall be members of the local church, except where Central Conference legislation provides otherwise.

As the executive agency of the Charge Conference, the Administrative Board shall have general oversight of the administration and

program of the local church. The pastor shall be the administrative officer and as such shall be an ex officio member of all conferences, boards, councils, commissions, committees and groups.

The Board shall be responsible for administering the organization of the local church. It may invite assistance from persons who are not members of the Board to assist the local church in fulfilling its mission.

It may adjust the local church's program year to correspond with the Annual Conference fiscal year. It shall determine the date when all elected personnel shall take office and establish their tenure except when the General Conference or the Annual Conference orders otherwise.

It shall establish the goals for the ministries of the local church, elect such lay officers and members of the Board as authorized by the Discipline of the United Methodist Church, receive and act upon the reports of the Committee on Nominations and Personnel, review the state of the church, after consultation with the Committee on Pastor - Parish Relations and

the Committee on Finance recommend to the Charge Conference the salary and other remuneration for the pastor and staff, establish the budget, cultivate interest in all the benevolent causes authorized by the General, Jurisdictional, Annual, and District Conferences, make proper and adequate provision for the financial needs of the church, discharge faithfully any and all duties committed to it by the Charge Conference or by the law of the Church, develop in the members a concern for and responsibility in the establishment of new churches and other forms of ministry, and foster understanding of the unity of the Church and shall initiate responsible participation in the ministries of the ecumenical community.

We shall next turn our attention to the Council on Ministries in the local church, its membership and responsibilities.

**CHANGES MADE IN HANDLING REQUESTS**  
To further the secrecy of communications, changes have been made in handling requests to determine if a local telephone is in use or out of order.

The announcement of the change was made recently by Sherron T. Lee, division manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"Extreme caution has always been taken by the telephone industry in honoring the secrecy of communications; however, as communications equipment and customers become more and more sophisticated, it becomes necessary to close any loopholes which come to our attention," Lee said. "In the past, when a customer found a telephone number busy, they often requested an operator to determine if there was conversation on the line. We have honored the request to be sure the telephone was not unknowingly out of service," Lee explained.

"Under the new procedure," Lee said, "the number can be verified to determine if there is conversation on the line only if the requesting party indicates (1) that the call is urgent, or (2) an emergency, and (3) wants the conversation interrupted. The name

and telephone number of the person asking for the interruption is requested before an operator proceeds to interrupt a conversation," Lee explained.

"Of course, if there is some reason to believe that the number is out of order, a customer is still asked to notify the operator who can have the number checked," Lee explained. "If there is trouble it will be reported to repair service by the operator."

Historically, up to sixteen percent of all "assistance" calls to the operator—other than placing a long distance call—are to determine if a telephone is in use or out of order.

Lee emphasized that the telephone company will, on every occasion, determine whether a line is in trouble or not. However, now the information will be reported to repair service instead of the customer.

**From The County Agent's Desk**

**PRUNE SHADE TREES WHILE DORMANT**

The major pruning on shade trees should be done during the winter months, while the trees are dormant. Before pruning any tree, make sure that you have a justifiable reason for performing the operation. Think through what you are trying to accomplish by pruning and take the necessary steps to carry out your objectives.



**CANCER'S WARNING SIGNALS**

- 1 Unusual bleeding or discharge
- 2 A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere
- 3 A sore that does not heal
- 4 Change in bowel or bladder habits
- 5 Hoarseness or cough

These signals do not usually mean cancer, but they are warnings; if one lasts more than two weeks, it is important to go to your doctor.

What are the purposes of pruning? First and foremost is to maintain a strong framework for the future development of the tree. Other reasons are to reduce the size or to keep them within specific bounds. To remove dead, diseased, or weak growth as well as broken limbs and rubbing branches. Another reason is to improve the size and quality of flowers and fruit. The final reason is to balance the top growth with the root system at transplanting time.

Unless pruning can be justified for one of these reasons it is better to place the shears and saw in the shed and obtain the desired exercise by spading a flowerbed.

Some of the general principles that will apply when pruning shade trees include the removal of all dead or diseased wood, broken limbs, and weak growth. Shorten or remove entirely long unsightly branches as they offer too much resistance to the wind and

are frequently subject to storm damage.

Never stub back limbs or branches. Rather, cut back to a main branch or trunk so that there will be no stubs remaining. The so-called "stubbing back" or topping large branches will result in a proliferation of sucker growth and leave a wound that is impossible to heal.

To protect pruning cuts and prevent the entry of disease and insect organisms, all cuts over one inch in diameter should be painted with a special tree paint obtainable at all garden stores or nursery sales yards. For temporary treatment of a wound, a coat of shellac will give four to six weeks of protection.

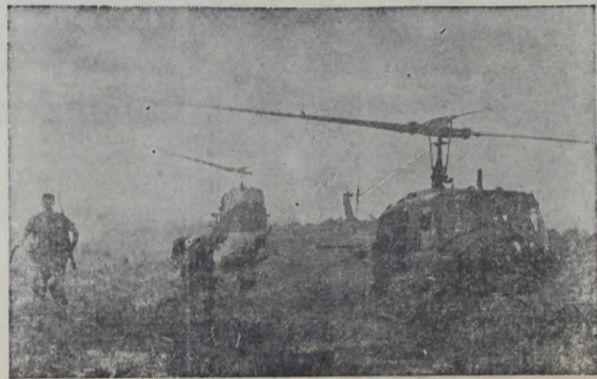
The homeowner can frequently handle the pruning operation himself if the work can be reached from a ladder. If your trees are quite large or need extensive

work, it is best to hire a professional arborist or tree surgeon. He will have the necessary tools and training to do the job correctly and safely.

If there is evidence of disease in the tree or shrub being pruned, it is important that after each cut the pruning equipment is dipped in a disinfectant to kill the disease organisms to prevent their spread to other portions of the tree or even to other trees. A 10 percent household bleach solution makes a very satisfactory disinfectant. This can be prepared by mixing one part bleach to nine parts of water. Dip the pruning equipment after each cut is made.

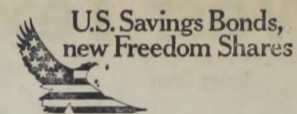
